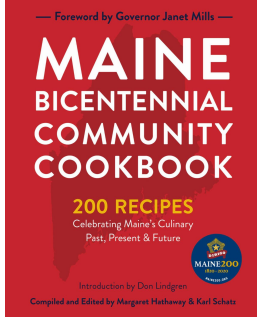
Reader's Choice Book Club will meet on Monday, November 7 at 2:00 p.m. in the Walker Room. This month's theme will be: Laughter & Tears.

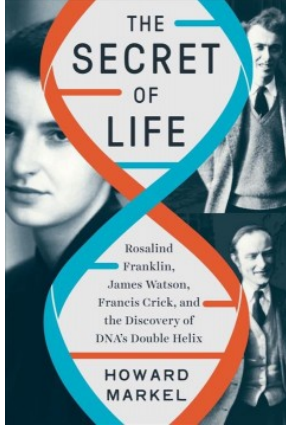

## Nonfiction Book Group - November 14

Join us on Monday, November 14 at 6:30 p.m. to discuss *The Secret of Life* by Howard Markel.

One of the greatest scientific discoveries of the 20th century was also the scientific heist of the century, according to this action-packed history. Historian Markel (*The Kelloggs*) recreates the 1953 elucidation of DNA's structure by Cambridge University's James Watson and Francis Crick and their rivalry with the King's College team of Rosalind Franklin and Maurice Wilkins. While for decades history books have attributed the



discovery to Watson and Crick, it really wasn't so simple, Markel writes—their discovery was based on Franklin's research that was 'borrowed' by Watson. Markel skillfully explains the knotty science behind the breakthrough and highlights the clash of outsize personalities: the mercurial, loudmouthed physicist Crick; the nerdy, manipulative molecular biologist Watson; the prickly X-ray crystallographer Franklin; the 'high-strung, bumbling' biophysicist Wilkins; and the world-renowned chemist Linus Pauling (who threatened to beat them all). Markel decries Watson and Crick's secret appropriation of Franklin's X-ray data as 'one of the most egregious rip-offs in scientific history' and the culmination of her "oppression" by 'white, entitled, English academic lords.' His tone sometimes feels overblown, but his tart, sharp-eyed prose—'Chargaff was

unimpressed by Crick's nonstop blathering, not to mention Watson's Greek chorus of eye-bulging and snorting'—saves the day. This wonderfully evocative tale sings. (Publishers Weekly, vol 268, issue 32)

## Author Andy Young - November 30



On Wednesday, November 30 at 6:00, author and humorist Andy Young will be at the Kennebunk Free Library to discuss his latest book: *Work(s) In Progress*.

“Andy Young has written essays that have been published in nearly a dozen different newspapers in New England. And incredibly, nearly a quarter of those publications are still in business!

An English teacher at Kennebunk High School for the past 20 years, Young is a product of the University of Connecticut, where he compiled one of the lowest grade point averages of anyone who actually graduated (in only five years!) from that elite institution of higher learning.

Prior to moving to Maine, Young worked as a radio play-by-play announcer for several minor league baseball and hockey teams, and in between those jobs he coached high school baseball, basketball, and soccer; tutored homebound students in algebra; washed dishes, cut grass, picked apples, dug irrigation ditches, sold shoes, and probably did several other jobs that he’s forgotten about.

When he’s not working or sleeping, Andy likes to read, write, and bike, though he rarely tries doing all three at the same time. He and his three children live in Cumberland.”

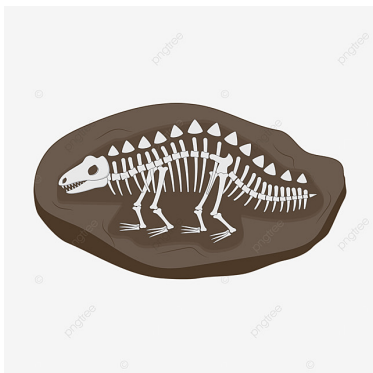
### Beadcraft - November 2

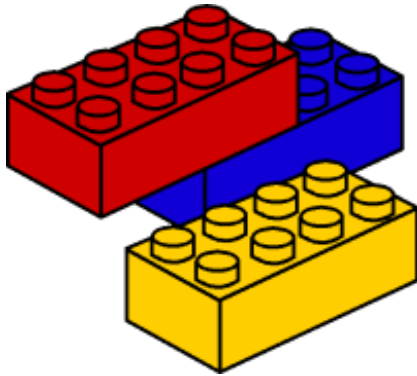

The Kennebunk Free Library announces its next Speers Gallery exhibit, "Lone Scapes" by Andrea Roth Kimmich, featuring acrylic and oil paintings on wood custom selected for each piece.

The exhibit runs from November 1-30, and the public is invited to an artist's reception on Tuesday, November 8 from 3-6 pm. Andrea is a trained classical pianist, with advanced studies in film and photography. ### Kat, Library Assistant

*How to Cook Everything fast* by Mark Bittman

Mark Bittman has done it again, put together a down to earth, practical and fresh group of recipes. Several variations are included with each recipe and I appreciate the options. The Introduction sets the tone "Time to Cook – The Fast Kitchen" with helpful ideas to make food preparation fit into a busy family lifestyle. For the

beginner, this book offers wonderful advice for what staples to keep on hand and equipment choices to make. There are many recipes for chicken, beans and tofu. We really enjoyed my version of “Corn Salad with Garlic Chicken”. I hope to make “Warm Three-Bean Potato Salad”, “Seared Porkchops with Apples and Onions”, and “Bok Choy Pancake with Soy Dipping Sauce”. This was just what I needed to freshen up our menu planning.

*Where the Crawdads Sing* - directed by Olivia Newman, screenplay by Lucy Alibar, produced by Reese Witherspoon and Lauren Neustadter

So many people read this book when it first came out and again as the movie was to be released, there were long hold lists. I loved the book: the story of a young girl, Kiya, abandoned by her parents in the bayou of North Carolina. Kiya manages to survive and even thrive surrounded by the swamp. She develops as a naturalist and artist, experiences being a public outcast and romance. The movie switched events around, and we learn of the murder from the start. The nature shots are wonderful, and the story is told well. I enjoyed the movie almost as much as the book.

#### *Craft Kit 12 Watercolor Pencil Art*

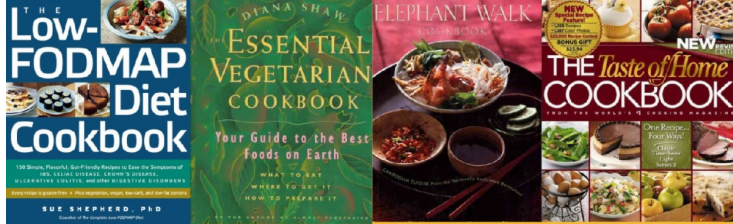
This was a fun activity for me and my 5-year-old granddaughter. You draw with the pencils on the extra heavy watercolor paper and then using a brush and water, create a watercolor design. Once I used the water, I went back and used more pencil and more water. Easy to do and provides satisfying results.
