Police Station Project

On Tuesday, October 27th, Governor Chris Sununu joined the Board of Selectmen and several others for the Groundbreaking Ceremony at the site of the new Police Station.



The Governor had the following comment on the project; "Congratulations it's an awesome project, I have the ability and the honor of traveling the State and seeing things like this all the time, but through the pandemic projects like this have slowed down so it is an incredible testament to this community to move forward to make sure it got on the ballot to do it right to make sure folks had the information because of how important it is to make sure law enforcement knows you have their back."

2020 Tax Rate

The 2020 tax rate has been set at \$25.34 which breaks down as follows:

Town	\$8.34
Local School	\$13.70
State School	\$ 2.02
County	\$ 1.28

Overall, the rate increased by .33 cents this year.

Piles of debris, trash, yard waste or a single item too large for one person to collect WILL NOT BE ACCEPTED. A request for pickup must be made in advance by calling Town Hall at 267-8300, Extension 118 or 124 only. You will be asked to list the items you want picked up, you will be advised what the cost is, and you will need to drop off a check made payable to the Town of Belmont prior to the collection day. The Selectmen's budget is then transferred to the members of the Budget Committee for their review. Once the budget is finalized, it goes to the voters at the annual Town Meeting.

Members meet one day a week starting mid November through January, meetings start at 6:30 pm.

Town Clerk's Corner

The time has finally come... Election Day is November 3rd. We have received over 800 absentee ballots and the Secretary of State's Office is allowing us to pre-process the absentee ballots. The pre-processing allows us to announce the voter's name, open the outer, return envelope to make sure the affidavit is properly executed and make a highlighted notation in the Voter Check-In books that will be used on Election Day. The Pre-processing will take place on Monday November 2, 2020 beginning at 8:30 AM on the 4th floor of the Mill building. This process is open to the public however space is limited due to social distancing concerns.

Voting will take place at Belmont High School on November 3rd and the polls are open from 7AM-7PM. MASKS ARE REQUIRED to enter the polls and social distancing will be practiced. We did a great job at the State Primary in September and feel that we have good protocols in place to make the voting process as safe as possible for our residents.

If you need to register to vote on Election Day at the polls, be sure to bring proof of residency (car registration, utility bill, etc....) as well as your ID and see the Supervisors of the Checklist for the voter registration form. There will be greeters in the entryway of the school to answer any questions you have as well as provide direction for voting.

Absentee ballots MUST be returned by 5PM November 3rd. The Clerk's Office will remain open from 4-5PM for Absentee voting purposes ONLY on Monday November 2nd. If you have any questions about voting please give our office a call.

Also coming this month to a mailbox near you is the second issue tax bill! The second issue bill covers the period from October 1st - March 31st. As always, you can pay your bill in person, by mail or on our Town's website www.belmontnh.org. We accept cash, check and card. Please keep in mind that if you choose to pay with a card there is a 2.79% convenience fee that is added to the total whether you pay over the counter or on the website. We hope that everyone finds joy in the season and has reasons to give thanks and celebrate this year.

Phone Scams



The fake IRS agents are hitting the phones hard, along with people posing as someone from Social Security. Some of the phone numbers that show up are out of state, while others are showing local numbers. In these instances, the scammer identifies they are with the "I.RS" of "Social Security Administration", then they ask for gift cards or try to implicate you into a crime that has happened in another state.

Make sure your friends, family and neighbors are aware that no legitimate government entity will ask for a Target or iTunes gift cards to settle your outstanding tax obligations or to "unsuspend your social security number."

Different variations of this scam involve a caller asking if you have Dish TV or DirecTV and then they say, "they need to send out a technician because your boxes are no longer compatible with the new high-speed digital signal and you will lose your TV access." This discussion ultimately leads to solicitation of your private information.

The grandparent "Help, I need bail money" scam has also resurfaced. A caller who is hard to hear asks for help getting out of jail once you take the call. Then they say, "they have been arrested, they need bail money and ask you not to tell their parents." It is all the same attempt to separate you from your hard-earned money. As with any phone solicitor do not allow the call to go on, hang up then block the number.

The scammers will also try to implicate someone in a crime where your blood, DNA, was found in a rental vehicle in Texas and that your Social Security Number was found on the rental paperwork.

Please do not give out any of your personal information, including verifying what the scammer is telling you, simply hang up on them.

If you receive a scam call please let us know the number it came from so we can call them back ourselves. If you or someone you know has been scammed you will need to act quickly and get us involved as soon as possible to help you limit the damages.

Suspicious People

Often, we get calls where someone has committed a crime and we have no leads to bring the person who is responsible for the crime to justice. A friendly reminder that if you see someone in your neighborhood that does not look familiar, you can call to have that person checked on. It may not see pertinent at the time however we do have occasions where someone did see a person walking or a vehicle in the area that may be involved with a crime, but we don't know about it until after the fact and we are unable to locate them.


By calling for us to check on someone may prevent a crime from happening or assist us in solving one in the future.

Public Winter Sand

A new winter sand stockpile for the residents of Belmont has been completed outside of the Hurricane Rd. facility. This will allow for residents to obtain sand while we maintain a secure and safe facility. A friendly reminder, if you need winter sand for your driveway, we have a three 5-gallon pail limit. Don't forget winter is right around the corner! Sorry!





You might notice our crew out removing leaves from drainage ditches and along many of our roads with our rather large leaf collector. Many people ask why we do this. Leaves tend to form dams to divert the water and can cause the edges of roadway to be washed out during heavy rains. Cleaning the leaves and debris from these ditches and catch basins makes it easier for the water to flow without interruption. By removing these leaves, we are able to save roads from washing out therefore saving the taxpayers money. Unfortunately, this is not an invitation to pile your leaves on the side of the road and in the ditches for us to pick up. Property owners are responsible for disposal of the leaves from their property. We would also appreciate homeowners not putting leaves in the ditches for us to remove. This task is not the Towns responsibil-





ity.

Conservation Commission

Emergency Drought Assistance to Low-Income Residential Well Owners

Concord, NH - At the request of Governor Chris Sununu, the NH Drinking Water and Groundwater Advisory Commission and the New Hampshire Department of Environmental Services (NHDES) have created a new initiative to provide short-term relief and financial assistance for low-income New Hampshire homeowners served by residential wells that are experiencing insufficient water or no water due to drought conditions.

"I am pleased the Drinking Water Groundwater Trust Fund approved \$1.5 million in emergency funding to assist low-income homeowners remediate their wells if they are experiencing insufficient water due to drought. When citizens turn on their faucets, they should be able to trust that clean drinking water is available for them and their families," said Governor Chris Sununu.

Short-term Drought Relief Measures

The initiative will include temporary relief to ensure households have an adequate supply of drinking water in the near-term. Households on residential wells, whose income is at or below 80% of the area median household income and that have no water due to the ongoing drought, may be eligible for bottled water deliveries at no cost for drinking and cooking uses. The provision of bottled water is intended to be a temporary measure until the household receives assistance to permanently mitigate the well that has been impacted by drought.

Permanent Drought Relief Measures

Financial assistance for improving or replacing residential wells with insufficient water due to drought, or connection to an existing community water system financial assistance may be made available for qualifying low-income homeowners through a grant from the N.H. Drinking Water and Groundwater Trust Fund.

Additionally, once the work is completed, all wells must be sampled and tested for the water quality parameters established by NHDES. The laboratory costs for testing are an eligible expense to be covered by the grant. However, the provision of drought assistance does not guarantee the quality or quantity of water associated with the work funded by this grant, and costs to add treatment are not eligible costs.

"Due to the drought, many Granite Staters have no other option than to upgrade their wells to ensure a steady supply of clean drinking water for their homes. These upgrades are expensive and are often completely unaffordable for some of our friends and neighbors. This program will be a lifeline to those who otherwise could not afford these essential upgrades. I applaud my fellow Commission members for coming together so quickly to unanimously approve this program and the staff of the Department of Environmental Services for developing it in record time."

"Given the severity of the drought, recent precipitation has done relatively little to alter drought conditions impacting residential wells in New Hampshire. Residents still need to take every action to conserve water now and for the foreseeable future. This well assistance initiative will provide some much-needed help to some low-income residents that are without water as a result of the drought," said Bob Scott, NHDES Commissioner.

Information about income eligibility requirements and the amount of financial assistance for permanent drought relief measures are available on the MHDES Drought Management Webpage. Emergency drought assistance is available to eligible households retroactive to costs incurred since June 23, 2020. 


