Library Construction Update



The latest news on the renovation and expansion of the Holyoke Public Library is all positive. We are currently in the final stage of completion. As we enter this final phase of construction. PROGRESS is highly

visible no matter where you look – inside and out.

Anyone who drives past the building's Chestnut Street facade after dark, will be dazzled by a gleaming glass enclosed beacon of light, a brilliant addition to the neighborhood as well as a signal that points the way to the many reports we are hearing of planned construction and revitalization that is still to come, for the area.

Amazing progress has also taken place on the exterior, including the landscaping of the areas immediately surrounding the building. Site work has included the installation of granite curbing,



new sidewalks, necessary roadwork, and handicapped access areas. With the completion of major site work, work crews have moved across Chestnut Street to complete work on the parking lot, where site lighting, parking and landscaping have already been completed. Once all of the work on the building and grounds is completed, the final look is certain to be spectacular!



The completion of the project and our actual move into the building is not that far off at this time. It is a day that the entire city has been waiting for and a day that will be treasured and long remembered by

everyone involved.



New Renovated and Expanded Library Floor Plan




Ground Level – New front entrance on Chestnut Street (250 Chestnut Street) As you enter the first set of doors to the library, on the right you will find the Community Meeting Room and on the left is the Intelligent Return System (Book Return or Book Drop).

Through the second set of doors is the Information Desk on your left and Self Check Out units on the right.

Pass the Information Desk, on the right are the public restrooms and elevator. On the left, are the new Young Adult (Teens) Area and the Browsing Area (New Books and Audio-Visual – Recorded Books, CDs, DVDs)

Up the stairs (half flight up to original 1st Floor) you will find a new reading area (where circulation desk used to be) under new skylights. To the left is the new Library Board Conference Room and the Adult Fiction Collection. To the right are the Large Print, Paperbacks, Classics and Spanish Collections, and the new Magazines & Newspaper Room (The Ernie Ross Periodical Room).


The original wooden staircases on the 1st Floor, will take you to the 3rd Floor, where you will find the new Computer Room and the Holyoke History Room.



From the original 1^{st} Floor, going up a half flight on the new staircases towards the new portion of the building, you will enter the Children's Room, 2^{nd} Floor.

Once in the Children's Room, you will find sections dedicated to different age groups from Toddlers (with the Board Book Collection and games) to Sixth Graders (with Chapter Books and Reference Collections). On the left you will see the Children's Activities Room and Family Restrooms. In the middle are the Computers for Children.

Going down the original wooden staircases, will bring you back to the new reading area on the 1st Floor.

Once you are out of the Children's Room, half flight up towards the original building, you will find a new small Conference Room, the Holyoke History Room and the new Computer Room with Classroom, 3^{rd} Floor.

From the Children's Room, 2^{nd} Floor, going up a half flight towards the new portion of the building, will take you to the Reference and Adult Nonfiction Room – the highest portion of the Library, 4^{th} Floor. Here you will find four new Quiet Study Rooms, two at each end of the room.

In the Basement Level of the original building are the Offices, Technical Services, Historical Collection Compact Shelves, Staff Room, Staff Restrooms, Custodian Area, Storage and the Mechanical, Electrical & Network Rooms.



A LIBRARY FOR THE 21ST CENTURY: HOLYOKE PUBLIC LIBRARY BUILDING

In a few weeks local residents will be able to enjoy the advantages of the newest library in the Commonwealth with the opening of the renovated and expanded Holyoke Public Library.

The renovated portion of the Library, with approximately 18,612 square feet, is complimented by the spectacular expansion which provides an additional 19,064 square feet, for a total of 37,676 square feet of dedicated, usable, functional space including public areas, staff workrooms, offices, conference rooms and essential space for electronics and other mechanical requirements.

The entire building has been designed and constructed to reduce greenhouse gas emissions, meet the latest ADA requirements, exceed the goal of attaining LEED certification, and meet or surpass Green Building Guidelines.

The goal for the Library project has been to provide a healthy, safe, comfortable and welcoming environment for patrons and employees, while at the same time, being flexible enough to adapt to and incorporate future changes and new opportunities for service.

PROFILE OF A 21ST CENTURY LIBRARY

The following information is intended as a brief introduction of what you will find in YOUR new Holyoke Public Library.

A FLEXIBLE AND HEALTHY ENVIRONMENT for patrons and staff.

HVAC SYSTEMS designed to provide superior heating and cooling, as well as humidity and air flow controls that exceed ASHRAE requirements.

EFFICIENT LIGHTING incorporating sensors that harvest daylight and reduce the need for artificial lighting by at least 25%.

SUSTAINABILITY – design and construction has taken into account long term and life cycle issues in making the project a showcase and benchmark for future projects.

MAINTENANCE - All systems have been planned for lowest possible life cycle costs.

WATER EFFICIENCY – Designed to reduce water usage by a minimum of 30%.

MEETING ROOMS – Meeting and Conference Rooms for groups of ten to 100 are equipped with occupancy sensors, for lighting and CO2 sensors for ventilation. The largest meeting room also has a separate "After Hours" entrance.

QUIET STUDY ROOMS – These rooms have been provided for concentrated research or other study requirements.

OFFICES AND WORK SPACE – Work areas are open, however privacy and/or interview areas have also been included. **COLLECTION** - Space has been provided to accommodate the Library's current collection with allowances made for a 20-year growth projection.

PUBLIC SPACE – The new Library has generous public space throughout the building with many comfortable reading areas, research space, computer labs, etc.

CHILDREN'S ROOM – A generous Children's Room has been designed with separate areas for story hours, crafts, games and a greatly enlarged collection of children's reading materials.

REFERENCE –The reference area has its own reference desk, an enlarged collection of reference materials, and space for patrons to pursue research on their own projects.

PERIODICAL ROOM – Patrons will find an enlarged collection of the latest magazines as well as a selection of daily and weekly newspapers in the new Ernie Ross Memorial Room.

YOUNG ADULT AREA – A separate room has been created to meet the special needs and interests of teen agers and other young adults.

INFORMATION DESK – The new Information Desk has been designed to allow for electronic processing of books, CDs, DVDs and other materials by traditional processing or convenient "Self Checkout".

Jay was very knowledgeable and proud of Puerto Rican culture and music and was a very enthusiastic Boricua. He was born in Barrio Espino, de San Lorenzo, where he died surrounded by his family and friends that loved him dearly

A magical series of special events for children will highlight the Library's "Super Special Saturdays" program planned by the staff of the Library's Children's Department

to commemorate the completion of our spectacular new Library building. Starting Saturday, October 5, the Library will host a series of programs with a strong focus on magic. Each Saturday, at 1:00 PM, a different guest performer will present a new and different program.



Opening the series will be Magician Ed Popielarczyk on October 5. The following Saturday, October 12, Greg McAdams and his dog Axel will offer a "Save Halloween" presentation. October 19 has been reserved for "Marvelous Marv's Science Show," and on October 26, the Pumpernickel Puppets will present their latest fun-filled show "Sir George and the Dragon."

On November 2, the audience will see bubbles in a new light as Jeff Boyer presents his unique ^O Bubble Show. The final presentation in the series will be "A Magical Afternoon" with magician,

Scott Jameson.

The Children's Department has also arranged for several other exciting "Super Special Saturdays" programs. Saturday, November 16, the library will present artist Paul Merklein in two programs. The first is entitled "Super Hero's for Kids and Families" at 10:30 AM. In the second program, scheduled for 1:00 PM, Mr. Merklein will teach youngsters how to draw "Super Hero's for Teens and Tweens."

Other events, planned for December, include "Rae Griffiths' Animal Program" at 1:00 PM on December 7, and on December 14,"Folktales" with Eshu Bumpus is scheduled at 1:00 PM. On December 21, artist Paul Merklein will return for two special events; "Holiday Drawing" at 10:30 AM, and a "Banned Books for Teens and Tweens" presentation at 1:00 PM.

"MAD SCIENCE" PROGRAM ANNOUNCED FOR NEW HOLYOKE PUBLIC LIBRARY

Maria G. Pagan, Director of the Holyoke Public Library, has announced that the first program to be offered in the Library's new Children's Room will be a six- week "Mad Science" presentation designed to be both entertaining and informative in its appeal to the Library's youngest patrons. The program will



begin on Thursday October 10, and will run for six weeks on Thursday afternoons at 4:00 PM. Each week's program will run approximately one hour. This program has been created specifically for youngsters in the kindergarten through sixth grade age group, and will provide them with an opportunity to learn and create safe and exciting, funthemed science experiments.



Enrollment in the "Mad Science" program is free and all materials will be provided by the library without charge. Due to space limitations, the program will be strictly limited to the first 25 participants who register


