Notice of Grant Awards & Availability

The Town has received notice that we will be receiving a grant in the amount of \$30,000 from ARPA for the purposes of completing an Asset Management program for the Town's Sewer Department. Work is underway to implement the grant.

Water State Revolving Loan Fund that the community is eligible for \$638,400 in financial assistance from the American Rescue Plan Act of 2021 for an Iron and Manganese Water Treatment Plant and we plan to include a warrant article for this project on the Town's 2022 sewers keep flowing. meeting warrant. At contact the Town Administrator's Office at 267-8300 ext. that time the grant offset was to be \$1,500.000, yet the 124. article still failed to gain support. We are now in a situation where the State of New Hampshire will be implementing new rules regarding enforcement of the drinking water standard for manganese of 0.3mg/L. These new rules could subject the Town to public notification guidelines for any exceedance of the new standard. We are urging support of this project with the added financial assistance from the ARPA program.

The Town has also applied to the Governor's Office for Emergency Relief and Recovery for a grant from the Locality Equipment Purchase Program to assist with the purchase of a new rescue boat for the Belmont Fire Department.

You will be asked to list the items you want picked up, you will be advised what the cost is, and you will need to drop off a check made payable to the Town of Belmont prior to the collection day. As of January owners may now register or renew their dog's license. Remember, April 30, 2022 is the deadline to have dogs registered. This process can be done in person, by mail or online at www.belmontnh.org. New dogs must be done in person for the first time with proof of current rabies vaccination. The cost for an altered dog is \$6.50, non-altered dog is \$9.00 and if you are a senior owner (65 and older) \$2.00.

First, you must be a registered Belmont voter and complete the candidacy filing at the Town Clerk's Office. Snow Obstruction and Removal Ordinance

The Town of Belmont has an ordinance regulating snow obstruction and removal. A full copy of this ordinance can be found on the Town website, click the Info. Center tab and follow to ordinances. This policy has been adopted with the intent to protect the safety, health and welfare of the general public. It regulates removal and placement of snow and ice in areas maintained by Town Personnel and equipment (i.e. Town maintained roads, sidewalks, Fire Hydrants and parking lots). Your Public Works Personnel spend long hours using Department resources to keep Town Roads, Sidewalks, and Parking Lots free of snow and ice for Residents and Visitors. The purpose of this ordinance is to help the Department keep them that way. The placement of snow and ice by any means at the conclusion of a winter event can be dangerous.



Before you dig, remember to call DigSafe Not only is it safe, IT'S THE LAW!



Highway Department News (Cont.)

Snow and ice moved in those areas create hazards by placing physical obstructions such as chunks or windrows across the road. These hazards can then be hit resulting in damage to vehicles or cause accidents due to motorists utilizing evasive maneuvers to miss the obstruction. They can also cause icy conditions as the sun warms the pavement and traffic drives through making the roadway slippery.

The Department asks that you do not push snow across the road during and after any winter weather. Following this simple request leaves the roads in a safe, travelable condition and prevents the need for crews to be reactivated after storm events allowing them to get much needed rest and time with family.



As a PSA reminder, please make sure you remember the following guidelines:

- Please remember that all RVs must maintain registration and inspection while parked on your property and you are allowed only one. If you keep and maintain more than one RV, your property will fall into a contractor's yard category. You will to need to make sure it is allowed in your zone and apply for a change of use if necessary. I am seeing properties with upwards of five RV's on them now that the leaves are off the trees. If this is you, you will be seeing your friendly Code Enforcement Officer soon.
- Now that the ground is frozen let's talk end of life cars in your yard. If it is a 2000 model year or newer and you have a title, any of our local scrapping yards will be willing to remove them from your property. If it is older than 2000 model year no title is needed, and it is a simple call to arrange removal. If you need assistance in finding a local salvage yard, applying for a replacement title, or arranging removal of cars/boats/RV's, please contact me and I will assist you with this.
- Belmont Business Owners. I am sending out letters again about Aquafer Inspections. I need you to
 get in touch with me after the New Year so we can schedule an inspection. If you are a new business
 and unsure if you should be part of the State's Aquafer Protection Program, give me a call. Based on
 what type of business you conduct I will guide you through it easily.

Sometimes accidents happen. We can't always be prepared for unexpected events, but here are some tips on how to proceed in case of damage to your home or other building.

Some examples of damage may be from the weather, trees falling, a vehicle accident, fire, or explosion.

- ⇒ Call your insurance company. They can best assist you with the steps to follow. The insurance company will likely send an adjuster to inspect the damage and evaluate the cost of repairs.
- ⇒ Take photos **BEFORE** any clean up occurs
- ⇒ Contact the building inspector if you suspect structural damage
- ⇒ Obtain required permits for any necessary work—including demolition of a struc-
- ⇒ Look for 24/7 emergency response providers or disaster recovery organizations such as the American Red Cross Society that provide services for: floods, fire, or structural damage



Winnisquam Lake is Milfoil Free!

Divers from Aqualogic Inc. were out on the lake eight days this past summer and removed all the variable milfoil known to be growing in locations throughout the lake. We are fortunate that after four years of comprehensive and consistent management we were able to manage this year's milfoil growth with just diver-assisted harvesting and no herbicide treatment was required.

We want to extend our thanks to the Towns of Meredith, Belmont, Sanbornton and Tilton and the City of Laconia and the NH Department of Environmental Ser-



Variable milfoil (Myriophyllum heterophyllum) is an invasive plant that became established in Lake Winnisquam sometime around 1995. Milfoil growth has been primarily confined to the northern end of the lake near the loon sanctuary, Winnisquam Marine, Jay's Marina, Sunray Shores (a dredged channel to developed land in Belmont), Ephraim's Cove and Mallards Landing. NHDES surveys the lake each year to document where the areas of infestation are, and to determine if there are any new areas of growth. See the 2020 Milfoil Management Map for herbicide treatment, the Map for Diver Assisted Suction Harvesting (DASH), and the most recent Long Term Variable Milfoil Management Plan 2020 documented by NHDES.

Prior to the creation of the Winnisquam Watershed Network in 2017, milfoil management in Lake Winnisquam was conducted on a localized basis and some areas of infestation had not been treated in more than 10 years. The WWN's approach is to conduct milfoil management throughout the lake each year with the ultimate goal of reducing or eliminating the milfoil growth in infested areas and preventing further spread. Funding for the program comes from State grants, local matches from each of the five municipalities on the lake, and contributions from neighborhood associations and members. 2021 Weed Watcher Campaign

Weed watching resumed in June again this Summer and was conducted monthly along the entire shoreline of the lake by weed watchers from all 5 towns bordering the lake. Weed watching wrapped up for most volunteers in August. There were no new invasive species or new growths of variable milfoil found in the lake. Luckily, our <u>Lake Hosts</u> that inspect boats entering and leaving the lake at the public ramp found and removed an invasive water chestnut from a trailer prior to

launching the boat into the lake. Thanks to our volunteer weed watching crew for keeping an eye out and letting us know whenever they spotted a suspicious plant.


