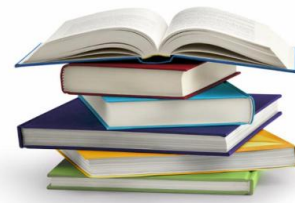

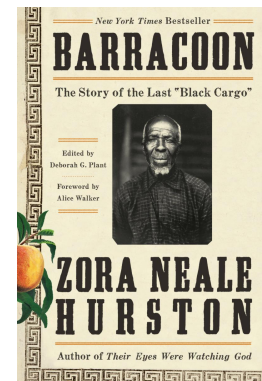

## Nonfiction Book Group - May 13

Join us on Monday, May 13 at 6:30 p.m. to discuss *Barracoön* by Zora Neale Hurston.

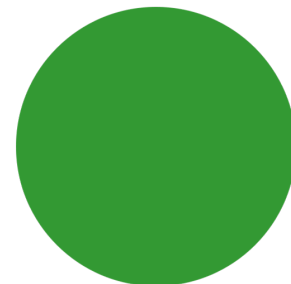
"This previously unpublished manuscript from Hurston (1891-1960) is a remarkable account of the life of Kossola, also known as Cudjo Lewis, the last survivor of the last American slave ship. Before writing *Their Eyes Were Watching God*, Hurston was working as an anthropologist in 1927 when she traveled to Plateau, Ala., to interview 86-year-old Kossola. Returning to Plateau in 1931 for three months, Hurston documented Kossola's life story in this short manuscript, whose brevity disguises its richness and depth. Consisting primarily of transcriptions from their conversations, Kossola recalls his capture in Africa, the Middle Passage, his five and a half years as a slave, the Civil War, the struggles following Emancipation, and the terrors after Reconstruction (his son was killed by a deputy sheriff in 1902). Kossola was 19 years old when he was sold into slavery; thus, his accounts of folkways and traditions (e.g., the decapitated heads hanging from the belts of the Dahomian warriors who captured him) offer more graphic and personal immediacy than other surviving narratives of the slave trade, like those of Equiano or Gronniosaw, who were small children at the time of their capture. While Hurston acknowledges that her account "makes no attempt to be a scientific document, but on the whole is rather accurate," Kossola's story-in the vernacular of his own words-is an invaluable addition to American social, cultural, and political history." (Publishers Weekly, vol 265, issue 13, p)

The library has a limited number of ukuleles available. Please let us know if you will need to borrow one. We will do our best to accommodate you.

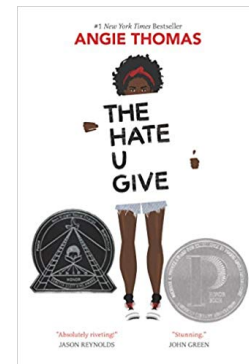

## Adult Book Discussion - May 28

Join us on Tuesday, May 28 at 1:00 to discuss *The Hate U Give* by Angie Thomas.

"Sixteen-year-old Starr lives in two very different worlds: one is her home in a poor black urban neighborhood; the other is the tony suburban prep school she attends and the white boy she dates there. Her bifurcated life changes dramatically when she is the only witness to the unprovoked police shooting of her unarmed friend Khalil and is challenged to speak out-though with trepidation-about the injustices being done in the event's wake. As the case becomes national news, violence erupts in her neighborhood, and Starr finds herself and her family caught in the middle. Difficulties are exacerbated by their encounters with the local drug lord for whom Khalil was dealing to earn money for his impoverished family. If there is to be hope for change, Starr comes to realize, it must be through the exercise of her voice, even if it puts her and her family in harm's way. Thomas' debut, both a searing indictment of injustice and a clear-eyed, dramatic examination of the complexities of race in America, invites deep thoughts about our social fabric, ethics, morality, and justice. Beautifully written in Starr's authentic first-person voice, this is a marvel of verisimilitude as it insightfully examines two worlds in collision. An inarguably important book that demands the widest possible readership." (Booklist, vol 113, number 8, p48)

## Peter Pan Party - May 16

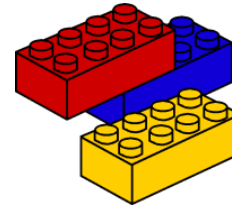

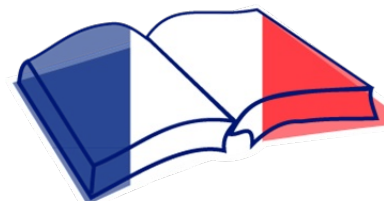

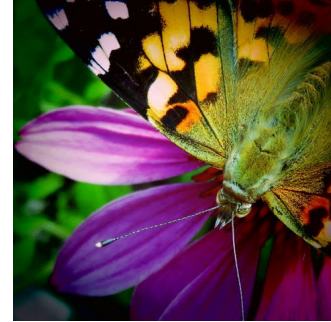

After a windy, cold winter, our road signs were looking pretty scruffy. Thank you to the Friends of KFL, who provided the funding to buy two new sign boards!

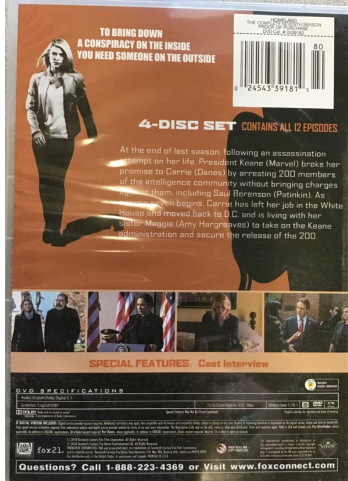

## Bootlegs

You may occasionally see a 50 person waiting list on the newest season of your favorite TV show, but notice that only one library has a copy. Sometimes there is a good reason for this. Heartland Season 11, for example, was released in Canada long before it was released in the US. Because the series is so popular at this library, we chose to purchase the DVD from Canada. Other libraries chose to wait for the US release. Sometimes, though, it means that the one copy in the system is a bootleg. More and more, bootleg copies of popular movies and TV series are showing up in Amazon. Many of them are very well done, making it difficult to identify it as a fake. Here's a donation we received of Homeland Season 7, which has not been released yet.





It looks real. It has everything that you would expect to see on a legitimate DVD. How did we know it was a bootleg? One librarian noticed the warning on the back: "THESE DESCS ARE COPY PROTECTED." If "discs" had not been misspelled, it would be indistinguishable from a real copy.



There are some things you can do to protect yourself. One of the simplest is to check for official release dates on your favorites. In some cases, Amazon is offering the DVD as a preorder but has copies for sale further down the page. That's a good indication that those are fakes. Here are some other tips: <https://www.wikihow.com/Spot-Fake-DVDs>.

Librarians will never knowingly add a bootleg DVD to a collection. The Minerva consortium has rules against it. Still, mistakes happen. If it seems too good to be true that the newest season is out so soon, it probably is. If you have any questions about the legitimacy of an item in Minerva, whether we own it or not, give us a call anytime.
