

City of Frankfort/MDOT Road Improvement Project

Frankfort is undergoing extensive road work on M-22 beginning at the bottom of Gateway Hill (A&W) through the blinking light on 7th St. Depending on your usual route to the library, this work may require a detour to get to the library. THE LIBRARY THAT PATIENCE BUILT: A MESSAGE FROM THE DIRECTOR

Is it time for a COVID retrospective? I suppose comparing where we were a year ago to where we are today is helpful to gauge how far we've come. It does feel like we are nearing the end of the pandemic, but I recognize we still have a way to go before the library will return to "normal." While I plan and prepare for multiple scenarios for how the summer may go, my focus remains on how best we can serve our patrons TODAY.

As of this writing, the B.1.1.7 COVID-19 variant was identified in Benzie County.

According to the local health department, "research shows the B.1.1.7 variant is more easily spread than other variants." While vaccine distribution is encouraging, Munson Medical Center curently has 23 COVID patients in the ICU and the hospital is at 72% capacity

(https://www.michigan.gov/coronavirus/0,9753,7-406-98159-523641--,00.html). Pandemic fatigue is real, but please hang in there and stay safe.

Under current MDHHS guidelines, we are operating at 50% capacity, which translates to 24 people in the building (including staff) at any given time. We have yet to reach that, so the doors will remain open, but until the staff is fully vaccinated and the capacity limits are lifted, we will not have workspace or reading space available in the library and time limits will be enforced so that everyone has a chance to use the library safely. Curbside service is still available if you prefer to not come inside.

As we strive for "normal", we also have another unique layer of complications and that is the library is currently under construction. While we are assured we won't need to close the library for any extended length of time, there may be periodic days and times where we may need to close. We will do our best to keep those days to a minimum and provide as much advanced notice as we can.



Watching: I have been trying my best to see all the Best Picture nominees before the Academy Awards Ceremony and so far my favorites have been SOUND OF METAL and NOMADLAND (book based). Despite their rather different subject matter (Nomadland centers on Fern-- an older woman who turns to nomadic van life after losing everything--while The Sound of Metal follows Ruben-- a young man whose career as a heavy metal drummer is thrown into disarray after he suddenly and catastrophically loses his hearing) both films meditate on the concept of loss and change while demonstrating the universal truth of such things; we must adapt and move forward, even when our "new normal" will never be the normal we once knew. These titles are not available to libraries yet, but we will add them to our collection in the near future. Reading: I deeply enjoyed the new graphic novel adaptation of SLAUGHTERHOUSE FIVE. Whether you're a fan of the novel or have never read it, the graphic adaptation by Ryan North and Albert Monteys faithfully imbues the spirit of the original while still finding fresh ways to interpret Kurt Vonnegut's classic.
