## Adult Programs

### Genealogy Group - October 5

In May 2017, Corrine Smith found her mother's stash of more than 100 letters from 16 servicemen she had corresponded with in 1944 and 1945. Corrine began to trace the soldiers' family trees with one goal in mind: to return the letters in person to their children. Join us on Saturday, October 5 at 10:00 a.m. for Corrine's presentation which links history and genealogy to present-day research and diligence. It revisits a time that we may not want to forget. And it may prompt others to wonder for themselves what treasures lurk in their own old family boxes and how they can share the information with others.



Corrine H. Smith is a writer who is originally from Lancaster County, Pennsylvania. She served for several years on the board of the Blair County Genealogical Society in Altoona, PA. Her first book was a self-published family history titled *From Saxony to the Lehigh Valley: The Descendants of Ludwig Hossfeld* (1992). Since then she has written several books about American author Henry David Thoreau. She is a former librarian and lives in Gardner, MA.

## Heart and Home Book Club - October 7

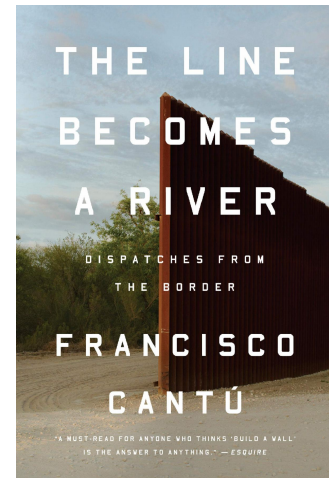

## Nonfiction Book Group - October 7

Join us on Monday, October 7 at 6:30 p.m. to discuss *The Line Becomes a River* by Francisco Cantú.

Cantú uses a series of vignettes to recount his experiences as a U.S. Border Patrol agent. Stories of catching migrants and retrieving dead bodies are interspersed with interludes that provide historical context to the border conflict. Throughout his time as an agent, Cantú is plagued by unsettling dreams and struggles to justify his work to his mother, who is proud of her Mexican heritage and skeptical of the Border Patrol. After Cantú leaves the Border Patrol he befriends José, an undocumented immigrant who has been living and working in the United States for more than 30 years. José visits his dying mother in Mexico and finds that he cannot return to his family and life in the United States. Cantú assists José's family with the legal proceedings, while musing on the juxtaposition between border agents and those affected by the policies that they enforce. José also tells his side of the story, emphasizing his reasons for wanting to remain in America. VERDICT A personal, unguarded look at border life from the perspective of a migrant and agent, recommended for those wishing to gain a deeper understanding of current events. (Library Journal, vol 143, issue 2, p116)

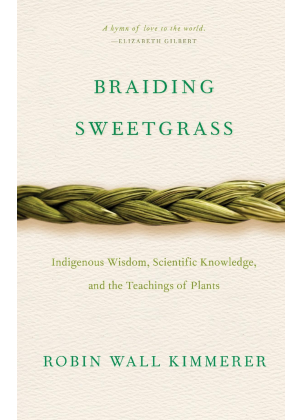
## Indigenous Reads - October 15 (at KFL)

On October 15, we will discuss *Braiding Sweetgrass* by Robin Wall Kimmerer at the Kennebunk Free Library; on November 19, we will discuss *Ceremony* by Leslie Marmon Silko at the Wells Public Library; and on December 17, we will discuss *The Heartbeat of Wounded Knee* by David Truer at the Kennebunk Free Library.

In addition to the book selections, there will be a screening of the documentary *Dawnland* at the Wells Public Library on Thursday, November 21 at 6:00 p.m.

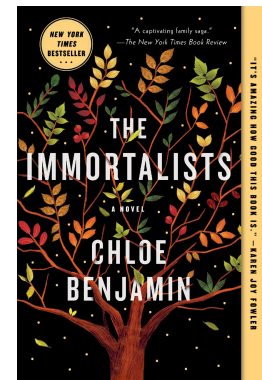

## Adult Book Discussion - October 22

Join us on Tuesday, October 22 at 1:00 p.m. to discuss *The Immortalists* by Chloe Benjamin.

"Restless during the seismic summer of 1969 on New York's Lower East Side, the four Gold siblings, descendants of Jews who fled violent persecution overseas, sneak off to see a fortune-teller, who tells them each, separately, the date of his or her death. So begins Benjamin's bewitching and provocative second novel (following *The Anatomy of Dreams*, 2014). Each character's story is saturated with paradox in this delving family saga laced with history and science and a heart-pounding inquiry into self, inheritance, fate, and the mind-body connection. At 16, Simon runs away to San Francisco, comes out as gay, and discovers his gift for dance just as AIDS begins its shattering assault. Magician Klara calls herself the Immortalist. Daniel is a military doctor; scientist Varya is conducting a longevity study with rhesus monkeys. All are afflicted by the poison of prophecy. Aligned in her artistic command, imagination, and deep curiosity about the human condition with Nicole Krauss, Dara Horn, and Stacey D'Erasmus, Benjamin asks what we want out of life. Duration? Success? Meaning? Who do we live for? Do our genes determine our path? How does trauma alter us? Benjamin has created mesmerizing characters and richly suspenseful predicaments in this profound and glimmering novel of death's ever-shocking inevitability and life's wondrously persistent whirl of chance and destiny." 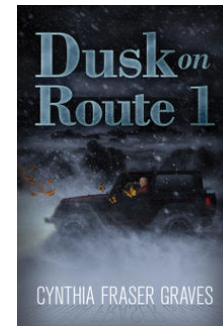

## The Role of Social Media in the Arab Spring - October 26

The Camden Conference presents Kathleen Howard Sutherland at the Kennebunk Free Library on Saturday, October 26 at 2:00 p.m. to discuss the role of social media in the Arab Spring.



"I am going down on January 25<sup>th</sup> and will say no to corruption, no to this regime...I, a girl, am going down to Tahrir Square, and I will stand alone. And I'll hold up a banner. Perhaps people will show some honor." With this call posted on video, a young Egyptian woman helped spark a remarkable mass uprising, cutting across classes and sectors of the society, against a 30 year old regime in early 2011. This call illustrated the power of modern technology, in this case social media, to activate a popular uprising against a regime. Sutherland will be discussing the various forms of media that were used to promote political action on the streets against authoritarian regimes across the Middle East. The protests succeeded in effecting regime change in some cases, but resulted in further repression in other cases. Regimes' use of social media in their reactions to the popular uprisings also reflects the new power of modern technology and the varied users' skill in employing it.

Kathleen Howard Sutherland is Associate Professor Emeritus of Political Science and Women's Studies at Bowling Green State University in Ohio (BGSU) specializing in Middle East Studies. She was born and raised in Cairo, Egypt, and spent over 35 years in Egypt in different eras. She received her PhD in Middle East Studies and Political Science from Indiana University, Bloomington, Indiana. She taught at the American University in Cairo, the city of her birth and long time residence, before going to BGSU. Kathleen's publications focus on the role of women in public life in Egypt and Morocco, the latter of which was supported by a Fulbright Fellowship in Morocco, and visited Iraq in 1985 as a guest of the Iraqi Federation of Women as part of the U.S. delegation to the Iraqi Federation's Conference on Women. Kathleen interviewed Afghan women refugees in Peshawar, Pakistan in 1985. She joined the OLLI faculty in 2005 and has taught courses on the Middle East, Islam, women revolutionaries in the Middle East, refugees and sub Saharan Africa. She was President of the World Affairs Council of Maine from 2016 to 2019 and

continues serving on its Board of Directors. Kathleen and her husband, John Sutherland, also on the OLLI faculty, live in Portland, ME.

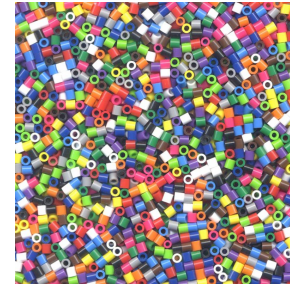

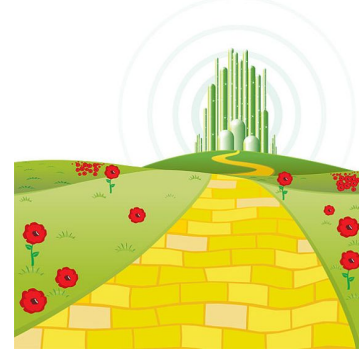

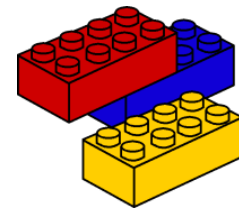

This watermedia painting class has been painting together for up to eight years. It is a group made up of all different abilities and personalities. It is primarily a watercolor class (but also includes other water media of acrylics, gouache and casein) that covers a large variety of subject matter and techniques.

In that respect we are a family of painters helping each other to grow and expand our lives on "a painterly journey."
