

Nonfiction Book Group - March 9

Join us on Monday, March 9 at 6:30 p.m. to discuss *Looking for Lorraine* by Imani Perry.

"Perry (May We Forever Stand: A History of the Black National Anthem) explores the art and life of playwright Lorraine Hansberry, who wrote A Raisin in the Sun, about the struggles of an African-American family in mid-century inner-city Chicago, and died at the age of 34 in 1965. 'She was one of those great artists whose life rode the wave of some of the most pivotal and complex moments in American history,' Perry writes. 'World War II, McCarthyism, civil rights. Lorraine was right in the thick of it, trying to make sense of it



all.' Perry also details Hansberry's activities as a socialist; writes with curiosity and empathy about her complex personal life, including her marriage to a white man, Robert Nemiroff, and her romances with women; and examines the influences upon her of her college-educated parents and mentors, friends such as James Baldwin and Nina Simone, and fellow writers such as Langston Hughes, Richard Wright, and Gwendolyn Brooks. Insightful literary analyses of Hansberry's writings fit alongside annotations of excerpts from her diaries and admiring and affectionate declarations about her. This book, 'less a biography than a genre yet to be named-maybe third-person memoir?', is an unusual and exceptional encomium to a brilliant writer and thinker." (Publishers Weekly, vol 265, issue 40)



Adult Book Discussion - March 24

Join us on Tuesday, March 24 at 1:00 p.m. to discuss *This Is How It Always Is* by Laurie Frankel.

"Rosie and Penn Walsh-Adams and their five sons live in a sprawling farmhouse full of chaos, love, and fairy tales. One summer, youngest son Claude begins to wear dresses and bikinis around the house. Rosie and Penn encourage Claude to be himself, and he decides he would be more comfortable as Poppy. While Poppy's brothers and parents accept her, they also all worry about the world she faces. The family deals with fallout from friends and teachers who struggle to understand a nonbinary child. Though their city is generally



accepting, Rosie wants to move the family to somewhere they can all feel safe. The family moves to Seattle and soon confronts new challenges. They acknowledge that Poppy is their daughter's true identity, so is there any need to tell her new friends that she used to be Claude? The novel follows family members individually as they struggle with their own secrets and histories. Inspired by her own daughter's transition, Frankel tells Poppy's story with compassion and humor." (Booklist, vol 113, number 7, p28)

Author Steve Hrehovcik - March 30

With persistence, patience and pluck, Kennebunk writer/artist Steve Hrehovcik reveals how he became an expert on survival in his book *Rebel Without A Clue - A Way-Off Broadway Memoir*. Blending a candid confessional with a sense of humor, Hrehovcik describes his turbulent, often farcical, journey in a desperate search for a career in the theater. Hrehovcik makes a presentation about his book at the Kennebunk Free Library on Monday, March 30 at 6:00 p.m.



Never giving up, his story also reveals how he managed to carry on with some semblance of dignity and achieve a few surprising triumphs along the way - most important, a marriage of 55 years, three remarkable children and a wonderful grandson. At the end of each chapter Hrehovcik includes a cartoon drawing, adding fun to the theme of his story.

In addition to reading from his book and showing the cartoons, Hrehovcik discusses some of the advantages of self-publishing as part of his presentation.

It's tax season again at KFL! This year, like last year, the federal 1040A and 1040

EZ forms have all been combined into one 1040 form. The 1040 forms and booklets have arrived at the library and will be available at the adult circulation desk. As in recent years, we will not be receiving any state forms. Library staff will be more than welcome to help you print any forms from the IRS or state website for just \$.10 per page. We can also provide you with instructions for ordering forms to be mailed to you directly.



If you need some help preparing your taxes, we will once again be hosting AARP Tax Aides every

Thursday from 9:30 a.m. to 12:00 p.m. The first session this year will be held on February 6, with the program running through April 9. People will be seen on a first-come, first-served basis only. We will have a sign-up sheet available in the lobby when the library doors open at 9:30.

So let's talk about the wait.... Unfortunately, because of insurance regulations, we are unable to allow anyone into the library before we open, regardless of how cold, snowy, or miserable it is outside. We would encourage you to come close to opening time and wait for your appointment inside the library. The heroic AARP volunteers have been great about staying until everyone has been seen. We will have hot chocolate, marshmallows, and snacks available, a fire blazing in the fireplace, and plenty of reading material. All-in-all it will be a far more pleasant wait than standing outside in the snow before we open.

March Artist: The New School and the School Around Us

We are pleased to announce our March 2 to 31, 2020 exhibit of the artwork of students of The New School in Kennebunk and The School Around Us in Arundel. The show features pieces of different media; all created by students ages 5 to 18. The public is invited to view the exhibit during regular library hours when the gallery is not in use for library programs.

The New School is an independent democratic high school where students are encouraged and supported to find their voice, pursue their passions, and become lifelong learners. Students actively participate in creating curriculum, connecting to their community, and engaging in real-world learning opportunities. Students at The New School are creative and informed thinkers who are stewards of our world. In 2016, The New School was featured in a one-school art show at Full Circle Gallery in Biddeford and in 2017, at The Brick Store Museum in Kennebunk. This is the third consecutive year that these schools have exhibited at KFL.



The School Around Us is a holistic learning community for students ages 5-14. Holistic education is a philosophy of education based on the premise that each person finds identity, meaning, and purpose in life through connections to the community, the natural world, and humanitarian values such as compassion and peace. We love that we are small enough that each student can feel valued for who they are and shine brightly in this world. The School Around Us celebrates its 50th anniversary in 2020, making it one of the oldest independent schools of this type in the country.

"The arts are an important part of the curriculum at TNS and SAU fueling imagination and personal expression, contributing to the development of a sense of self, supporting close observation of the world and the ability to fuse emotion and intellect, and building self-confidence and the ability to connect with an audience. Art at these schools is integrated into much of what is done rather than as separate subject. We find that the balance between academic pursuits and artistic expression meets our belief in holistic education."



choose to delete specific items from the list, to delete the entire list, or to opt out at any time.
