Town Hall Functions and the COVID-19 Virus

During these very difficult times we appreciate your patience and understanding while Town Hall is closed to the public and we all live under the government's recommendation to social distance and stay at home. As a result of the numerous orders issued by the Governor that relate to how we conduct business during these times, the Selectmen felt it was important to be fiscally responsible and to look closely at the reduction in workload resulting from the closures. They made the difficult decision to either partially or fully furlough some positions until business as usual can resume. Each of the employees affected by the furloughs are vital to the Town's ongoing efforts to provide service to the community and its residents. We look forward to reopening our buildings, departments and reuniting staff. Until we are able to do so, we do encourage everyone to "Stay at Home" and practice social distancing.

"This too shall pass."

The Town is continuing to review with its contract assessor the abatement applications submitted relative to the 2019 tax assessments, however their firm was closed and deemed non-essential so there will be a slight delay in getting responses out to those taxpayers affected. We anticipate that a response will be issued by the July 1 timeline so please if you did file an abatement, have patience and if you would call the Assessing Office prior to payment of your spring tax bill, we may be able to provide an update on the status of your assessment. We appreciate your understanding.

We do expect that Spring Tax bills will be in the mail by May 15th, with a due date of July 1, 2020.

Unfortunately, there has been an uptick nationwide in IRS and other phone scams. It is good time to go over some tips to keep from becoming a victim of a scam. The saying, "If it's too good to be true, it probably is" makes a lot of sense in this time in our lives.

There have been a number of scams to be aware of that have been reported in the area. Some of the more popular ones are A younger family member calling you to claim they are in need of immediate bail to be sent via Western Union. A computer software caller claiming your computer is infected and is need of a virus update. They then lock you out and demand a ransom. The pastor or priest sends you an email or text telling you a parishioner's spouse has fallen ill and needs immediate assistance, gift card numbers are requested to help them out.

Tax scams are also frequent problem.

The Do's

- Do hang up immediately if you are called by an "IRS agent" reporting that your social security number has been suspended. IRS sends their communication by mail if you owe money or have unpaid taxes.
- Do forward any unsolicited emails in which someone claims to be from the IRS or the Treasury Department to phishing@irs.gov. (Do not click on any links or open attachments.)
- Do consider filing a fraud alert or freezing your credit with the three major credit-reporting bureaus if a scammer knows part of your Social Security number.
- Do ask for identification if you are visited by someone claiming to be from the IRS. Actual employees carry two official credentials: a "pocket commission" and an HSPD-12 card, a standard ID for federal workers. An IRS employee will provide, on request, a dedicated agency phone number for you to verify the information on the card.
- Do call the police if you have any questions about an IRS action you find unusual or suspicious.



 Do call for police to help identify someone at your door asking to come in to discuss personal or tax information. (Unless you were expecting them)

The Don'ts

- Don't provide or confirm personal or financial information over the phone to someone who claims to be a government official.
- Don't respond to a purported IRS email or text message asking for your information. The IRS doesn't do that.
- Don't agree to pay a tax bill with a prepaid debit card or wire transfer. Scammers prefer these methods because they're difficult to trace and can be used almost anywhere.
- Don't give credit or debit card numbers to a caller claiming to be an IRS official. The IRS says it never asks for such information over the phone.
- Don't assume a caller who tells you to verify his or her phone number by checking the IRS website is on the level. Caller IDs can be rigged to display the number of a real IRS office.
- Don't be bullied. A scammer will issue threats and demands, but according to the IRS, if you actually owe back taxes, you will get a bill in the mail and have an opportunity to appeal or to question the amount.
- If you or someone you know has been the victim of a scam, please call the police. The sooner you start addressing the matter, the quicker a plan of address can be put into

place.

Tips for Proper Leaf Disposal

MULCH

Finely chopped leaves make for an excellent lawn fertilizer. Mulch leaves by running over them with your mower during the next cutting, and leave the remains on the lawn. You can also spread the mulch across flower and vegetable beds.



COMPOST

Composting leaves is a great way to create nutrient-rich soil. In a mixed pile, create a 2-to-1 ratio of dead leaves to grass clippings. Spreading leaves over food scraps will soak up moisture and help contain odors as well.



PROTECT OUR WATERWAYS

Avoid raking leaves into or nearby storm drains, ditches, creeks, or rivers. In addition to clogging the drains, decaying leaves use up the water's oxygen, harming aquatic inhabitants.

Tick Bite Facts



Avoiding Tick Bites

- Stay on trails outdoors; avoid areas of overgrown brush and tall grasses.
- Wear light-colored clothing so ticks can be easily seen.
- Wear long pants, a long-sleeved shirt, closed toe shoes with socks, and a hat. Tuck your pants into your socks and your shirt into your pants.
- Check yourself, your children, and your pets often for ticks, shower after returning indoors.
- Use insect repellent containing DEET or permethrin (always follow directions).
- After returning indoors, run clothes in the dryer on high heat to kill any ticks that may be on the clothing.



Tick-borne diseases are transmitted to people and animals when they are bitten by an infected tick. The longer an attached tick is allowed to feed, the greater the chance the tick will transmit the organisms that cause tick-borne diseases. Therefore, it is important to take steps to avoid being bitten by ticks and to remove any attached ticks promptly. This fact sheet contains some tips on how to avoid being bitten by ticks, how to do a tick check, and how to properly remove an attached tick.

How to Do a Tick Check

Black-legged ticks are very small, and a tick might look like a freckle or speck of dirt on a person's skin. Ticks often like to bite in warm, dark, secluded areas of the body. It is important to check your clothing for ticks while you are outside, and do a whole body tick check at least once a day. Pay close attention to: hairline and scalp, in and around ears, underarms, elbows, backs of the knees, between fingers and toes, belly button, groin area, and areas where clothing presses against your skin (for example: waistbands, collars, cuffs, watchbands). Don't forget to check your pets as well! Remove any attached ticks promptly.

Removing an Attached Tick

 DO remove the tick promptly. The sooner you remove it, the less chance of infection.

- DO use tweezers to grasp the tick's mouthparts at the surface of the skin.
- DO gently pull the tick straight out with a steady motion.
- DO wipe the bite area with an antiseptic, or wash with soap and water.
- DO NOT remove an attached tick using any of the methods listed below.
 These may actually increase your chances of becoming infected with a tick borne disease:
 - · DO NOT squeeze the tick.
 - DO NOT rub petroleum jelly on the tick.
 - · DO NOT use a hot match or cigarette.
 - · DO NOT pour kerosene or nail polish on the tick.

Is it a tick bite?

- Spider bite: Several fluid-filled bumps appear at the site of the bite.
- Tick bite: The bite may be hard, itchy, and may be reddish and form into lumps. In many people infected with Lyme disease, a red, circular, spreading rash develops at the site of the tick bite. This is often known as a "bulls eye rash" because some clearing often develops in the center of the circular rash, resembling a bulls eye.
- A rash is not a symptom of all tick-borne diseases, and not all people infected with Lyme disease develop rashes. It is important to speak to your physician or primary care provider if you have any concerns following a tick bite or if you experience any symptoms of disease.








BELMONT'S GALE SCHOOL ROLLING!!

The "Save Our Gale School" (SOGS) group is moving forward and gives an update on their success in preserving the historically significant and architecturally unique Gale School in Belmont. The Gale School is a true landmark. They just don't build 'em like that anymore - and now it is saved. SOGS Chair Diane Marden said, "At long last, we did it! We still need some more donations to do it all, but the Gale School is saved!!"

Thanks to many generous grants and donations of money, materials and services, SOGS has raised enough money to move the Gale School from its

present site behind the Belmont Middle School to a lot on Concord Street generously donated to the project.

In order to get the building from its current location to Concord Street, they are moving it over a temporary road through woods, down a hillside and then along and

across Concord Street to its new home. Landowners effected by this move have generously agreed to allow SOGS to build the road and move the building across their properties.

The path has already been cut by Canterbury Timber at an exceptional discount. This road will be stumped and constructed by Leslie E Roberts, LLC (Mark Roberts and his sons), also at a discount. Geddes Building Movers specializes in moving historic buildings and will move the Gale School *in one piece* to the new location, also at a very generous discount. This move will be an incredible undertaking!

Everything is in place for the move, which is expected to take place in July. Now SOGS is concentrating on raising enough additional funds and donated services and materials to construct a concrete

foundation on the donated lot. That is the only missing piece.

SOGS could still make good use of donations of services and materials - particularly gravel, stone, paving, fencing, landscaping, utility relocations and concrete work - as well, as those donations would free up more funds for the foundation.

To briefly review SOGS' progress to date:

It made no sense to save the Gale School just to have it sit somewhere. SOGS had to find someone who would take it over and put it to good use. They

have found a perfect partner in Lakes Region Community Developers (LRCD - formerly the Laconia Area Land Trust) - a local non-profit with an impeccable track record.

Once the move is accomplished, the Gale School and lot will be transferred to LRCD, who will historically restore and re-purpose

the building. They are currently looking into several possible uses-- for programs that will benefit low and moderate-income working families and individuals in the Lakes Region by offering social services currently insufficient or unavailable in the area.

SOGS has also had great support from the Shaker Regional School District, which agreed to contribute the \$70,000 that was originally budgeted for demolition of the Gale School toward the cost of moving the building off District property and has cooperated in every way they could to facilitate the success of this project. The Town of Belmont has also been very cooperative, without committing any taxpayer



funds.

SOGS applied for a grant from the Land & Community Heritage Investment Program (also known as LCHIP), resulting in an award in February 2019 of \$110,000. SOGS also was awarded grants through the New Hampshire Charitable Foundation from:

- -- The Christopher P Williams Fund in the amount of \$2,500
- -- The Juliet E. Peverley Fund in the amount of \$5,000;
- -- The Jeff Taylor Bean Pots to Bell Towers Fund in the amount of \$5.000.

Belmont's Sargent Fund has awarded \$2,627 toward this project and the Belmont Heritage Commission awarded a \$2,500 grant. Most recently, the 1772 Foundation awarded a \$10,000 Historic Preservation Matching Grant through the NH Preservation Alliance. Local citizens and businesses have donated a total of over \$11,000 in cash as well as services, materials, and the new lot itself!

Members of SOGS have also donated time, their own money and services, to include preparing the Gale School for the move and performing the site work on the new lot, all totaling over \$116,000, and hundreds of hours in pulling all this together.

All these contributions and arrangements total over \$330,000, bringing the project well within reach of full completion. The Gale School will move to a lot and be ready for restoration. However, it should not sit on cribbing for very long and construction of a solid concrete foundation would finalize SOGS' effort of nearly thirty years. This project shows how volunteers and community support can accomplish good things.

These dedicated volunteers have put tremendous effort and caring into this for a long time but say they still could use just a little more help, especially from local banks, individuals and businesses. SOGS is a 501(c)(3) non-profit corporation registered with the IRS and the State of NH and is seeking public cash donations and pledges of any size or in-kind services, materials, auction/raffle items and/or labor to go toward the approximately

\$40,000 in cash and services remaining to be raised to fully complete this project. ANY assistance would be greatly appreciated, and donations are tax deductible.
