The New Africa Comes to Kennebunk



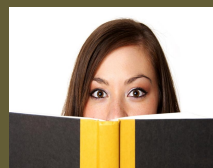
On **Wednesday, January 6 at 6:00** KFL will host a panel of brilliant speakers as we kickoff our series on The New Africa. This series is sponsored by the Camden Conference, in partnership with the World Affairs Council KFL is a participating library bringing an extension of this conference to our community.

Currently only 1 percent of Tanzanian girls complete secondary school. The Mileme Girls School in rural Tanzania, a project of Africa Schoolhouse, provides a safe living environment that enables young women to gain an education and impact future generations. Aimée and Mark Bessire, founders of Africa Schoolhouse, will share their work with Sukuma communities and research on girls' education. Pamela W. Hawkes and T. Scott Teas of Scattergood Architects will discuss the design and construction of the Mileme Girls School using local sustainable materials and work crews.



On **Saturday, January 9 at 2:00** we will host artist, illustrator, educator and collector Toni Truesdale for our second installment in our series on The New Africa.

Toni will be discussing a variety of topics during her presentation including daily life (art and artifact), iconic mother figures of power, representations of life passages and storytelling. She will be showing some of her collection during this presentation and these items will also be on display at the library in February. A snow date has been scheduled for January 23 at 2:00.

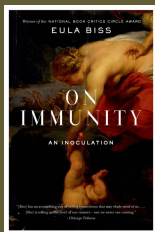

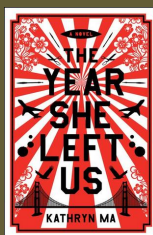

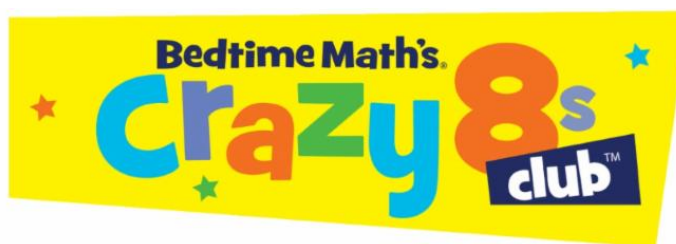
with immigrant integration in his talk, entitled *The Need for Immigration in Maine and the Challenges with Integration*.

Damas was born and raised in the Democratic Republic of the Congo and moved to Rwanda in the early 90s during the Rwanda Patriotic Front's liberation war. He worked as a pilot for the Rwanda Air Force until 2000, when he moved to Portland, Maine. Since 2002, he has been



working for Unum Insurance Company in different positions, and now as a Financial Benefits Specialist. In January 2014, he was elected president of the Rwanda Community Association of Maine and also heads an Integration Center Project in collaboration with other immigrant community leaders. He is a graduate of Southern New Hampshire University with an MS in Community Development and an MBA. He lives in Westbrook, Maine with his wife and two children.

This year, tax help will be offered every Thursday from 9:30-12:00, **beginning on February 4** and ending on April 14. Because this is a popular service, we want to make things as hassle-free as possible. To that end, we are implementing a new sign-up procedure this year. We will not be putting a sign-up sheet outside the door as we have done in previous years. Instead, library doors will be open at 9:30 sharp, with a sign-up sheet inside the library. We're hoping that being here at 9:30, rather than at 9:00, will minimize the overall time that you spend waiting.

KFL's Genealogy Group



The next meeting of KFL's Genealogy Group will be held on **Sat., Jan. 9**, from 10 AM - Noon.

Pam Stone Eagleson, Certified Genealogist, will present a lecture addressing a common problem faced by many family genealogists - how can you find an ancestor's parents if no document names them?

Identifying Robert Walker's Ancestry is a case study using indirect evidence to build a proof argument that follows the Genealogical Proof Standard. Identifying Walker's ancestry required research in ten counties of five states, DNA testing, and legal proceedings around a deed his father failed to execute.

from 10:00 to 11:00 am. Students of all ages are invited to drop in to read to Jack.

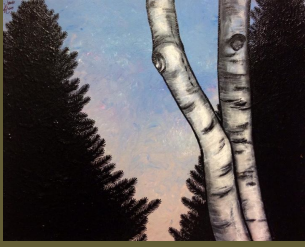

Practice gained by reading to a dog has been shown to help students increase reading fluency. Of course, associating reading with something fun like patting a dog helps too!

Jack is a certified therapy dog who also volunteers at the Kennebunk Nursing and Rehabilitation Center. He will be accompanied by his favorite people, Ursula and Katie Roesse.

"Keepsakes by Kate", the acrylic works of Kate Banks remind you that art is suitable for the soul. It was launched in March of 2014 on Facebook with only nine paintings. There are now over 60. Kate was born with a deformity and dysplasia of the left hip. The artist behind this exhibit is a young inspiring individual from Maine, who because of her disability has always been an artist. Kate Banks strives to give back to the community by producing a variety of work that she hopes will remind people to smile among the chaos of the world.

As a 2005 graduate, Kate pursued her art goals by attending Ringling College of Art and Design in Sarasota Florida, Maine College

Local Author **Emily Kinney** will discuss her novel *The Island of Lote* at KFL on **Thursday, January 7th**, from noon to 1PM in Hank's Room. Maine native Emily Kinney's debut novel focuses on 14 year old Milo Hestler who describes herself as a life-long victim of circumstances. Her parents have home-hopped with her all across the country, never fully settling down. Their last disastrous abode sends Milo begging to go to summer camp in farthest place she can think of: Australia. However, she never gets there. Near a remote, uncharted tropical island, Milo's plane malfunctions, forcing her to parachute into the ocean. Dragged ashore in the wee hours of the morning by a local island boy, Milo's real adventure begins. Through miscommunication, mishaps, mistakes, and misleading hand gestures, Milo finds herself adjusting to island life as the reluctant fiancée of her rescuer and unqualified parental figure of a tiny intellectual. Both hilarious and thought-provoking, *The Island of Lote* follows Milo's journey as she slowly learns to overcome her indignation and fury in order to consider the possibility of love. Esther Pasztory will discuss her recent publication, *Aliens and Fakes: Popular Theories About the Origins of Ancient Americans*, on **Thursday, January 21**, from noon to 1 PM at KFL. Esther Pasztory, a recent resident of Kennebunk, is professor emerita of Columbia University. Her field is Pre-Columbian art history. She has published a number of scholarly books as well as several works of fiction. *A wonderful book about the myths and theories, some plausible and some preposterous, that have accumulated over the ages about the origins of the peoples of ancient America.
