
UPCOMING LIBRARY CLOSINGS:

I recently read Bradbury's ZEN IN THE ART OF WRITING. I borrowed a favorite PBS NOVA episode from MeLCat, INSIDE EINSTEIN'S MIND. I was happy to see it once again. I then read <u>SIDELIGHTS ON RELATIVITY</u> by Albert Einstein. After watching the NOVA video, I was eager to read a few of Einstein's own words.

This month's focus is on Miniatures. This all started with THE BOX IN THE WOODS, the most recent Truly Devious book by Maureen Johnson. It is a fantastic YA crime thriller with notes of classic slasher films BUT that led me to order THE NUTSHELL STUDIES OF UNEXPLAINED DEATHS through MELcat. "The Nutshell Studies" were created by Frances Glessner Lee. Lee came from a well to do family, and was part of all the east coast socialite circles which introduced her to the man that would become Boston's chief medical examiner. Not one to shy away from details and seeing a need for would-be detectives to practice their observational skills Lee created a series of dollhouse style dioramas inspired by true cases related to her by her police and medical contacts. These macbree dollhouses are reminiscent of the Thorne rooms (which also have a book tie-in called THE SIXTY-EIGHT ROOMS by Marianne Malone) with their stunning detail rendered in miniature. Frances Glessner Lee and her contributions helped further forensic science to such a degree she is often known as "the mother of forensic science" and she even helped found the Harvard Department of Legal Medicine. Her life is truly amazing and you can learn even more about her life in her biography 18 TINY DEATHS: THE UNTOLD STORY OF FRANCES GLESSNER LEE AND THE INVENTION OF MODERN FORENSICS by Bruce Goldfarb. I would also recommend the book THE MINIATURIST by Jessie Burt if you are looking for a book about stunning miniatures that are less morbid.

I am currently reading THE PERSONAL LIBRARIAN by Marie Benedict and Victoria Christopher Murray. It is a great fiction read with historical undertones.

I just started reading THE PUMA YEARS a memoir by Laura Coleman. It is an unusual choice for me as I don't usually read memoirs...but something about the synopsis on the book jacket intrigued me. The book is reading like a very engaging novel and I am hooked.

Laura is in her twenties and her life has no direction, having just guit another job she decides to travel. While in Bolivia she volunteers at at wildlife sanctuary. One of her care assignments is a puma named Wayra but the other animal residents add entertainment to daily life at the sanctuary. Laura's inexperience is comically obvious buy you can sense that the relationship she is forming with the puma, Waynra will be beneficial for both. Her description of the jungle in all its cruel beauty transports you there. Hard to know how the story will develop but I expect that I will cry.
