




May Art at the Library

Local History



Travelling Back to 1944

Following Librarian M. Addie Holden's retirement from the Gale Free Library in 1943, the Damon Memorial Board of Trustees elected to have a representative of the State Division of Public Libraries, a part of the Massachusetts Department of Education, survey the Library for the

benefit of the Town, Trustees, and new Librarian, Amy L. Snow. What follows, and will continue to be presented in future issues of the "Bookmark" until complete, is the submitted report, written by Library Adviser E. Louise Jones and dated April 13, 1944. Note that the format of the report has been altered slightly to improve readability, and a few non-essential lines have been omitted.



The following is a continuation of the Massachusetts report. Please see the March and April editions of "The Bookmark" for the first and second installments.

Juvenile Book Collection. The juvenile collection is exceedingly small and in size does not bear the proper relation to the adult book stock. Much of the material was wornout [sic]. There were many cheap series (probably gifts) and many were by old authors who were not standard authors for children and whose books are out-dated [sic] anyway. The aforesaid books have been discarded. Standard books and those worth binding were set aside for that purpose. There is no mark on the outside to indicate which are children's books.

Recommendations. It is recommended that as a permanent practice one-third of the book money be spent for children's books. Temporarily a larger proportion should be spent on children's books . . . to bring the collection up to a satisfactory level, both as to quality and quantity. The State Certificate Reading Lists should be checked for titles [that] the library does not own at present, and buying them should be as heavy as funds will permit. The children's books should be marked with a J on the outside for fiction, and J with the classification number for non-fiction. The library can borrow a large collection of children's books from the Division of Public Libraries to help out their present needs.

Author Spotlight Susan Meissner

Susan Meissner is an American author, columnist, and the former editor of a weekly newspaper. She was born in 1961 and raised in San Diego. She currently resides in Southern California with her family.

This Author Spotlight was written by Judy from Circulation.

Only the Beautiful (2023) is a compelling and haunting historical fiction book about eugenics, reproductive rights, and forced sterilization. There is a WWII story line, but it is primarily a book about being a woman, motherhood, and the deep bonds of family ties.

The Nature of Fragile Things (2021) is a historical fiction book about the devastating San Francisco earthquake of 1906. This book explores the bonds of friendship. The three women in the story exhibit resiliency, resolve, and a belief that love can overcome fear.

The Last Year of the War (2019) is a WWII story told from the perspective of two teenage girls in America whose parents are immigrants from Germany and Japan. When the war breaks, out the families are sent to an internment camp in Texas. The girls meet at the camp and become best friends, but the hardship of war separates them and threatens their friendship.

The novel **As Bright as Heaven** (2018) is a work of historical fiction. Philadelphia seems bright with promise, despite its young men going to fight in WWI, until the onset of the Great Influenza (1918-1920), which was commonly called the Spanish Flu. This flu pandemic infected an estimated 500 million people globally with an estimated death toll of 25-50 million. The Bright family finds the courage and resolve to survive despite losing loved ones.
