2023 Budget

The Board of Selectmen will begin discussing the 2023 proposed budget during the month of October and it is anticipated that the Budget Committee will begin deliberations in early November. Meetings are held at the 4th floor of the Mill and agendas are posted on the Town's website at www.belmontnh.gov

2022 Tax Rate

We anticipate our 2022 Tax Rate to be set in late October/early November. Tax bills will be due 30-days from the date of mailing. Based on current revenue estimates and new valuations we anticipate the Town's portion of the tax rate to decrease.



2022 Allocations of Extra Highway Block Grants and Bridge Aid

The 2022 legislative session resulted in significant revenue sharing and state aid to local government in a non-budget year. With the state reporting a record surplus of funds this fiscal year, SB 401 and HB 1221 are intended to provide one-time immediate infrastructure resources to cities and towns. Using the state general fund surplus generated in fiscal year 2022, this bill appropriates \$36 million for the repair and maintenance of municipally-owned bridges, and \$30 million in additional municipal highway block grants. Belmont was notified that we will receive \$165,767.44 towards our roads and \$125,888.00 towards our bridges.



Fall is here with it's chilly nights and crisp mornings. Time to dust off the sweaters and turtlenecks! Still there's nothing that compares to fall in New Hampshire!

Water and Sewer bills are due on October 12th. The third quarter bills cover the months of June, July and August. You can pay your bill by mailing in a check with the payment stub, dropping by the office, or on our Town website, <u>belmontnh.gov</u>. We accept check, cash or credit/debit cards for payment. Please be aware that if you use a credit/debit card there is a 2.79% convenience fee that is added to the total.

The General Election is right around the corner. It will be held Tuesday, November 8th, 2022. The polls are located at Belmont High School (255 Seavey Road) and open promptly at 7 AM and close at 7 PM. Be sure to bring your valid ID with you. The last day we can accept new voter registrations in our office is Friday, October 19th. After that you will have to register at the polls on the day of the election. Be sure to bring your picture ID and proof of residency for Belmont with you when you register.

If you are in need of an absentee ballot we expect to have them in the office in the first couple of weeks in October so you can stop in and cast your vote. You may also submit a request and we will mail your ballot to you. You can drop a request off, mail one in, or email your request to <u>tctcdeputy@belmontnh.gov</u>. Please keep in mind that any form of request that you make <u>must</u> include your full name, Belmont address, address you would like the ballot mailed to, and your <u>signature</u>. A person MAY NOT pick up another person's absentee ballot. If a person cannot come in to cast their ballot at Town Hall, a request must be submitted and we will mail the ballot out. All absentee ballots must be returned to our office by 5PM Monday, November 7th, 2022. Our office will be open until 5PM that day to accept any absentee ballots. Highway Department News

Water Main Break

"Things you see on your local news channel, not on your local travels." On Sunday, September 8th at approximately 8:00pm, your Public Works Department received a phone call about water running down Johnson Street. Crews arrived to water spraying through pavement and escaping from both edges. Crews were able to get a portion of the system shut down to control the leak and eventually isolate the problem to an area that left the fewest people possible without water while repairs were made. Due to line of severe thunderstorms forecasted to travel through the region from midnight to early morning, the decision was made to line up a crew and get started first thing in the morning.



At 6:30am on Monday morning, after the threat of severe storms

had passed, a combined crew from Busby Construction and your Public Works Department employees began to gather assets in order to locate, excavate and repair what turned out to be a break in the 6- inch cast iron watermain that travels the length of Johnson Street. Repairs were complete and the waterline was recharged to supply water before 10:00am.





The Department would like to thank the Team at Busby Construction and members of the Public Works Team for showing up and making these repairs happen on Labor Day Weekend. The Cooperation between both private and public entities resulted in a safe, efficient repair made in a timely manner.

ROADSIDE MOWING

Almost done! Members of your Public Works Team have almost reached their goal of mowing at least 2 passes on each side of all Town-maintained roads. The Town's Highway Department has a flail mower attachment for its Trackless (sidewalk plow). The flail mower mounts on an arm and has the capabilities of reaching out to the back side of the ditch on most Town roads keeping brush back and improving sight distance throughout Town. Once complete, the Department's mechanics will transform it back into the sidewalk cleaning machine we all love to see making the rounds during winter storms.

CHANGE OF SEASON

Fall is here! In the Public Works world, this means your Department is busy switching gears. Wrapping up summer projects and preparing for whatever Mother Nature decides to throw our way in the pending winter months. Time consuming things such as the reinstallation of on spot chains and studded snow tires are underway. Truck sanders are tested and adjusted for use along with plows and wings receiving a final once over in anticipation of the abuse they are about to endure pushing snow and ice around. All of this happens through the hard work and dedication of your mechanics Public Works Facility. While they strive to keep at the the Team rolling, The Team does exactly that! Your Team will be out early this year marking obstacles and potential hazards. Reflective delineation and whips are strategically placed so once covered with a blanket of snow, items found in the right of way such as stone work, trees, or fences can be noticed, hopefully avoiding damage to both property and equipment. Drainage is marked in a similar manner and if necessary, yellow arrows are painted in the roadway to mark catch basins and water bars that could be hard to find in the same conditions.

Invasive Species: Oriental Bittersweet

As summer fades into fall and we start decorating for the upcoming fall holidays, please be aware that it is PROHIBITED to use ORIENTAL BITTERSWEET in wreaths or other decorations.



The introduction of Oriental Bittersweet to non infested areas is generally associated with birds and small mammals feeding on the abundant fruits in the fall and excreting the seeds as they move from one area to another. Dispersal is also associated with human activities where earth moving activities occur or when the vines and fruits are collected in the fall for ornamental wreathes and decorations (which is prohibited) and then carelessly discarded.

Oriental bittersweet is a deciduous vine reaching heights of 40-60'. The vine is very aggressive, it climbs up over trees and smothers them. It is difficult to manage, cutting, pulling or recommended herbicide use applied to foliage, bark, or cutstump.

To easily identify and locate where Oriental bittersweet occurs in any habitat, simply scout areas of concern in the fall when native plant species have reached their peak colors. At this




Parks and Recreation

General Assistance

APPLICATION GUIDE & CHECKLIST

ELIGIBLITY REQUIREMENTS

- You own and occupy, as your primary residence, the property for which you
 require assistance.
- You experienced a coronavirus pandemic-related reduction in income or increase in expenses.
- Your income is equal to or less than 125% of Area Median Income. (This will be reviewed with you during the application process.)
- You have past-due expenses associated with your primary residence, such as:
 Mortgage payments
 - Property taxes
 - Homeowner insurance, flood insurance, mortgage insurance premiums
 - Homeowner association and condominium fees
 - Utility or internet payments

NO REPAYMENT TERMS

- If you receive less than \$5,000 in assistance, these funds will be provided as a non-recourse grant with no repayment necessary.
- If you receive assistance equal to or greater than \$5,000, funds will be provided as a two-year, forgivable grant that requires a recorded Promise to Pay and Mortgage. Repayment in full will be required if the property is sold or refinanced within two years. The Promise to Pay and Mortgage will be automatically released by the NH Homeowner Assistance Fund two years from the date of assistance.

LOSS MITIGATION

- If you apply for assistance with past-due mortgage payments, completing loss mitigation will be required. Loss mitigation is a request for mortgage assistance that includes information required by your servicer for evaluating the request. Exceptions can be requested when:
 - $\,$ A servicer has not been timely/responsive with loss mitigation review; or
 - There is an urgent threat of foreclosure, making loss mitigation unlikely; or
 - There are circumstances that prevent the completion of loss mitigation.

NUMBER OF APPLICATIONS

- Apply for all delinquent housing-related expenses in your first application, as there is a 6-month waiting period before a new application can be submitted.
- New applications may include expenses incurred since the previous application.

HOME PERFORMANCE WITH ENERGY STAR® Moderate-Income Program

The Home Performance with ENERGY STAR - Moderate-Income (HPwES-MI) program is open to qualifying customers of Eversource, Liberty Utilities, Until, and NH Electric Cooperative. The HPwES-MI looks to support those NH residents that are over income for Home Energy Assistance (income eligible weatherization program) yet may struggle to cover the customer co-pays in our market rate Home Performance program. HPwES-MI offers higher incentives on weatherization measures and 0% finance options to help cover the customer co-pay.

Code Enforcement

I hope you had a wonderful summer and you are taking the time to look around your yard to see what could be cleaned up.

- We are now headed into October! Time for RVs to get put away. Please remember the following regarding RVs and your property:
 - You are only allowed to store/house one RV on your property.
 - If you have questions about storing an RV on your property, please contact the Land Use Office at 603-267-8300 x3.
- If you have an abundance of scrap metal or junk on your property, or a house clean out to do, there are a number of locally owned companies who may be willing to come get it.

We are currently working on generating a list of companies who can assist our residents. If you would like to be included on our list of junk removal businesses who can assist residents of Belmont, please email <u>codeenforcement@belmontnh.gov</u>

- I am seeing and dealing with numerous unsafe structures lately. If you have a property with a structure that is falling in or falling down you need to remedy this problem by repairing or razing it. Please contact Code Enforcement or the Building Department with any questions you may have.
- Cars, trucks, or vans should not be used as storage containers without the required approvals (Planning & Zoning).
 Please start this process with a building application. These vehicles may need to maintain registration and inspection.
- If you are going to be doing a fall clean-up, house renovations, or a property clean-out and you require a storage container, make sure to obtain an approved permit. Storage containers require building permits and/or Site Plan approval. They cannot be permanent to your property and a removal date should be included on your building permit.

Some of our Belmont businesses still require Aquifer inspections. If you are a new business, please reach out so that we can get the process started. If you are an established business and have not had your inspection completed, please contact me as soon as possible.
