Please note that Casella will continue this program even after automated collection is in place. On the 1st Wednesday of each month, Casella Waste will collect your bulky items curbside. Please note this is for Town of Belmont Residential Customers ONLY; service is not available to commercial property owners. Piles of debris, trash, yard waste or a single item too large for one person to collect WILL NOT BE ACCEPTED.

A request for pickup must be made in advance by calling Town Hall at 267-8300, Extension 118 or 124 only. You will be asked to list the items you want picked up, you will be

The first issue water and sewer bills are due April 6, 2023 The first issue utility bills cover the months of December, January, and February.

As a reminder, you may pay this in person, by mail, our front door drop box or online at <u>www.belmontnh.gov</u>. If you owe a balance from a previous bill, please give our office a call for the updated interest amount.

Delinquent notices were sent out in February to make residents aware of any unpaid balances from 2022. When mailing a payment on the 2022 items, we suggest that you give our office a call so we can help you get the correct payment amount due because of the interest.

April is the time of year that our office sends out Lien letters for residents that are not current on Taxes, Water or Sewer as of December 2022. The Lien process will occur as of May 2023.


Just a reminder that renewals for dog licenses are due for the current year of 2023 by April 30th. You may renew them in person, mail, or online at <u>www.belmontnh.gov</u>, with your dog's current tag number from 2022. If you have a new puppy, we will need a copy of your current rabies vaccination paperwork. Senior dog owners that are 65+, your home will be able to license one dog for \$2.00. All altered dogs will be \$6.50 and non-altered dogs are \$9.00. If your home has 5 or more dogs, you will be charged a group rate of \$20.00.





Are you planning a spring wedding? Our office can help with the marriage license. A marriage license costs \$50.00 and is valid for 90 days. Both parties must be present to apply for the license and if either party has been previously married, they must bring in the official, sealed document showing how that marriage was dissolved. (For example: divorce decree, death certificate, etc.) It does take some time to process a marriage license application so we ask that couples come in no later than 3:30 PM. 6-Wheeled Dump Truck

Last week the Public Works Department took delivery of a new 2023 Western Star 4700 with underbody spreader. This truck replaces Truck 1, an International 6-Wheeled Dump which has been out of service since December of 2021. The Department's Capital Improvement Plan had called for its replacement a couple years prior but the economic climate along with pandemic uncertainties caused a delay. Spring 2022, voters approved the purchase and the truck was ordered. Supply chain issues for both the truck and body manufacturer left us with an undetermined delivery date. Although it is too late to place the truck in service this winter, the Department will be in a better position to combat whatever winter throws our way for the next one. The Team at the Public Works Department would like to take a moment to thank the taxpayers of Belmont, along with the Board of Selectmen and Budget Committee for their support. The entire Team at Your Public Works Department strives to set the standard for Maintenance in the area and the Town of Belmont has ensured the Department has the updated equipment to meet that goal!



BELMONT RAIL TRAIL SIGN IS COMING!



The Heritage Commission members have worked diligently to establish a new sign stating the history behind the Belmont Spur Rail Trail. It will soon be installed at the entrance of the trail. The design of the sign matches the ones located in the Village.

WICKED BIG PUDDLES

Warm spring nights bring a chorus of wood frog and peeper mating songs. It is music to the ears and a sure sign that winter is over. Breeding wood frogs sound like a quacking chorus of ducks. And who can miss the sharp, piercing, bird-like sound of the tiny tree frog, the spring peeper? Here in Belmont, we might take this woodland orchestra for granted. But, did you know that this spring concert is only possi-



ble because of our "wicked big puddles" called vernal pools.

Vernal pools are temporary ponds that contain water for at least 2 months and do not have outlets (such as a river or a stream). Frozen ground helps retain water produced by rains or melting snow. The pools are often completely dry by summer or early fall. This annual drying keeps vernal pools free of fish. Certain species such as wood frogs, salamanders and

fairy shrimp, unable to breed elsewhere, depend upon vernal pools as a fish free nursery for breeding. Otherwise, fish would feed on their vulnerable eggs and young.

In very early spring, frogs and salamanders emerge from hibernation and migrate to the vernal pool

from which they developed. It may take the slow moving nocturnal salamander a few nights to reach the pool. They may have to cross roads and patches of snow to arrive at a pool still mostly covered with ice. Salamanders follow specific paths to their vernal pools. If a road has been built between their over-wintering site and the pool, many will die in the migration as they cross the road. Once mating and egg laying occur, the frogs and salamanders will return to the uplands where they spend most of their



lives (up to 20 years!) in burrows and under logs. *A fist-sized wood frog egg mass, on the right, along with egg masses of spotted salamander (upper) and Jefferson salamander (left).*

Vernal pools are an often-overlooked ecosystem. Because they dry up, they are not always appreciated as an important wetland type. Vernal pools are not only essential to breeding salamanders and frogs but they also influence the entire forest ecosystem by supplying food and water resources for many other organisms such as turtles, ducks, deer and other mammals, red spotted newt, dragonflies, and many other species.

Some development practices can destroy vernal pools and their adjacent habitat. Disturbing the tree canopy allows for quicker warming of the water, hastens evaporation and shortens the time for young amphibi-



ans to develop. Destruction of a pool and its uplands exterminates all the future generation of animals that depend upon the pool. Forestry, construction and agricultural projects could be modified to help protect these vital ecosystems. Some States "certify" vernal pools through the Wetlands Protection Act, which provides protective guidelines for development.

The spotted salamander, Ambystoma maculatum, is a fossorial salamander seldom seen because of its secretive nature and nocturnal feeding habits.



Exploring vernal pools is fun and educational. They are thriving little communities that play a vital role in the forest ecosystem. Visit Belmont's conserved properties (listed on the Town Website) to discover vernal pools. (Hint...The Village Spur trail is a good spot)! This spring when you hear the joyful sound of peepers and wood frogs, remember that their future depends on us.

Think Twice Before Buying Easter Chicks

With Easter coming soon, you'll be seeing ads for Easter chicks. Aww...aren't they cute? However, the Town considers chickens, even the cute little chicks, to be agricultural animals and NOT pets.

Chickens, ducks, guinea hens, pigs, goats, and other agricultural animals are only permitted by Special Exception from the Zoning Board of Adjustment for lots less than three acres in all zoning districts. On lots larger than three acres, agricultural animals are a permitted use in the Residential Multi (RM); Residential Single (RS) and Rural (R) Zones. On lots larger than three acres in the Commercial (C); Industrial (I) and Village (V) agricultural animals are only permitted by Special Exception from the Zoning Board of Adjustment.

If you're not sure what zoning district you live in, check your tax card on the Town website at <u>belmontnh.gov</u> or call the Land Use office at (603) 267-8300 ext. 3 to find out.

from the Building Official

Spring has sprung, and it just might be time to replace those old inefficient windows that have fogged up inside the panes, or perhaps parts of the window frame are starting to show their age (rot), or they just don't open properly like they used to.

Here are some things you should look for before you purchase windows. Ask your contractor or installer what kind of energy efficient features the windows come with.

- Should you purchase vinyl or wood?
- Should they be double-pane, triple-pane or low-E glass?
- What does it mean to have gas-filled panes?
- What is the U-Factor of the windows? (U-Factor generally refers to the energy efficiency of the complete window assembly. The lower the U-Factor, the better the window. Codes in our area require a U-Factor of 0.30 or lower.)
- Be sure to shop around and compare prices.

As always, before starting any building project, please give us a call and we will be happy to help you determine if a permit is required.



The HPwES-MI looks to support those NH residents that are over income for Home Energy Assistance (income eligible weatherization program) yet may struggle to cover the customer co-pays in our market rate Home Performance program. HPwES-MI offers higher incentives on weatherization measures and 0% finance options to help cover the customer co-pay.


