Selectman Candidates

The Town of Bow is governed by a five member Board of Selectmen elected to staggered three year terms. Per the provisions of NH RSA 41:8, "the selectmen shall manage the prudential affairs of the town and perform the duties by law prescribed."

The Town operates under the traditional Town Meeting form of government, in that the legislative body is the annual Town Meeting held every March. The Board of Selectmen acts as the executive branch of Town Government and it carries out the policies and laws set forth by the legislative body. The Board also has other specifically assigned roles and powers as set out in State Statutes. The Board of Selectmen in August of 2021 revised the By Laws.

My name is Eleana Colby and I'm running for a seat on the Board of Selectmen. As a 20 year Bow resident who has been active in our community, serving in multiple volunteer roles including PTO President, raising a family here, and wanting to see our town thrive, I understand the need for respect for neighbors, transparency, balanced representation, and fiscal responsibility on the Board.

(Q) How will your skills/background contribute to the position you are running to fill?

I have been fortunate to be a stay-at-home mom for the past four years. Previously, I worked in the automobile industry. My extensive experience in this industry taught me that to get the very best deal, you must do your research and ask questions. As a manager I worked by a code of Listen, Learn, and Lead. I look forward to incorporating this approach within the Board of Selectmen so we can ask the right questions and make educated, ethical decisions on Bow's behalf. Some of the most fulfilling work I have done has been serving the people of Bow. I have proudly served as Little League Coach and President, PTO President and Fundraising Coordinator, and a Paraprofessional in the Special Education Department at Bow High School. I currently serve as a member of the Bow Conservation Subcommittee to protect our natural spaces in town. Teamwork was essential for all of these organizations to run successfully. (Q) If you are elected, what issues or projects are you most interested in addressing in your first year?

Transparency

- Require that all purchasing and leasing of Town land be done by competitive bidding.
- Video Record, and make available to the public, all public meetings of the Selectboard.
- Work with Town Hall to improve the process for responding to Right to Know Requests, within the time frame required by law.

Respect and Representation

- Welcome the community's input and questions.
- Ensure an equitable and inclusive meeting process for all citizens.
- Step up our communication to the public with updates regarding current projects.

Fiscal Responsibility

- Save taxpayers money, explore grant and rebate opportunities available to municipalities.
- Build initiatives with our residents and community priorities in mind.
- Coordinate timing of large projects between Town and School to not overburden the taxpayers.
- Explore the expansion opportunities of our available property tax credits for those over 65 years old, Armed Forces Veterans, and the deaf community.



Bruce Marshall

I am a New Hampshire native, born and raised in Hooksett and have resided in Bow for more than three decades where we have chosen to raise our four children. Our oldest two graduated from Bow High School and have gone on to enjoy successful professional careers following college. My youngest two are in the Elementary and Memorial Schools. I originally came to Bow for its neighborly qualities, good schools, and low taxes. As a dad I have had the privilege of coaching our children in various sports in town including basketball, football, soccer, and baseball and participating in numerous school events. As a citizen of Bow I have a long history of volunteering in town including everything from, the construction of school trails and sports facilities, maintenance of athletic facilities, being a member of the Planning Board, and participation on various committees. Professionally, I am a civil engineer and an attorney having my law office located in Bow.

(Q) How will your skills/background contribute to the position you are running to fill?

My professional experience includes designing and constructing highways for the NHDOT, representing NHDOT, NHDES and various other agencies as a former assistant attorney general, former owner/operator of a gravel pit in Loudon, former residential contractor, a civil engineering practice and the practice of law. As an attorney practicing in New Hampshire since 1999 I have handled a wide variety of matters, including but not limited to, general litigation, business law, real estate development, administrative law, construction, as well as providing legal services to certain New Hampshire town boards from time to time.

As a sitting Selectman since March of 2020, I have helped guide the Town through COVID, the purchase of the former Bow Youth Center, furthering the opportunity for the much needed improvements to local cell coverage, providing easier access to Town government, maintaining a near flat Town Budget, working with NHDOT to improve access along Rte. 3-A, maximizing the opportunities presented by the proposed I-89/I-93 interchange improvements, and assisting with improving the operation of our various Departments. More recently, as chair of the Board of Selectmen I have worked to fairly resolve local property issues that have arisen from the maintenance and preservation of Town recreational trails while trying to re-energize the neighborly qualities that first attracted me to Bow.

(Q) If you are elected, what issues or projects are you most interested in addressing in your first year?

Moving forward, should I be re-elected, I would like to maintain focus on improved access to town government, ensuring we maximize the potential opportunities the State's planned I-89/I-93 improvements present to Bow as well as further improving access to our Route 3-A Business Development District in order to improve business development and reduce property taxes, and finalizing a viable plan for the Community Center.



Budget Committee Candidates

The Budget Committee consists of six elected members, one member of the Board of Selectmen, and one member of the School Board.

The Budget Committee reviews the annual budget submission of the Board of Selectmen and the School Board of SAU 67, makes adjustments as the committee sees fit, and presents a recommended annual budget for a vote at the annual Town Meeting every March.



Bill Knapp

(Q) How will your skills/background contribute to the position you are running to fill?

Throughout my life I have faced many challenges and opportunities that have shaped me, and allowed me to acquire the skills and knowledge necessary to become an effective Member of the Budget Committee. As a 9th generation resident of Bow I have seen first hand, and heard countless stories about what has and hasn't worked for our town and it's residents. Since it's incorporation in 1727 as a small town west of the "bow" in the Merrimack River, Bow has grown into a thriving town with a top rated school district and ample town-wide programs to foster a strong connection between all of it's people. I intend to use my votes if elected to continue that growth

As a former student of SAU 67, starting in kindergarten and graduating as a member of the class of 2014 I know first hand how crucial many of the programs offered by our schools, and our teachers are to shaping the next generation. Having children of my own currently enrolled in the district I have a personal stake in ensuring these programs stay in tact. As a Member of the Budget Committee I will use this close tie to the schools as an asset, being sure money is spent wisely and ensuring that every dollar spent is beneficial to our children.

Becoming a father at the young age of 20 I had to learn early and often what "balancing a budget" really means and how to cut wasteful spending. I have since been able to take these small household skills and extrapolate them, to use them effectively in my career path. (Q) If you are elected, what issues or projects are you most interested in addressing in your first year?

If elected as a Member of the Budget Committee, the issues I will be most interested in addressing are simple and clear. On the Budget Committee my first concern will be ensuring any and all waste is eliminated from our budget, checking to make sure every dollar spent has good, solid reasoning and benefits as many residents and local businesses as possible. (Q) How will your skills/background contribute to the position you are running to fill?

Trustees of Trust Funds are the custodian of the town's perpetual care funds, charitable trusts, and capital reserve/expendable trust funds.

The Trustees of Trust Funds make the decisions regarding expenditure from these funds based on the wishes of the donor in the case of privately donated funds and release capital reserve funds and expendable trust funds to the appropriate government officials upon request.

The Trustees of Trust Funds make the decisions on how these funds are to be invested based on the investment policy adopted by the Trustees.

The Library's five-member Board of Trustees are elected by the Town of Bow. Per New Hampshire library statutes and the will of Colonel Henry Baker, the Board consists of an odd number of members. Each Trustee is elected to serve a five year term. Duties include broad oversight of library management, including budget, long range planning, and staffing. The Trustees work closely with the Library Director to meet the needs and interests of Bow residents.

Nick Watson

(Q) How will your skills/background contribute to the position you are running to fill?
