You will be asked to list the items you want picked up, you will be advised what the cost is, and you will need to drop off a check made payable to the Town of Belmont prior to the collection day. Assessing Department

Tax Exemptions and Credits

Please refer to the information below to determine if you may qualify for an exemption or credit on your assessment or tax bill. The deadline for new applications is APRIL.

Rules the State requires for **Elderly Exemptions** are:

- Must be 65 years old by April 1st of the tax year
- Must be a New Hampshire resident for at least three years
- The property must be your primary residence
- Income limitations: Single = \$25,000/year Married = \$35,000/year
- Asset Limit: \$150,000 (includes Social Security)
- Exemption Amounts are based on age

Rules the State requires for Disability Exemptions are:

- Must be a New Hampshire resident for at least five consecutive years
- Must be receiving Title II or Title XVI Social Security Disability
- The property must be your primary residence
- Income limitations: Single = \$25,000/year Married = \$35,000/year
- Asset Limit: \$100,000 (includes Social Security)
- Exemption amount = \$50,000 of assessed value per year

Rules the State requires for a Veteran's Credit are:

- Must be a New Hampshire resident for at least one year
- The property must be your primary residence and you must have ownership in the property
- Honorable Discharge
- At least 90 days of service
- Must not be collecting a Veterans Credit in any other Town, City or State
- Credit = \$500.00 per year from your real estate tax bill (\$250.00 each billing)
- Additional Credits available for 100% total and permanent service-connected disability


Automated Curbside Pick Up Info (Starting 01/02/2023)

Curbside Container Placement Guide

HELP US TO PROVIDE YOU WITH THE BEST POSSIBLE SERVICE

This guide illustrates the proper and improper placement of your curbside containers and offers tips to help with the curbside collection of materials.

CARDBOARD HANDLING




Please breakdown all cardboard so it fits into the cart with the lid closed. Cut oversized material into 2' \times 2' squares.

CONTAINER DO'S

- Keep containers on a hard, level surface clear of snow and other landscaping debris and no more than 6' from edge of curb.
- Please allow containers a 3' perimeter of clearance from obstructions such as parked cars, trees, mailboxes and utility poles. There must also be a 15' over head clearance from any low hanging tree branches or power lines, etc.
- If you have more than one cart placed at the curb, please set them side by side as indicated in the illustration with at least 3' of clearance between the containers. Do not block sidewalk.







CONTAINER DON'TS



Containers must remain upright for pickup



Keep all materials inside the container



Do not place containers back to back



Keep container clear of all obstructions

Town Clerk's Corner

The New Year is here!!!

Here are a few things the Clerk's Office would like to share with you...

As of January, owners may now register or renew their dog's license. Remember, April 30, 2023 is the deadline to have dogs registered. This process can be done in person, by mail or online at www.belmontnh.org. New dogs must be done in person for the first time with proof of current rabies vaccination. The cost for an altered dog is \$6.50, non-altered dog is \$9.00 and if you are a senior owner (65 and older) \$2.00.

Here are a few reasons why you should license your pet:

1. It's the law In the majority of states, it's actually required that dog



owners license their pets. You could get asked to show your dog's license while you're out for a walk, and if you don't have one, you're looking at a decent-sized fine. You'll get a tag that serves as the dog's license, so it should be on their collar at all times.

2. It proves your dog is properly vaccinated You can't license your dog without getting its rabies vaccinations. Knowing your dog has its license makes it easier for the staff at a grooming salon or boarding facility to be assured your dog is healthy.

3. Your dog has a better chance of being returned home if lost In some communities, your pet's license means a free trip home if they're found by local animal control. Without a license, it might mean an expensive overnight stay at the municipal animal shelter.



Running for elected office is one of the best ways you can give back to your community. Whether you want to run for Selectman, Budget Committee, or Planning Board, there are many reasons to give it a shot.

Elected officials have a great deal of power and influence over the daily lives of the residents in the town of Belmont. They can put forth new laws, help create and maintain

fiscal budget responsibilities for the Town, and improve their constituents' quality of living. In this sense, starting a political campaign is a concise and tangible way to make a difference.

First, you must be a registered Belmont voter and complete the candidacy filing at the Town Clerk's Office. The Town Clerk's Office will be accepting candidacy filings beginning January 25, 2023 thru February 03, 2023 Monday through Friday 7:30 AM – 4:00 PM, We will remain open from 4PM – 5PM Friday, February 3rd for

Snow Obstruction and Removal Ordinance

The Town of Belmont has an ordinance regulating snow obstruction and removal. A full, recently updated copy of this ordinance can be found on the Town website. Click the Info Center tab and follow to Ordinances. This policy has been adopted with the intent to protect the safety, health and



welfare of the general public. It regulates removal and placement of snow and ice in areas maintained by Town Personnel and equipment (i.e. Town maintained roads, sidewalks, Fire Hydrants and parking lots). Your Public Works Personnel spend long hours using Department resources to keep Town roads, sidewalks, and parking lots free of snow and ice for residents and visitors. The purpose of this ordinance is to help the Department keep them that way. <u>The placement of snow and ice by any means</u>, during and at the conclusion of a winter event can be dangerous. Snow and ice moved in those areas create hazards by placing physical obstructions such as chunks or windrows across the road. These hazards can then be hit resulting in damage to vehicles or cause accidents due to motorists utilizing evasive maneuvers to miss the obstruction. They can also cause icy conditions as the sun warms the pavement and traffic drives through making the roadway slippery. The Department asks that you <u>do not push snow across the road</u> during and after any winter weather and recently adopted policy changes reflect that. Following this simple request leaves the roads in a safe, travelable condition and prevents the need for crews to be reactivated after storm events allowing them to get much needed rest and time with family.

Driveway Dilemma

Last month winter arrived and brought with it, cold weather, snow and ice. Mid-December, we saw our first accumulating snowfall that left the Town with varying totals of anywhere from 6 to 12 inches of heavy, wet snow. Your Public Works Team did a great job keeping up with what seemed like a never-ending event. While performing clean up duties, a couple members of the team were asked about plowing things differently in an effort to mitigate the amount of snow that ends up in property owners' driveways. The short answer to that is no, but there is a reason. Most trucks are equipped with one direction plows and the wing on the passenger side is always at a fixed angle when deployed. The trucks are designed to clear a path of snow 13 to 14 feet wide from the center of the road and push it to the edge of pavement. The snow from the lane of the roadway being plowed will end up in the maintenance right of way on the property at the edge of the road. There is something that can be done by property owners to lessen the impact to a previously shoveled or plowed driveway. Below, you will find an illustration borrowed from our neighbors to the north about how to prevent the dreaded "Second Shovel". It shows how clearing to the left side of the driveway for approximately 20 feet gives the plow and wing a place to unload built up snow, lessening the amount that gets pushed into the driveway.



Conservation Commission

CONSERVATION COMMISSION

Currier-Sanborn/Tioga Marsh

The Tioga Marsh Conservation Area contains approximately 265 acres and is owned by the Town of Belmont. It is located on the north side of Depot Road along the Belmont/Northfield Town line, about 2.6 miles west Belmont Village. The Conservation area consists of three abutting tracts of land. About 185 acres along the Tioga River were first acquired by the Town in 2004 from Phillip Harker. In 2012, a Conservation Easement was placed on the land and held by the Five Rivers Conservation Trust. Another 79 acres located between the above mentioned tract and the Winnipesaukee River along with .24 acres on the shore of Silver Lake across Gardners Grove Road were acquired in 2018 from the Sanborn Family Trust through the State of New Hampshire Land and Community Heritage Investment Program.



The property is a mixture of woodlands, marsh, and floodplain-forest. As are all of the BCC managed properties, it is open to passive recreation, hunting, and fishing.





Winter, when there is snow cover, is a great time to see what wildlife has been in your yard or neighborhood!

You can also visit one of the Conservation lands to go track hunting!



Some positive permit changes for the beginning of 2023:

- 1. The preferred method of sending your permit to you is via e-mail, or you may come pick it up as always.
- 2. If you would like to have your permit mailed to you, please include a self-addressed, stamped envelope with your application.

We have some additional changes to permit applications moving forward:

- 1. If you are planning to build an ADU apartment there is a ADU application required in addition to the building application.
- 2. There is a major (>300sf) and minor (<300sf) application to streamline large vs. small projects.
- 3. Due to the popularity of solar installations there is a dedicated application for them now.

HOME PERFORMANCE WITH ENERGY STAR® Moderate-Income Program

The Home Performance with ENERGY STAR - Moderate-Income (HPwES-MI) program is open to qualifying customers of Eversource, Liberty Utilities, Until, and NH Electric Cooperative. The HPwES-MI looks to support those NH residents that are over income for Home Energy Assistance (income eligible weatherization program) yet may struggle to cover the customer co-pays in our market rate Home Performance program. HPwES-MI offers higher incentives on weatherization measures and 0% finance options to help cover the customer co-pay.

The program rebate structure is as follows:
