On Monday, September 13, at 2:00 p.m., our theme will be: *That book you've been meaning to read!*


On Monday, October 4, at 2:00 p.m., our theme will be: Illustrated Books

Nonfiction Book Group - September 13

Join us on Monday, September 13 at 6:30 p.m. to discuss *Extra Life: A Short History of Living Longer* by Steven Johnson. The discussion will be held in person at the library, outside if weather permits. Masks are required.

"Since the early 20th century, the statistical human lifespan has doubled—an increase of 20,000 days. This is the largest, most widespread, and most rapid lifespan increase in human history. With



this latest work, best-selling author Johnson (Where Good Ideas Come From) attempts to explain the significant factors causing increased life spans and to broaden readers' understanding of those factors. Johnson looks at seven wide-ranging categories: vaccines and variolation; the use of data; pasteurization and chlorination; testing; antibiotics; safety; and improvements in food availability. In each case, he points out the range of people, events, and seemingly unrelated disciplines that had to collaborate in order for lifespanincreasing innovations to become practical and widely adopted, like Sir Alexander Fleming's discovery of penicillin. Blending scientific examples with medical discoveries, the narrative remains engaging and accessible from chapter to chapter, especially where Johnson effectively describes how illnesses that were once

considered terminal have become manageable conditions. The thoroughly documented book includes numerous charts and an extensive index. VERDICT Johnson , as in his previous works, digs into his subject to highlight new connections and interrelated facts that produce fascinating and sometimes unexpected insights. A smoothly written book of medical wonder that pays specific attention to racial disparities in health care." (Library Journal, vol 146, issue 4, p78)

Author Anne B. Gass will discuss her latest book We Demand: The Suffrage Road Trip on Monday, September 27, 2021 at 6:00 at the Kennebunk Free Library.


Anne B. Gass is an independent historian and the author of *We Demand: The Suffrage Road Trip*, based on the true story of an epic crosscountry journey for women's voting rights. Her first book was *Voting Down the Rose: Florence Brooks Whitehouse and Maine's Fight for Woman*

Suffrage, about her great-grandmother. Gass is a frequent lecturer on suffrage history, and is active in promoting women's history and equality through her work with groups such as the Maine Suffrage Centennial Collaborative and the Permanent Commission on the Status of Women in Maine.

"By the Frenchman who, with Sartre, shares a leading position in European literature, this is a work of considerable significance and stature, distinguished by its clarity, its composure, and above all, its scrupulous classicism. The story focuses on the outbreak of plague in Oran in the year 194-, as it reaches epidemic proportions. The author traces the crescendo of human emotions from panic to the almost unendurable agony of isolation and death. The argument extends beyond the physical impact of the plague into metaphysical terrain with the realization that each one of us carries within us the plague of injustice, of inhumanity...Distinguished by the precision, the purity of

its writing, the dignity of its presentation. It may command critical rather than popular attention." (Kirkus Reviews, August 1, 1948)

Both of these programs will be paused for the month of September. Please keep an eye out for our October programs, filled with new and exciting activities!


Teen Dungeons and Dragons and Magic the Gathering


Speers Gallery

Speers Gallery Exhibits Return

The Kennebunk Free Library announces its September 2021 "Maine Coast Scenery" exhibition of oil paintings created by Ernest Pevny. The public is invited to view the exhibit in the Speers Gallery starting September 1st during regular library hours when the gallery is not in use for library programs.

Mr. Pevny began painting at the age of five in his homeland, Bratislava, Slovak Republic (formerly known as Czechoslovakia). He received his formal art training from prominent Slovak artist, Michael Tilner. He is also a medical doctor and a classically trained pianist.

The beauty of nature provides inspiration for his landscape and still life paintings. All of his art work is done on location en plein air. Mr. Pevny's technique is early impressionist. His earlier works included portraits.

Catch Your Breath Writing Poignant Poetry by Laura Purdie Salas

This little Young Adult book has page after page of wonderful tips and ideas to help you write down the poetry running through your head and written down on scraps of paper. Reviews various forms of poems and encourages habits that will contribute to your creativity.

Hour of the Witch by Chris Bohjalian

Mary Deerfield, age 24, arrives in Boston from England in 1662. Her parents see her

"safely" married to an older widower. Unfortunately, sweet, pious, innocent Mary finds herself in an abusive marriage and petitions the "Court of Assistance" for a divorce. Big mistake.

The Doctors Blackwell by Janice P. Nimura

"How two pioneering sisters brought medicine to women - and women to medicine." The subtitle sets the tone for the book, which is a bit dry and factual. Elizabeth became the first woman in America to receive an M.D. in 1849. Her sister, Emily, soon earned her own M.D. If this subject and the times interest you, this would be a good read for you.
