SelectmanCandidates

The Town of Bow is governed by a five member Board of Selectmen elected to staggered three year terms. Per the provisions of NH RSA 41:8, "the selectmen shall manage the prudential affairs of the town and perform the duties by law prescribed."

The Town operates under the traditional Town Meeting form of government, in that the legislative body is the annual Town Meeting held every March. The Board of Selectmen acts as the executive branch of Town Government and it carries out the policies and laws set forth by the legislative body. The Board also has other specifically assigned roles and powers as set out in State Statutes. The Board of Selectmen in August of 2021 revised the By Laws.

(Q) How will your skills/background contribute to the position you are running to fill?

As a 6 year selectman I have thoroughly learned the inner workings of how our quaint little town operates. The relationships formed and skills acquired during that time cannot be easily learned in the first year as a new selectman. I believe I can successfully maintain a level town budget and while working with our town manager closely we can attract quality employees interested in long term careers.

(Q) If you are elected, what issues or projects are you most interested in addressing in your first year?

If elected, I will advocate for better connectivity in Bow through the construction of a telecommunications tower. I look forward to working on business development, including both new and continued growth on the 3A corridor in a budget conscious environment. This growth will help increase the tax base thus helping Bow residents in a noticeable fiscal way. As a member of the community center committee I look forward to continuing the work regarding solutions surrounding our community center.

(Q) How will your skills/background contribute to the position you are running to fill?

As a lifelong Granite Stater and longtime Bow resident, and small business owner, I believe I am uniquely positioned to bring real world experience and budget awareness to the Bow Select Board. I've worked as a master electrician, property management and restaurant owner (Flanagan's Southender) and have had the opportunity to learn from these diverse experiences.

My wife and I chose Bow to raise our two kids (currently in 5th and 7th grade) where they benefit from our high quality schools and many athletic programs. (Q) If you are elected, what issues or projects are you most interested in addressing in your first year?

Economic growth and commercial development: We need to continue expanding our commercial tax base to help relieve the burden that is placed on homeowners.

Community center: We need a strategic and sensible approach to give the community the best options for our growing community. We need to listen to residents and respond to their needs with a solution that makes sense for the future.

Cell coverage: For too long we've been waiting for coverage, especially in the most critical areas — our schools. This is a safety issue and I will work together with the entire board to resolve it.

Effectively managing and retaining our first responders and town employees. Having many years of experience as an employer dependent on good employees, I respect and understand the importance of maintaining a positive workplace for hard working people that ensures they remain as our dedicated employees



Kip McDaniel

(Q) How will your skills/background contribute to the position you are running to fill?

As a Bow resident of eight years, a father and stepfather of three, a business builder and leader, a community volunteer, and a member of our town's planning board, I care deeply about our community's future.

In any undertaking, my goal is to contribute with teamwork, energy, hard work, and discipline.

I have a track record of building and running successful businesses. In business and in government, costs and revenue matter. Growth demands responsibly investing for the future. Collaboration is essential. And leaders must conduct themselves in a way that earns the respect of others.

If you'll allow me the honor of serving on the Bow Selectboard, I will work tirelessly to address the real issues facing our town.

(Q) If you are elected, what issues or projects are you most interested in addressing in your first year?

We must focus on solutions to four current roadblocks in town – and, crucially, we must do so in a way that restores collaboration and decorum to the Selectboard.

Cellphone Coverage

We have talked long enough about cellphone coverage. It is time to have cellphone coverage – not just via a patchwork approach, but with a comprehensive plan that will bring coverage to as many residents as possible. The Selectboard should work with the Bow Telecommunications Committee and others to explore all options that will help us solve this challenge.

(Q) If you are elected, what issues or projects are you most interested in addressing in your first year? (cont.)

Community Center

We need a cost-effective, forward-thinking plan for our community center. The clock is ticking: The Fire Marshall has required us to have a plan in place by 2025 in order to continue using the building. We must therefore understand how much the existing building is being used, what new uses a future building might foster, and provide full transparency on what any project will cost – all so we can have a Community Center that serves the needs of Bow today and tomorrow.

Bow Mills Mixed Use District

It's been seven years since the town approved the BMMU district. Little has changed. It's time to address the paralysis – and make the necessary changes so that we can see responsible development that lowers property taxes across Bow.

Staff Turnover

We are seeing a high level of turnover among town staff, most worryingly in our police and fire departments. We need to create a culture that attracts and retains quality employees — and that starts with figuring out why we are seeing quality talent leave, and what cost-effective measures we can take to reverse the trend.



Brock Ehlers

(Q) How will your skills/background contribute to the position you are running to fill?

I have a long history of volunteering and giving back to my communities. While serving in the Navy, I received my first Letter of Commendation for work I performed while supporting many different causes including research for Multiple Sclerosis, building safe playgrounds for underserved communities, and many other causes. For the past ten years I have served on the board and as the Treasurer for a non-profit organization that raises money for children's organizations such as the Monarch School of New England, UNH Northeast Passage, and we have provided funds for the Hampton school to ensure no child goes without a hot lunch at school. I am also on the Bow Budget Committee and work as a Commercial Loan Officer for a community bank. Giving back is my way of ensuring I make a positive difference in the lives of others and leaving this world a little better than I found it.

(Q) If you are elected, what issues or projects are you most interested in addressing in your first year?

There are a couple of things that I would like to work on the first year. The first would be spending, debt reduction and revenue expansion. Another item is to re-initiate the design activity to modify the 89 on ramp and work with the DOT to gain more efficient access to Routes 89, 93 and 3A.

The Library's five-member Board of Trustees are elected by the Town of Bow. Per New Hampshire library statutes and the will of Colonel Henry Baker, the Board consists of an odd number of members. Each Trustee is elected to serve a five year term. Duties include broad oversight of library management, including budget, long range planning, and staffing. The Trustees work closely with the Library Director to meet the needs and interests of Bow residents.

(Q) How will your skills/background contribute to the position you are running to fill?

- ·Having served two separate terms as a Baker Free Library Trustee, I am prepared. Over that time, I have served on the BFL Board as its Chair as well as its Treasurer.

School BoardCandidates

(Q) How will your skills/background contribute to the position you are running to fill?

Attributes of an effective school board member include a passion for student achievement and well-being through fostering a collaborative environment and careful management of resources.

Collaborative relationship building comes from being able to work with people with differing opinions. I have spent many years volunteering for various youth organizations and related events, and previously volunteered my time on two separate non-profit boards, each spanning more than a decade. I have negotiated million-dollar budgets while building mutual respect with groups and individuals who have had vastly different opinions and goals. I believe I left each of these organizations better off than when I arrived, which should be the goal of all elected officials.

My background with non-profit organizations, in conjunction with my 23 years of professional experience in the financial industry, gives me a unique perspective on efficient utilization of resources. I believe in fiscal responsibility and setting clear spending priorities. My perspective will help shape the district budget by recognizing the difference between wants and needs when spending taxpayer money.

(Q) If you are elected, what issues or projects are you most interested in addressing in your first year?

Maintaining responsible project costs for the BES renovation will be an immediate focus. Looking ahead, fiscally sound programs for maintaining all facilities and expenditures will require a comprehensive Capital Reserve Fund to avoid tax spikes and the need for future bonds. Planning for other anticipated cost increases, such as for health insurance, special education, and personnel should be a priority. Fostering a closer and stronger working relationship with town officials is something that would benefit the entire community.

The underlying goal of every school board decision should be preserving and improving the quality of the school system, with the students being the ultimate beneficiaries. At the same time, balancing these decisions with their impact on town taxes must always be a major focus.

(Q) How will your skills/background contribute to the position you are running to fill?

I have been a public servant for 24 years working for the federal government administering Social Security benefits to the American public. I believe in giving back to the community and serving the public. It has been a privilege to work for the American people and I hope to be able to work for the town of Bow as a School Board member.

As a manager for more than 22 years in a large bureaucracy agency, I have learned how to navigate policies and procedures and create efficiencies. On a daily basis, I interpret complex regulations and policies. I am easily able to explain the complex policies to the public in an easy-to-understand manner. In my role as a manager, I am a jack of all trades.
