Winter's Arrival

December brings the chance for winter weather and with it, the possibility for the DPW"s fleet of trucks to hit the road. The first of many events took place last month and although minor, they still serve as reminder of what's to come in the following months. Please pay attention to forecasts and allow yourself plenty of time for travel or adjust plans accordingly to avoid travel entirely during winter storms. Your Public Works Department monitors perpetually changing forecasts and is in constant communication with Police, Fire and other Municipal Agencies to be as proactive as possible leading up to and during a winter weather event. The Town of Belmont is fortunate to be fully staffed with a dedicated team of DPW Employees who take pride in what they do. Please exercise caution when you see these maintenance activities underway. The trucks used have limited visibility due to the plow gear, are usually slow moving and take longer to stop, especially in poor weather conditions. Give them the room they need to do their job and they will make sure you have the ability to reach your destination. Thank you!

Mailboxes and Other Winter ROW Obstructions

The Employees of the Town would never intentionally damage anyone's property while taking part in winter maintenance operations, however there is always potential. To mitigate some of these risks, you may see members of the crew out marking hazards with reflective delineation and whips. In most areas the Town of Belmont maintains a 25-foot right of way. The Right of Way (ROW) is utilized for snow storage as banks grow throughout the winter while still providing drainage for snow melt and sight distance at driveways and intersections. Now is a good time to remove anything from the Town's right of way that could be damaged, or cause damage to the Department's fleet. Things like planters, basketball hoops, and lighting that can either be moved back or removed. Necessary adjustments to mailboxes should be made before the ground freezes. You can find specifications for mailbox installation below that will help keep your mailbox safe this winter.

- USPS approved metal mailbox required
- Front of mailbox must be 2 feet from the edge of pavement
- Position your mailbox at a height of 46 inches from the road surface to the bottom of the mailbox support
- House or Apt. number visible on both sides and front of mailbox
- Minimum 4 x 4 wooden support post
- Supporting post should be installed 2 feet below grade and a minimum of 4 feet from the edge of the pavement

There is something about the winter months and curling up with a good book by the fireplace. But did you know that heating equipment is one of the leading causes of home fire deaths? With a few simple safety tips and precautions you can prevent most heating fires from happening.

BE WARM AND SAFE THIS WINTER!

- Keep anything that can burn at least three-feet (one metre) away from heating equipment, like the furnace, fireplace, wood stove, or portable space heater.
- Have a three-foot (one metre) "kid-free zone" around open fires and space heaters.
- Never use your oven to heat your home.
- Have a qualified professional install stationary space heating equipment, water heaters or central heating equipment according to the local codes and manufacturer's instructions.
- Have heating equipment and chimneys cleaned and inspected every year by a qualified professional.
- Remember to turn portable heaters off when leaving the room or going to bed.
- Always use the right kind of fuel, specified by the manufacturer, for fuel burning space heaters.
- Make sure the fireplace has a sturdy screen to stop sparks from flying into the room. Ashes should be cool before putting them in a metal container. Keep the container a safe distance away from your home.
- Test smoke alarms at least once a month.

Heating Equipment Smarts

Install wood burning stoves following manufacturer's instructions or have a professional do the installation. All fuel-burning equipment should be vented to the outside to avoid carbon monoxide (CO) poisoning.

Install and maintain CO alarms to avoid the risk of CO poisoning. If you smell gas in your gas heater, do not light the appliance. Leave the home immediately and call your local fire department or gas company.

FACT

Half of home heating fires are reported during the months of **December**, **January**, and **February**.

As you deck the halls this holiday season, be fire smart. A small fire that spreads to a Christmas tree can grow large very quickly.



PICKING THE TREE

• Choose a tree with fresh, green needles that do not fall off when touched.



PLACING THE TREE

- Before placing the tree in the stand, cut 2" from the base of the trunk.
- Make sure the tree is at least three feet away from any heat source, like fireplaces, radiators, candles, heat vents or lights.
- Make sure the tree is not blocking an exit.
- Add water to the tree stand. Be sure to add water daily.



LIGHTING THE TREE

- Use lights that are listed by a qualified testing laboratory. Some lights are only for indoor or outdoor use.
- Replace any string of lights with worn or broken cords or loose bulb connections. Read manufacturer's instructions for number of light strands to connect.
- Never use lit candles to decorate the tree.
- Always turn off Christmas tree lights before leaving home or going to bed.

After Christmas

Get rid of the tree after Christmas or when it is dry. Dried-out trees are a fire danger and should not be left in the home or garage, or placed outside against the home.

Check with your local community to find a recycling program.

Bring outdoor electrical lights inside after the holidays to prevent hazards and make them last longer.

FACTS

- (1) Almost one third of home Christmas tree fires are caused by electrical problems.
- Although Christmas tree fires are not common, when they do occur, they are more likely to be serious.
- (!) A heat source too close to the tree causes more than **one in every five** of the fires.





REPURPOSING YOUR OLD CHRISTMAS TREE



Compost Your Christmas Tree

If you didn't go with a potted living Christmas tree for the holidays, the most obvious way to give new life to an old tree is to add it to your compost pile. But instead of tossing tree parts into your compost bin all at once, there's a better way to take advantage of all that organic matter.

First, cut the tree into smaller chunks and gather them into a pile in your yard. Let the pile sit until the pine needles have fallen off and the branches are dry and brittle. Then, use these brown materials as a carbon source for your compost bin, as needed.

By saving the pine needles and branches from your dead Christmas tree, you can add brown and green materials in the proper 2:1 ratio to your compost all season long. This helps the compost break down faster and keeps the pile from smelling bad or turning sludgy (a common problem in winter).

Mulch Perennial Beds with the Boughs

Cut off the boughs and layer them on your perennial garden beds as a natural mulch to protect the roots and prevent frost heaving. The branches are an excellent alternative to straw or wood chips, and will break down slowly over winter adding nutrients to the soil for spring. They're heavy enough to not blow away in winter storms yet still allow delicate new shoots to poke through once the weather warms up. Contrary to popular belief, pine needles will not acidify your soil, so there's no need to worry about using pine needles (also called pine straw) as mulch.

Place the Tree Outside and Turn It into a Bird Sanctuary

After taking all the decorations off your tree, move it outdoors (still in the tree stand) and create your own bird sanctuary. You can hang bird feeders and suet cages from the branches, or even a birdhouse or two. Once spring rolls around and birds have more food sources available you can compost the tree or use the now-dried wood for

Turn Your Tree into a Wildlife Habitat

If refilling bird feeders isn't your thing, you can still nurture the mini ecosystem in your yard by turning your old tree into a wildlife habitat. Simply drag it outside to an out-of-the-way spot in your garden and let it sit for the winter, on its side. The branches help attract and protect birds, squirrels, chipmunks, snakes, and other wildlife that might otherwise have a hard time finding shelter in leafless trees and snow drifts. By keeping them cozy in your old Christmas tree, you keep the local wildlife from making themselves at home in your attic, garage, or basement.

Use Branches as Simple Supports for Plants

Strip the sturdiest branches of their needles and cut them into various lengths to use as plant stakes. They're handy for supporting houseplants, vegetable seedlings, and young plants in the garden. These small stakes are also useful for protecting tomatoes and other seedlings from dreaded cutworm damage in spring. Placing a small stick against the stem keeps the cutworm from wrapping itself around the stem and chewing on your plant. The "stick trick" is highly effective for this type of pest control and having a stash of stakes on hand will ensure you win that battle every time.

Important Updates To NH Homeowner Assistance Fund



The New Hampshire Homeowner Assistance Fund has recently updated its Plan and Policy that went into effect at the end of February 2023.

- Program and Assistance Type Caps: Total assistance available per household has been increased to \$40,000 and can be utilized for one or a combination of any of the following:
 - Total assistance available for Mortgage Reinstatement increased to \$40,000
 - Total assistance available for Property Charges increased to \$40,000
 - Total assistance available for Utilities increased to \$5,000
- The six-month waiting period for reapplication has been eliminated.
- Proof of loss mitigation is still required for those requesting mortgage reinstatement assistance; however, if an applicant can show that they have completed loss mitigation any time after January 2020, they will not be required to complete it a second time.

It is still the policy of NH HAF to only cover past due expenses. Expenses are considered past due as early as the day after they are due.

Property taxes fall under the Property Charges assistance type which now has a cap of \$40,000. NH HAF will cover all delinquent taxes, including deferred taxes, up to the assistance cap.

Moderate-Income Program

The Home Performance with ENERGY STAR - Moderate-Income (HPwES-MI) program is open to qualifying customers of Eversource, Liberty Utilities, Until, and NH Electric Cooperative. The HPwES-MI looks to support those NH residents that are over income for Home Energy Assistance (income eligible weatherization program) yet may struggle to cover the customer co-pays in our market rate Home Performance program. HPwES-MI offers higher incentives on weatherization measures and 0% finance options to help cover the customer co-pay.

The program rebate structure is as follows:


