Library News

New Donated eBooks and eAudios added to Overdrive



A huge thank you to Overdrive, our ebook platform! They have donated 150 new titles - which they're calling the "COVID Response Collection" - to KFLs ebook/audiobook collection. There are a variety of genres included from cozy mysteries to thrillers to romance, even some nonfiction. All titles will be available to KFL until December 31. Best of all, these titles are what's called "simultaneous use" - multiple people can be reading the same book at the same time. This is a tremendous gift. Publishers set their own prices but ebooks typically cost \$55 - \$65 for 52 checkouts; new audiobooks are generally \$75 - \$95 for unlimited uses. The donation represents about a 25 percent increase in books available.

Virtual Poetry Reading - April 10

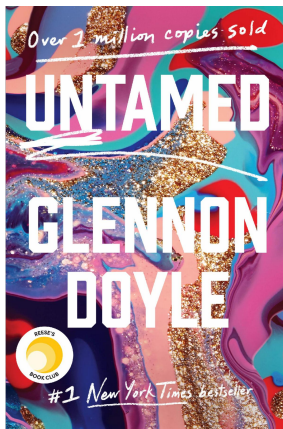

"Say you're a white, professional woman in the midst of a late-evening crisis. Would you call your African American babysitter, catching her at a friend's birthday party, and ask her to come tend to your toddler? Say you're that African American babysitter. After taking your charge to the local market, wouldn't you be annoyed, then humiliated, then downright scared and angry when a security guard accuses you of kidnapping? Say you're that white woman, wanting to right this wrong, and giving the sitter a raise or an edible arrangement isn't quite the right

path. Would you go crusading with self-righteous, even self-serving zeal, not really checking in with what your babysitter wants or needs? If you were that babysitter, what would be your next move? Especially if you loved that toddler and thought you were good at your job? Aren't you curious to find out how put-upon Emira deals with her clueless brand-marketer boss? ... In her debut novel, Reid illuminates difficult truths about race, society, and power with a fresh, light hand. We're all familiar with the phrases white privilege and race relations, but rarely has a book vivified these terms in such a lucid, absorbing, graceful, forceful, but unforced way." 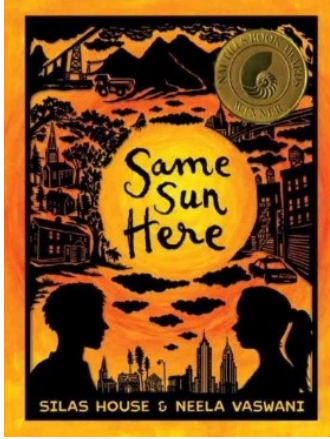

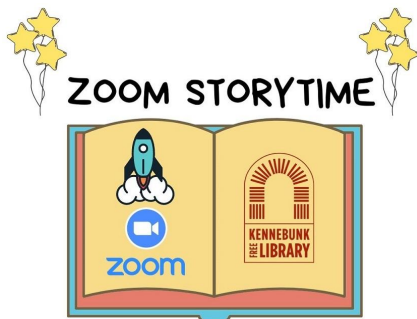

Interior Chinatown by Charles Yu

The author lets us in on the challenges of stereotyping and the failure of many Americans to see Asian Americans as anything but foreigners using humor. The protagonist in this work of fiction, Willis Wu works as an actor in Hollywood competing for roles for “Generic Asian man”, “Disgraced Son”, or the epitome of roles “Kung Fu Guy”. This book helped me to understand Americans of Asian descent’s situation before the events of the past year added a new layer of difficulty.

Eat a Peach: A Memoir by David Chang

David Chang is a James Beard award winning chef. His first restaurant was Momofuko Noodle Bar in New York City in 2004. This book is a raw and honest autobiography of the youngest son of a deeply religious Korean family. Chef Chang takes us through the hard work and struggles that have culminated in great professional success in restaurants, a TV show and now, author. His personal life took longer to stabilize but happily comes together. The book ends just as the Pandemic closes down the food industry and the author gives his insight on the future of the industry.

Our Only Home: A Climate Appeal to the World by Dalai Lama and Franz Alt

We are called to pay attention to the environmental emergency at hand and do what we can in big ways and small. The Dalai Lama shares his admiration of Greta Thunburg and the young people she has rallied to press the world to respond.

The book records a conversation between The Dalai Lama and his friend, Franz Alt. It is an easy read and very timely. Let this book get you into an Earth Day mindset and explore how you can help this cause today and for future generations.

[*Seed to Seed: Seed Saving and Growing Techniques for Vegetable Gardeners*](#) by Suzanne Ashworth begins with a discussion of the history and importance of seed saving within families and communities, the contributing factors to a recent loss in plant diversity, and the ways readers can help to preserve the many heirloom plant varieties that still exist, including purchasing, growing, saving, and sharing heirloom seeds. She then explains the basics of botanical classification, pollination, and flower structure and describes ways to maintain varietal purity and how to clean and store seeds. Next, the author discusses each of the major plant families, including their taxonomy and general seed saving information, as well as more detailed information on how to grow and save seeds for each species within that family group, including input from the book’s U.S. regional advisors. The guide wraps up with a short bio for each regional advisor, information about a handful of seed saving organizations, and a comprehensive glossary. I learned that saving varietally pure seeds takes a lot more time and consideration than I thought, but I also found encouragement and knowledge to start saving a few of my own seeds this year, such as garden peas!
