TAX BILLS



Spring tax bills will be in the mail by the end of May and due July 1, 2024, interest will begin to accrue after the 2nd. As a reminder the bills are a prepayment based on the prior year's tax rate and in most instances the prior year's assessed value. We have added value this spring for new construction so if you have any questions regarding your property assessment, please be certain to stop by Town Hall and request a copy of your Assessment Record Card.

BOAT REGISTRATIONS

The Town Clerk's office can process boat registrations. For renewals, bring in your prior year's registration or the renewal notice from the State. For new boats, bring in your detailed



bill of sale and we will get your boat registered and out on the water as soon as possible.



BEACH PASSES

Beach passes are now available! Please bring in your current registration so that we can put your plate number on your beach pass.

DOG LICENSES

Dog licenses are due by April 30th. The month of May is a grace period to renew dog licenses before the \$25 civil forfeiture will be added to the license fees. We can send you a reminder if you provide us with your email address. Effective June 1st there will be an extra \$1 late fee per month in addition to the fees.

Highway Department/Land Use News

Driveways

With the spring season underway, we would like to remind everyone that permits are required for any paving/ repaving/ reconstruction of a driveway or private road. If you are situated on a Town road, applications and regulations are available on our website through the Info Center > option Applications Forms menu & (Belmont Driveway Application). If you are situated on a State road, applications must obtained through NHDOT: be https:// www.dot.nh.gov/services/driveway-permits



Obtaining your driveway permit helps protect our roadways and prevents drainage issues, which helps to reduce Town costs for road repairs.

All paving contractors should be aware of the need for driveway permits, but it is ultimately the responsibility of the property owner to ensure that a permit is obtained, and a final inspection of the finished driveway is completed.

Be sure to submit your application early as processing can take up to two weeks or longer during the busy season. Permits are valid for 6 months after they are issued.

If you have any other questions about a driveway application, please contact the Land Use Department at (603) 267-8300 x3.

If you have questions about construction of your driveway/apron/drainage, please contact our Highway Department at (603) 528-2677.

Please be cautious of paving or other contractors who knock on your door to offer a "special deal". All "door knock" campaigns for services or sales require a Hawkers/ Peddlers permit from the Belmont Police Department.

Working in The Town of Belmont?

If you are excavating or employing a company to perform services on property in the Town of Belmont, please keep a couple of things in mind. The Town of Belmont has ordinances governing work done in public ways and requires a permit prior to the start. The Ordinances are easy to find on the Town website <u>belmontnh.gov</u> and outline the standards and expectations of the Town while working in the right of way. A permit must be submitted and approved prior to the work taking place.

Grilling Safety

There's nothing like outdoor grilling. It's one of the most popular ways to cook food. But, a grill placed too close to anything that can burn is a fire hazard. They can be very hot, causing burn injuries. Follow these simple tips and you will be on the way to safe grilling.

SAFETY TIPS

- Propane and charcoal BBQ grills should only be used outdoors.
- In the grill should be placed well away from the home, deck railings and out from under eaves and overhanging branches.
- W Keep children and pets at least three feet away from the grill area.
- Weep your grill clean by removing grease or fat buildup from the grills and in trays below the grill.
- Mever leave your grill unattended.
- Mail Always make sure your gas grill lid is open before lighting it.

CHARCOAL GRILLS

- In There are several ways to get the charcoal ready to use. Charcoal chimney starters allow you to start the charcoal using newspaper as a fuel.
- If you use a starter fluid, use only charcoal starter fluid. Never add charcoal fluid or any other flammable liquids to the fire.
- W Keep charcoal fluid out of the reach of children and away from heat sources.
- There are also electric charcoal starters, which do not use fire. Be sure to use an extension cord for outdoor use.
- When you are finished grilling, let the coals completely cool before disposing in a metal container.

PROPANE Grills

Check the gas tank hose for leaks before using it for the first time each year. Apply a light soap and water solution to the hose. A propane leak will release bubbles. If your grill has a gas leak, by smell or the soapy bubble test, and there is no flame, turn off both the gas tank and the grill. If the leak stops, get the grill serviced by a professional before using it again. If the leak does not stop, call the fire department. If you smell gas while cooking, immediately get away from the grill and call the fire department. Do not move the grill.

If the flame goes out, turn the grill and gas off and wait at least **5 minutes** before re-lighting it.

Materials Not Acceptable for Burning

- Construction & demolition debris
- Tires
- Household trash
- Packaging materials
- Plastics
- Coated or laminated paper
- Coated or treated cardboard
- Oily rags
- Animal, vegetable and kitchen waste
- Used Oil, gasoline and hazardous waste
- Brush greater than 5 inches in diameter
- Any wood that has been painted/ stained, glued, or treated in any way





Materials Acceptable for Burning

- Campfire wood
- Charcoal
- Clean pallets
- If generated on-site
- Brush (less than 5 inches in diameter)
- Clean lumber scraps (private single family residences only)

Burning construction & demolition debris and household trash releases toxic air pollutants, creates potentially hazardous ash, and puts your family, neighbors, and the environment at risk.



All burning must be conducted in accordance with local ordinances and under a "Permit To Kindle Fire" issued by the local Fire Warden or authorized agent.

- Verify licenses and insurance.

- Sign a contract and negotiate ground rules.
- Make sure all necessary permits are acquired.
- Expect to pay a deposit.
- Budget for unexpected costs.
- Talk to the contractor frequently.
- Get lien releases and receipts.
- Don't make the final payment until the job is complete.

Heritage Commission Honors Linda Frawley

News traveled very fast and townspeople were shocked to hear of the sudden passing of Linda Frawley on March 8th. Linda was one of the founders of the Belmont Heritage Commission (2004) and served as Chairman and Vice Chairman as well. She was also a past member of the Historical Society. The list is endless for all that she gave through hard work, determination and persistence to accomplish all she did for Belmont. Linda Frawley was a catalyst for Belmont during the 1996 and 2010 Plan New Hampshire Charrettes. She served on the Town Budget Committee and the Village Revitalization Committee. Linda's determination to improve the town's knowledge about its heritage and acknowledge its history brought distinct awards to Belmont. Some notable ones include the Land and Community Heritage Improvement Project Award for the restoration of the 1908 Belmont Bandstand from the New Hampshire Preservation Alliance and the Victorian Society of America Preservation Award for the Belmont Linda spearheaded Belmont's eligibility to be added to the state Mill. register of historic places for the Province Road Meeting House, the Belmont Mill and the Belmont Bandstand. The historical state marker for the Belmont Mill located on Route 140 is another highlight of her tenure as Heritage Commission Chairman. Her guidance, support, dedication and extreme knowledge of the Town of Belmont's history go hand in hand. She and Wallace Rhodes, Belmont's Town Historian, were quite the team as they shared a strong belief in saving and honoring special Belmont landmarks. Linda was a true champion for maintaining the history and heritage of our town and she will be greatly missed. The knowledge she shared was immeasurable for Belmont. Our town will forever be indebted for what Linda Frawley accomplished to make Belmont's history important for all to remember.

A special dedication for Linda Frawley will be held in the Fall.

Silent Spring and the Modern Environmental Movement

In 1962, Rachel Carson published *Silent Spring*, a "landmark literary piece of the 20th century" that focused on the environmental impact of the use of pesticides, such as DDT.^[1] Unfortunately, Carson and her work were met with bitterness and discrimination. Large corporations did not want to see their steady flow of profit cut off by the banning of pesticides and Carson's peers, mainly male biologists, criticized her credentials simply because she was a woman. *Silent Spring* made its mark on this world by paving a way for new laws, new communities, new agencies, and most importantly, it helped prompt the modern environmental movement.

Rachel Carson was a pioneer in the field of marine biology. Growing up in Pittsburgh, she was no stranger to the air pollution caused by big plants and factories. As she got older, she began to write articles and journals about how this pollution affected ocean life, and how little regulation the output of these chemicals had.



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Carson's thesis throughout Silent Spring was that pesticides and chemicals used to

kill pests on crops bleed into the environment and affect our water sources. These chemicals are involuntarily ingested by larger creatures when they eat poisoned insects. This could create a lethal cause and effect that could be harmful for future generations of plants, creatures, and humans. A secondary problem would come from pests becoming resistant to the pesticides, which would lead companies to create stronger, more dangerous chemicals. Three days after Silent Spring was published, the United Farm Workers convention took place, in which hard data was brought forward of the risks that pesticides had on humans. There were first-hand accounts of "skin rashes, dizziness and nausea, respiratory ailments...cancers and death faced by the farmworkers due to pesticide exposure."^[2] This was one of Carson's major points–pesticides that were used before the 1950's would be prevalent in species the next fifty to a hundred years in the future.

Although the book would eventually gain support, it first had to fight many battles. During the 1950s, female and male scientists had different outlooks on the world. Carson wrote that "the balance of nature...is a complex, precise, and highly integrated system of relationships between living things which cannot safely be ignored any more than the law of gravity can be defied with impunity by a man perched on the edge of a cliff...Man, too, is part of this balance."^[3] The words she chose were poetic, and they expressed a deep connection to the natural world. These were determined as characteristics of being a woman. Therefore, she was discredited as a scientist. These remarks paired with a volley of negative book reviews from chemical plants and threatened corporations, all boiled down to the fact "she was a woman and she was challenging a cornerstone of industrial capitalism with a passion considered unbecoming of a scientist."^[4]

Silent Spring would be "the fuse that triggered the explosion culminating in the current wave of environmental activism..."^[5] Thus, the modern environmental movement was born. It consisted of a growing consensus that the environment needed to be taken care of as humanity progressed. In the early 1970s, the use of DDT and other pesticides like it were banned in the United States and Canada. Rachel Carson had created a legacy–she had succeeded in being a catalyst of change to the dangers of using pesticides.

The Trustees are excited to welcome our newest board member. Fred Wells was elected this year for a 3-year term in March. Welcome Fred, we are looking forward to working with you. While we are happy to welcome our new member, we want to acknowledge the loss of Sharon Ciampi from the board. She spent 15 years as a Cemetery Trustee. You may know her now as a Selectman of our town. As a Cemetery Trustee, she spearheaded the effort to bring the Wreaths Across America Project to our small town. Now, because of her efforts and the assistance of American Legion Post 58, we hold a special ceremony in December each year to honor our fallen heroes for the Holidays. Thank you, Sharon, for your many years of dedication to the board and we wish you well with all of your future endeavors. We also reappointed our alternates Norma Patten for 1 year and Kevin Sturgeon for 3 years.

In March the Board of Selectmen granted our request to declare 7 of our cemeteries abandoned, giving the trustees right of descendant ship, allowing us to provide all aspects of protection and preservation.

Memorial Day is a federal holiday in the United States for honoring and mourning the U.S. military personnel who died while serving in the United States Armed Forces. We would like to share one with you.

Phillips O. Swain born June 30, 1926. He was the son of Samuel and Dorothy Swain and lived on Concord Street. He enlisted in the Service on September 21, 1944 and was assigned to the Brty. A 155 ABN. AA. 17th Airborne Division. The 17th Airborne Division, "The Golden Talons", was an airborne infantry division of the United States Army during World War II, commanded by Major General William M. Miley. Phillips was KIA on March 25th, 1945 In Wesel, Germany. Presumably during Operation Varsity that launched March 24th, 1945. Records indicate that his aircraft was shot down. He was 18 years, 8 months and 25 days old and was buried in Highland Cemetery on October 23, 1948. Please take a moment over the holiday weekend to reflect on him and the many others like him who served and gave the ultimate sacrifice.

New Hampshire's One-Room Rural Schools: The Romance and the Reality - May 14th Belmont Mill

(Hosted by the Belmont Historical Society)

Hundreds of one-room schools dotted the landscape of New Hampshire



a century ago and were the backbone of primary education for generations of children. Revered in literature and lore, they actually were beset with problems, some of which are little changed today. The greatest issue was financing the local school and the vast differences between taxing districts in ability to support education. Other concerns included teacher preparation and quality, curriculum, discipline, student achievement and

community involvement in the educational process.

This program is hosted by the Belmont Historical Society with *funding provided thru the NH Humanities and the Belmont Sargent Fund*. The program will be held on **Tuesday, May 14th at 7 pm** on the 4th floor of the Belmont Mill located at 14 Mill St. Presenter, Steve Taylor, will explore the lasting legacies of the one-room school and how they echo today. This program is free, open to the public and is handicapped accessible. (Attendees please use rear door by the elevator)

Steve Taylor is a scholar, farmer, journalist and longtime public official. With his sons, he operates a dairy, maple syrup and cheese-making enterprise in Meriden Village. He has been a newspaper reporter and editor, and served for 25 years as New Hampshire's commissioner of agriculture. Taylor was the founding executive director of the New Hampshire Humanities Council, has been a lifelong

student of the state's rural culture and is devoted to preserving New Hampshire's history.
