Mastering technology bit by bit

• Modern apps and software make it far too easy to never need your password. That's great but unfortunately this also means it is really easy to forget them. There is no one right way to manage your passwords, but having a process that you consistently follow is key. Be sure that you write down every new password as you create it. Store passwords in a place (physical or digital) that is convenient for you to access but safe from the prying eyes of others. Finally, ALWAYS update your passwords when you inevitably have to change them. Effective password management can prevent A LOT of technology headaches.

Staying safe online

• Be in the habit of checking the "About Us" page on any website you visit. What a website says (or doesn't say!) about itself will tell you a lot about the website's bias, expertise, and financial interests. The "About Us" page will help to put a proper frame around the rest of the information on their website. Although the exact name of this page varies from website to website, if this information is hard to find or completely absent, you should stop and ask yourself: Why...?"

Writer's Workshop - April 6




Beginning in April, the Kennebunk Free Library will host a four-month series of writing workshops on the first Wednesday of each month, led by Caroline Joy Adams, M.Ed. Workshops are limited to 12 participants. Please call or email the library to register. Each workshop will have a unique theme. On April 6 from 6:00-7:30, participants will be writing about "Winter's End,

Welcoming Spring." On May 4, the theme will be "Planting the Seeds of New Possibilities"; on June 1, "The Power of Place"; and on July 6, "Memorable Characters, People of Influence."

Caroline Joy Adams is an artist, writer, and photographer. She has taught writing at the college level, in addition to hundreds of writing workshops over the past 20 years, including in Maui, Hawaii; Newport, RI; Woods Hole, Boston, and Martha's Vineyard, MA; and Scottsdale, AZ. She is the author of seven books, including *The Power to Write:* Seven Keys to Discover Your Writer Within. Her newest title, *The Great Travels Writing Journal*, will be released this spring.

Adams says: "Life itself is a complex, ever-unfolding journey – and writing about the experiences and adventures you have had along the pathway can be a wonderful way to recall, pay tribute to, and share some of your memorable life moments. And if you prefer to explore writing fiction, that's also a great way to get your creative energies flowing. Either way, whether you are most interested in memoir, fiction, or other forms of creative nonfiction, if you would like a chance to write in a fun supportive atmosphere, come join us for these workshops."

Nonfiction Book Group - April 11



Join us on Monday, April 11 at 6:30 p.m. to discuss *Hurricane Lizards and Plastic Squid* by Thor Hanson.

"Biologist Thor Hanson tells the remarkable story of how plants and animals are responding to climate change: adjusting, evolving, and sometimes dying out. Anole lizards have grown larger toe pads, to grip more tightly in frequent hurricanes. Warm waters cause the development of Humboldt squid to alter so dramatically that fishermen mistake them for different species. Brown pelicans move north, and long-spined sea urchins south, to find cooler homes. And when coral reefs sicken, they leave no territory worth fighting for, so aggressive butterfly fish transform instantly into pacifists. A

story of hope, resilience, and risk, Hurricane Lizards and Plastic Squid is a reminder of how unpredictable climate change is as it interacts with the messy lattice of life." - Novelist

Author Marie Laverriere - April 25




Marie Laverriere, author of *Minimalism for Well Being*, will be at KFL to discuss her book and the process of simplifying on Monday, April 25 at 6:00.

Laverriere says, "Simplifying one's life is very personal. We all do it differently. Some people dwell in big houses and live simply without clutter or lots of possession they don't need, while others live in tiny homes with minimal possessions. There is no wrong way to doing this but to get started may take a little help." In this presentation, Leverriere will share several tools to help get started in the process of choosing a simple life that works for you.

Marie A. Laverriere DMin, MA, MSW, practices minimalism and purposefully lives a simplified life. She moved out of an 800 square foot apartment into a 293 square foot cottage right across the street from the ocean in Scarborough, ME steps away from a sandy beach where she walks daily with her friend. She has a private practice as a mental health therapist (LCSW)/Life Coach and since Covid-19 has been working out of her tiny cottage doing Telehealth (meeting clients virtually for sessions). Sometimes she incorporates some of the tools from her books when working with clients. Simplify one's life can be a wonderful tool to finding peace. As a young child, Marie imagined a tiny cottage in her parents' backyard, filled with only the things she needed. It had two front windows with flower boxes. Fifty-three years later she found her tiny cottage, where she has been living for the past two+ years. Marie makes time to do what she enjoys such as writing, she published two books in 2021 on Amazon, the first one is Minimalism for Well-Being: A Guide to Simplifying All Facets of Your Life and the second one is A Journey to Authenticity: Finding Freedom, Peace & Joy. She has a passion for creating and offering workshops on self care, simplifying one's life as well as embracing the process in discovering meaning in one's life. She also enjoys to travels with her friend to warmer climates during Maine's cold months.

Adult Book Discussion - April 26



Join us on Tuesday, April 26 at 1:00 p.m. to discuss *Anxious People* by Fredrik Backman.

"Eight people become unlikely friends during a hostage situation created by an inept bank robber.

In a town in Sweden, a desperate parent turns to bank robbery to help pay the rent. Unfortunately, the target turns out to be a cashless bank, which means that no robbery can take place. In an attempt to flee the police, the would-be perpetrator runs into a nearby apartment building and interrupts an open house, causing the would-be buyers to assume they're being held

hostage. After the situation has ended with an absent bank robber and blood on the carpet, a father-and-son police pair work through maddening interviews with the witnesses: the ridiculous realtor; an older couple who renovates and sells apartments in an effort to stay busy; a bickering young couple expecting their first child; a well-off woman interested only in the view from the balcony of a significant bridge in her life; an elderly woman missing her husband as New Year's Eve approaches; and, absurdly, an actor dressed as a rabbit hired to disrupt the showing and drive down the apartment price. Backman's latest novel focuses on how a shared event can change the course of multiple people's lives even in times of deep and ongoing anxiousness. The observer/narrator is winding and given to tangents and, in early moments, might distract a bit too much from the strongly drawn characters. But the story gains energy and sureness as it develops, resulting in moments of insight and connection between its numerous amiable characters.

The Sixth Extinction, Elizabeth Kolbert

I can't recommend *The Sixth Extinction* enough. This book is as heartbreaking as it is compelling - the Pulitzer Prize was well-deserved. Each chapter is an ode to its chosen topics, a varied selection of unique and wonderful things that perhaps are all the more beautiful because they are now disappearing if not already gone. Whether you look at Kolbert's essays on bats, corals, or glaciers, we can observe our path of destruction. This is a painful reminder of what our way of life is doing to our home.

However, Kolbert doesn't leave you down in the dumps. While *The Sixth Extinction* details the tragic stories of species and systems on the edge, it also captures the work of humans going to incredible lengths to save them. Reading about running a frog hotel in the Amazon, creating banks of DNA samples, or giving a rhino an ultrasound, it is clear a lot of people put in Herculean amounts of effort to save what we can. It is truly inspiring for what we as individuals can do, not only in our daily lives, but also with our voices and our votes."


Four Lost Cities – A Secret History of the Urban Age – Annalee Newitz

This book takes on the archeological explorations of four cities using modern techniques designed to reveal important information on how common people lived in ancient times. Newitz explores the rise and fall of four ancient cities, each the center of a sophisticated civilization: the Neolithic site of Çatalhöyük in Central Turkey, the Roman vacation town of Pompeii on Italy's southern coast, the medieval megacity of Angkor in Cambodia, and the indigenous metropolis Cahokia, which stood beside the Mississippi River where East St. Louis is today. It is very readable and easy for a person new to archeology to understand and appreciate.
