KFL 25th Edition 5K

In-Person: July 8 at 6:00

We are delighted to announce that for our 25th Edition 5K, we are partnering with our neighbors Hope Cemetery and Woods and the Friends of Hope Cemetery and Woods to bring a portion of the race through their beautiful trails. This land is truly a treasure of the community. In 2017, Hope Woods was protected by a conservation easement held by Kennebunk Land Trust. A few years later a trail system including a Universally Accessible Trail and accessible parking was added.

THE COURSE

Through Local Roads...

The course will now start in the parking lot of Kennebunk Free Library, head down Fletcher, turn down Oakwood, then wind through Colonial to Woodhaven, followed by a loop around Rosewood Circle, and finally bringing participants to the trail head for Hope Cemetery & Woods.

Then into the woods...

From here they will proceed onto the Black Trail then onto the eastern side of the Universally Accessible Trail before emerging at the kiosk. The next stretch follows the access road until participants reach the perimeter of the cemetery which they will follow counterclockwise until reaching the Yellow Trail.

And back to Kennebunk Free Library...

They will follow the Yellow Trail for a short distance back to Fletcher where they will make a left and retrace their steps back to the Library.

Parking Lot

The race will start and end in the Kennebunk Free Library parking lot. At the start of the race, participants will loop around the parking lot counterclockwise before turning onto Fletcher. At the conclusion of the race, participants will enter the parking lot the same way they exited and proceed clockwise. Participants will be asked to hug the outer edge. This will be marked with cones and tape.

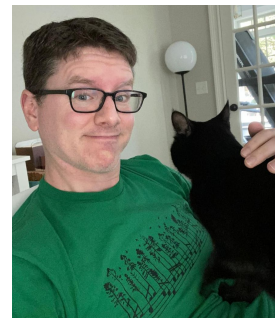

Mastering Technology Bit by Bit

A very underutilized quick key on computers is Ctrl+F (Windows)/ Cmd+F (Mac). This tells your computer to “find” and opens up a search box for the document or website you are currently working on. This can be incredibly helpful when you need to jump to a specific part of a lengthy document or quickly scan for keywords.



Staying Safe Online

Unfortunately, it has become very in vogue for journalists to use emotional language in order to call attention to their work and gain engagement online. This is especially a problem on social media networks. While a small amount of colorful language can be brushed off as just the state of the media, a larger amount, especially language that seems to be trying to persuade or cast blame rather than inform, could be a sign that the author has a bias or agenda that may affect the factuality of their work.

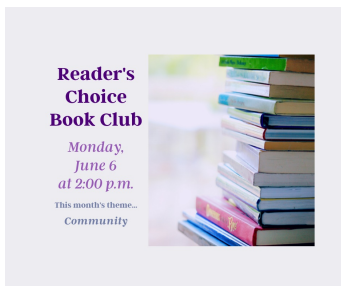
Improv - June 4, 11, 18, 25

Nonfiction Book Group - June 13

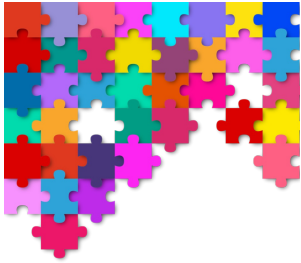


Join us on Monday, June 13 at 6:30 p.m. to discuss *On Juneteenth* by Annette Gordon-Reed.

"Pulitzer-winner Gordon-Reed (*The Hemingses of Monticello*) interweaves history, politics, and memoir in these immersive and well-informed essays reflecting on the history of Juneteenth. She places the story of June 19, 1865, the day (two years after the signing of the Emancipation Proclamation) when African Americans in Galveston, Tex., learned they were free, in the context of the bargain struck between settler Stephen F. Austin and the Mexican government in the 1820s to allow chattel slavery in what became east Texas, and notes that after winning independence from Mexico in 1836, Texans pushed for annexation into the U.S. in order to protect themselves from the rising tide of abolitionism. Gordon-Reed also describes the 'oddity of being on display' as the first student to integrate schools in her hometown of Conroe, sketches the history of Indigenous peoples in the region, and discusses the story behind the song 'The Yellow Rose of Texas,' which was based on a (likely false) legend that Mexican general

Antonio López de Santa Anna lost the Battle of San Jacinto because he was 'distracted' by a 'beautiful woman of color' spying for the Texas revolutionaries. Despite the thorny racial history, Gordon-Reed expresses a deep fondness for her native state, writing that 'love does not require taking an uncritical stance toward the object of one's affections.' This brisk history lesson entertains and enlightens." (Publishers Weekly, vol 268, issue 9)

Bill Hall on the War in Ukraine - June 14



Bill Hall, of the World Affairs Council of Maine, will be at the Kennebunk Free Library on Tuesday, June 14 at 6:30 to discuss the War in Ukraine. He will provide a brief overview of Ukraine's history, talk about the current situation in Ukraine, and discuss American and European responses.

Bill Hall is the president of the World Affairs Council of Maine. He was an intelligence officer in the U. S. Air Force and spent nearly 18 years overseas, in Asia and Europe. Bill graduated from Princeton University with a bachelor's degree in politics and from the University of Virginia with a master's degree in foreign affairs.

He lives with his wife, Nancy, on Peaks Island.

Author Marpheen Chann: *Moon in Full* - June 21



Author Marpheen Chann will be at the Kennebunk Free Library on Tuesday, June 21 at 6:30 p.m. to discuss his new book *Moon in Full*. A signing will follow the discussion, with books available to purchase at the event.

Moon in Full, a contemporary coming-of-age story, shines light on one young man's search for truth and compassion in a complicated era as it unwinds the deep-seated challenges we all face finding our authentic voice and true identities. Author Marpheen Chann's heart-warming journey

weaves through housing projects and foster homes; into houses of worship and across college campuses; and playing out in working-class Maine where he struggles to find his place. Adopted into a majority white community, Chann must reconcile his fears and secret longings as a young gay man with the devoutly religious beliefs of his new family. Chann, a second-generation Asian American, recounts what he has learned, what he has lost, and what he has found during his evolution from a hungry refugee's son to religious youth to advocate for acceptance and equality.

Marpheen Chann is a politician, thinker, author, and speaker on social justice, equity, and inclusion. As a gay, second-generation Asian American born in California to a Cambodian refugee family and later adopted by an evangelical, white working-class family in Maine, Marpheen uses a mix of humor and storytelling to help people view topics such as racism, xenophobia, and homophobia through an intersectional lens.

Kathy Ostrander Roberts on the Kennebunk Poor Farm - June 22

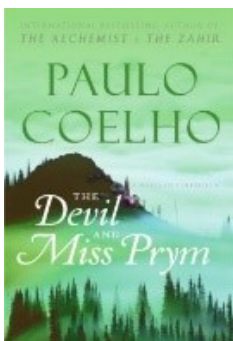


In the 18th and 19th centuries, even into the 20th century, most Maine towns had "poor farms." These were properties owned and supported through taxes which took in and cared for children and adults who could not take care of themselves. On Wednesday, June 22 at 6:30 p.m., Town Historian Kathy Ostrander Roberts will be at the Kennebunk Free Library to share information about the Kennebunk Poor Farm.

The Kennebunk Poor Farm was on Cat Mousam Road and ran from 1825 to 1936. The building was torn down in 1959 but those who died there are still buried in unmarked graves on the site.

Ostrander Roberts has spent years learning who these individuals were and how they were cared for. It is both a heartwarming and sad tale.

Adult Book Discussion - June 28



Join us on Tuesday, June 28 at 1:00 p.m. to discuss *The Devil and Miss Prym* by Paulo Coelho.

"Coelho's latest parable (*The Zahir*, 2005, etc.) has vague Kafkaesque overtones as a town is challenged to murder an innocent in exchange for prosperity.

The small village of Viscos has a proud past, but at present is dying. All the young have moved to the city, leaving middle-aged shepherds and farmers and a tavern owner dependent on the occasional tourist in search of a mountain idyll. Its demise is only a matter of time as the world is in short supply of civic miracles. When a stranger comes to town, only old Berta sees what no one else can—that his invisible traveling companion is the Devil. The stranger invites Chantal Prym for a walk in the woods and there shows her two burial spots—one contains a single bar of gold, the other ten bars. It is a test for the town, and as the tavern's barmaid, Chantal is the chosen mouthpiece. The village

can have the gold if in three days they commit a murder. Seeking an answer to the question of evil, the stranger is betting that humanity is immoral, even in the quaint village of Viscos. An arms manufacturer, the stranger's wife and daughters were killed by terrorists (using guns that he made), and ever since, he has had the Devil at his back and the eternal struggle between good and evil on his mind. Initially, Chantal refuses to speak, afraid of becoming complicit in the crime, but the stranger forces her hand, and soon the whole village knows of the proposed bargain. To Chantal's horror, the town accepts his offer (thanks in large part to the priest, who, eager for the deal to go through, offers a sermon on how the sacrifice of one saved humanity). Now Viscos has only to decide the victim, unless Berta and Chantal, the top choices, can change their minds. Filled with Coelho's trademark mysticism and philosophical anecdotes to illustrate a *point*, the brief tale is made finer by the Kafka- Shirley Jackson-derived motifs—the creepiness of a town eager for a murder offsets the author's tendencies to spiritual pontificating.

A bit more playful than some of Coelho's other efforts, and all the better for it."

Author James Paruk: *Loon Lessons* - June 29

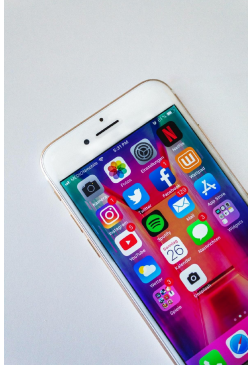


The call of a loon is a familiar summer sound for many Mainers. But how much do you know about these fascinating birds? On Wednesday, June 29 at 6:00, biologist James Paruk will be at the Kennebunk Free Library to discuss loons and his book *Loon Lessons: Uncommon Encounters with the Great Northern Diver*.

James D. Paruk is a Professor in the Biology Department at St. Joseph's College of Maine. He is a senior scientist at the Biodiversity Research Institute's Loon Center for Conservation. Paruk has studied breeding loons in Michigan, Wisconsin, Minnesota, Saskatchewan and Maine and non-breeding loons in California, Louisiana, South Carolina, and Maine. He also spent seven years monitoring the health of a population of loons off the Louisiana coast in the aftermath of the Deepwater Horizon oil spill.

games provided by the library available as well. Open to teens ages 10 and up! If you have any questions, call Miss Emmaline in the Children's Room at (207) 985-2173.

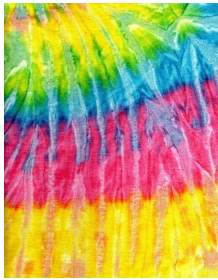
The Dragon Hunter and Treasure Seekers Guild - June 6, 13, & 27

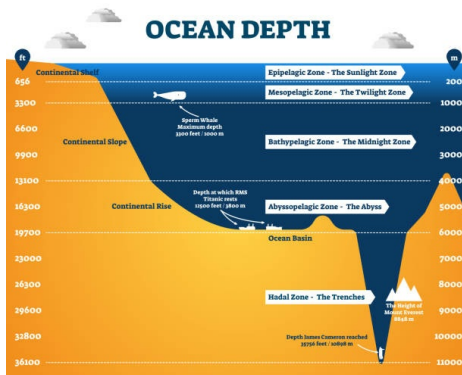
Outdoor Storytimes - June 6, 13, 22, 27

A Message from the Library Director



Kennebunk Free Library is very supportive of staff pursuing professional development opportunities. In April, five of our librarians virtually attended Reading Roundup, a conference that brings together those serving youth in Maine schools and public libraries. In May, Head of Youth Services and Children’s Librarian, Maria Richardson served on a panel at the Maine Library Association’s Annual Conference. “With deep symbiotic roots, there’s an interconnected trust between natural resources and the Indigenous communities who have always cared for the land where they live.” The authors explain how traditional Indigenous planting and harvesting respect the delicate balance of nature from many areas of this country. “Alongside these regional recipes, you will read about the ancient communities whose traditions inspired them.” I am tempted to try many of these dishes: Cheyenne Beef & Sage Soup, Glazed Root Vegetables and Three Sisters Bean Stew. How to instructions: cleaning cactus paddles, trussing a bird and sectioning a rabbit. Includes an informative list of “Native American Pantry” items, opening a whole new world of flavor!

Cyrano – movie produced by Joe Wright, Starring Peter Dinklage, Haley Bennett and Kelvin Harrison, Jr.

This often-told tale of 17th century Paris is reimagined, set to music, peppered with dance, fantastic costumes, and settings in an endearing way. Romantic and sappy, poetic and highly emotional, I found it very enjoyable. Roxanne is breathtakingly lovely and floats like a cloud in her cloak as she rushes to meet her love. Cyrano is feisty, witty, and believable. Christian is handsome, bumbling and ultimately victimized. It ends with a poignant message. (Sigh.)

The 1619 Project: A New Origin Story by Nikole Hannah-Jones

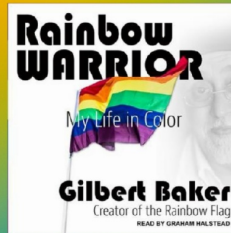
The project consists of eighteen essays recounting history from the perspective of enslaved people and their descendants in America. It starts with the ship *White Lion* arriving in Virginia in 1619 with the first cargo of captive people from Angola, Africa. Originally a journalism project, the book expands upon that scope. It often links events from the past with current events. This author also wrote a children’s book *The 1619 Project: Born on the Water*, cowritten with Renee Watson.
