# A Local History Deep Dive with Molly

As denizens of the northwest corner of this pleasant peninsula, we have a great many things to be thankful for. From the astounding natural beauty that surrounds us to the endlessly warm and gracious community that embraces us, life in Benzie County and its neighboring areas is special for a myriad of reasons. Beyond the lakes and the dunes and the solemn, snowy woods, we are also special because we are rich in local history. Thanks to the diligent and thorough research of local historians and authors, as well as the contributions of our friends at the Benzie Area Historical Society, our history is kept alive. At the library, we feel so lucky to have a robust section of local history spanning all sorts of subjects. Whether you're interested in shipwrecks, ski resorts, or anywhere in between, we are proud to offer materials that are not just educational, but delightfully entertaining.

One subgenre of local history that I had the pleasure of exploring recently is Frankfort's history of sports and high school athletics. In Pete Sandman's book, WHEN BASEBALL WAS KING in Frankfort, Michigan, Sandman compiled newspaper articles, historic photos, and entertaining anecdotes to bring to life the story of the Frankfort-Elberta Athletics baseball team. With classic 1920s nicknames like Doc, Syl, Red, and Pep speckling their roster, the Athletics of the 20s paved the way for a baseball franchise that was as precious to the town (stores and offices would often close so everyone could attend the game) as they were successful, finally culminating in the peak year of 1954, when the Athletic's clinched the National Baseball Congress Men's Semi-Professional state title – the smallest community to ever earn such a distinction. The Athletics disbanded in 1967, but the legacy of the team lives on in those who remember it.

Also by Sandman is IF YOU HAVEN'T PLAYED FRANKFORT, YOU HAVEN'T PLAYED FOOTBALL! The story of the community's football tradition in the last 100 plus years chronicles Frankfort High School football team from their inception in 1901, through the 1980's, including their 1959-1960 seasons when they pulled off a 21-game unbeaten streak! With team photos dating back to the very beginning of the program, team rosters showing the generational inheritance of football in the community, and fantastic tales of both ecstatic victory and crushing defeat, If You Haven't Played Frontball! reminds us all why "Panther Pride" is more than just school spirit.

The area's gliding history is documented in <u>SOARING AND GLIDING THE SLEAPING BEAR DUNES NATIONAL LAKESHORE AREA</u> by Jeff and Pete Sandman. The 1937 Midwest Soaring Meet took place just north of Empire. Originally, the planes were brought aloft by towing them along the beach with a Ford Model A roadster, equipped with nine-by-13 inch donut tires to counteract the sand. As you can imagine, this method of takeoff was not exactly sustainable. Lewin Barringer, the general manager of the Soaring Society of America stated in his 1940 book Flight Without Power, "Some of the best places in America are the sand dunes in the vicinity of Frankfort, Michigan, which offer unlimited facilities for landing on the beaches." Soaring and Gliding carries the reader effortlessly through the daring and romantic tales of unpowered flight in the Sleeping Bear area and demonstrates the lasting impact those gliding meets had on the area's tourism and reputation as a recreational destination.

Henry James once said, "It takes an endless amount of history to make even a little tradition." Whether you choose baseball, football, gliding, or a completely different subject matter, we invite you to explore the wealth of our local history collection.
