LEGISLATION

The Board of Selectmen and Town Staff continue to watch for any legislative updates that could negatively impact the Town, and to advocate for the Town's best interests. Some of the proposed updates could take local control away from municipalities for zoning regulations, reduce revenue from permitting, and increase costs to towns and cities by allowing persons other than citizens to make Right to Know requests.

BUDGETING

The State Budget process is moving forward with hearings scheduled next week. There are some potential adverse impacts that could affect towns and municipalities such as reducing the municipal share of the rooms and meals tax. The County budget has made reductions to budget appropriations for social services which could force towns to should more of the financial burden.

Low to Moderate Income Homeowners Property Tax Relief

Low and moderate income homeowners may be eligible for additional property tax relief through the State of New Hampshire.

If you own or have interest in a home subject to the State Education Property Tax, reside in the home as of April 1st, and have a household income of \$37,000 or less for a single person or \$47,000 or less for a married couple or Head of Household you may qualify.

As a courtesy, the State DP-8 Form and Instructions are available in hard copy format at the Belmont Town Hall.

Rechargeable Battery Disposal Ban !

Starting July 1, 2025, rechargeable lithium-ion **batteries will be prohibited from disposal** in New Hampshire's landfills and incinerators. Lithium-ion batteries are used in a wide variety of consumer products, including:



- Automotive vehicles.
- Electric bikes and scooters, lawncare equipment.
- Portable electronics such as cell phones, laptops, tablets, cameras, wireless headphones, speakers, toothbrushes and other rechargeable electronic devices.
- Cordless power tools and toys.

Why is there a disposal ban?

Lithium-ion batteries contain hazardous metals and can pose safety hazards when improperly managed. When crushed or damaged in any way, they can ignite – causing intense fires. For these reasons, lithium-**ion batteries** should never be put in the trash or curbside recycling bin! Lithium-ion batteries have become a leading cause of fires for trash haulers and waste management facilities. A recent <u>report by the National Waste and Recycling</u> <u>Association</u> estimates that each year more than 5,000 fires occur at waste management facilities nationwide, many likely caused by lithium-ion batteries. Fires are not only a safety hazard to waste staff and the public; they also can result in hundreds of thousands of dollars in damages to expensive equipment and buildings.

In an effort to reduce the safety risks associated with improper disposal of lithium-ion batteries, New Hampshire State Rep. Karen Ebel introduced <u>HB 1386</u>, which proposed to add such batteries to <u>the list of wastes already</u> <u>banned from disposal</u>. The bill gained the support of the <u>New Hampshire Solid Waste Working Group</u>, industry experts, waste haulers and municipalities, and was signed into law by Governor Sununu.

Who does the ban apply to?

Starting July 2025, households and businesses must recycle their lithium-ion batteries. Lithium-ion batteries must be recycled through special battery collection programs – never mixed with regular recyclables.

Where can I recycle my lithium-ion batteries?

Many New Hampshire municipalities and businesses, like <u>Staples</u>, <u>Best Buy</u> or <u>BatteriesPlus</u> offer collection boxes for recycling rechargeable batteries. To find a drop-off site nearest to you, contact your local transfer station, check <u>Call2Recycle.org</u>, or visit one of the retail locations mentioned above.

Remember – if it's rechargeable, it's recyclable!

Town Clerk's Corner



The warmer weather has finally arrived and the Lakes are calling your name! Stop by with your car registration for your beach stickers.

The Town Clerk's office can process your boat registrations; new or a renewal. For renewals, bring in your prior year's registration or the renewal notice from the State. If you've recently purchased a boat, you will need a detailed bill of sale and vessel verification (MCO, previous owner's registration, HIN verification). **AS A REMINDER:** House Bill 1304 became law, effective 1/1/2025 for the 2025 boating season. This law change requires the issuance and display of a boat fee decal for the payment of boat fees. You will notice that the fee will be increased by \$3.00, and you will receive two sets of decals that must be displayed on each side of the bow.

Last call on the dog licenses! Dog licenses were due April 30th; we do offer the month of May as a grace period to complete licensing before the \$25 civil forfeiture will be added to the license fees. Effective June 1st there will be a late fee of one dollar per month on top of the license fees. We are happy to add your email address to your profile to receive the yearly e-reminder.

You may have recently received a certified letter in the mail stating an intent to lien; this is in regards to any outstanding balances owed from 2024. The lien notice informs the property owner they have 30 days to pay the amount owed in full. The lien date is set for May 19, 2025 and will be recorded at the Registry of Deeds.

The 2025 1st issue tax bill will be sent out at the end of this month, or beginning of June, and will be due in July. The first issue covers April 1st – September 30th, and is considered an estimated bill (it is half of the total amount of taxes due in 2024) until the New Hampshire Department of Revenue Administration sets the tax rate in the fall.

The 2^{nd} issue water/sewer bill will also hit mailboxes mid-June. This period covers March 1^{st} – May 31^{st} , and will be due in July.

Spring Hydrant Flushing

In an effort to maintain water quality, the Town of Belmont, with help from its partners at Pennichuck Water Works, will be flushing all Town-owned fire hydrants between May 19th and May 23rd. This process may discolor or affect water pressure, but is not harmful. If discoloration occurs, run cold water until color returns to normal.





Dirt Road Maintenance

Every year the spring thaw leads to muddy dirt roads for an uncertain amount of time. With frost depths reaching greater than 5 feet in spots, the 2025 spring thaw was surprisingly painless. Credit can go to the slow but steady rise in temps once April arrived, allowing frost to subside slowly. Once road bans lifted we hit the roads with the grader but were stopped abruptly by a couple of minor breakdowns. A 1996 Champion Grader places it around the 30-year mark and makes the acquisition of parts more difficult. After almost two weeks, the wheels are turning again. We are actively out grading and raking roads to remove

potholes and washboard areas and restore the crown winter maintenance removes. Grading roads to re-establish a center crown allowing water to run off into the ditches will ensure a safe, smooth ride that will last for some time. This spring, your Public Works Department has a couple of new team members who showed interest in spending a little time behind the "Antler Rack" (the grader's controls). Our Operator Chris was happy to share his knowledge and experience, so the Department decided it could invest some extra time and give the new recruits a chance to learn and grow. It takes a little longer to get around to every road, but Belmont will have another team member or two who can help out if Chris is unavailable to get things back into shape.

WATER Department Notice

Unknown Water Service Line Material

Because of new federal requirements for lead in drinking water, water systems must notify water users that we do not have a record of the piping materials for individual water service lines. Letters have been mailed to all water system customers. The good news is that you can help your water system assess, and where necessary, make improvements to your water service lines.

If your property is serviced by a private well, this notice does not apply to you.

It is very important that the Town meet the federal requirements to determine if any properties in Belmont have lead service lines. We strongly encourage all water system users to reach out to us for assistance. Please call us at (603) 267-8300 xt 115 or email us at water@belmontnh.gov

Why are you receiving this letter?

Because of new federal requirements for lead in drinking water, water systems must notify you that we do not have a record of the piping materials of your water service line. You and other water system customers are receiving this or a similar letter. The good news is that you can help your water system assess, and where necessary, make improvements to your water service lines. Please contact us via the phone or email below for assistance to report your service line materials. Until then, please follow the simple steps below recommended for everyone to prevent potential exposure to lead in drinking water.

What are the Health Effects of Lead?

The Environmental Protection Agency requires we inform you the following: *Exposure to lead in drinking water can cause serious health effects in all age groups. Infants and children can have decreases in IQ and attention span. Lead exposure can lead to new learning and behavior problems or worsen existing learning and behavior problems. The children of women who are exposed to lead before or during pregnancy can have increased risk of these negative health effects. Adults can have increased risks of heart disease, high blood pressure, and kidney, or nervous system problems.*

What Can I Do to Reduce Exposure to lead in Drinking Water?

In addition to your service line (see figure on back), other plumbing in your home may contain lead and could increase the levels of lead in your drinking water. These may include faucets, valves, and soldered joints. Please contact us via the phone / email below to request a free water test and to confirm your service line materials. if you're concerned about lead, the following measures can help you prevent potential lead exposure from any drinking water plumbing:

- Identify your service line materials. Contact your water system email / phone listed below for assistance to identify your service line materials.
- Run your water to flush out lead. If the water hasn't been used for several hours (such as in the morning), run the water for 1 minute or more to flush potential lead from interior plumbing before using it for drinking or cooking.
- Use cold water for cooking and preparing baby formula.
- Do NOT boil water to attempt to remove lead.
- For pregnant persons, infants, and young children, look for alternative sources or treatment of water such as bottled water or use water filters certified for lead removal.
- Identify and replace home plumbing fixtures containing lead.

Applying for your Fireworks Permit

Permit Application and required documentation are to be turned in to the Belmont Fire Department at least 24-hours before the anticipated discharge of the fireworks display. This will allow the Department members to schedule inspections in a timely manner. Be advised that inspections will be scheduled after any and all emergency calls taking place that day.

Fireworks Requirements


- 1. Applicant must be 21 years of age or older.
- 2. Applicant must produce a valid form of ID.
- 3. Applicant must be the property owner, or produce written consent from the property owner to discharge Class 'C' fireworks on their property.
- Applicant must notify owners of abutting properties of the date and time of the fireworks display.
- 5. Applicant must produce a sketch of the area in which the fireworks display will be discharged from.


Moving forward and bringing on two fantastic additions to our agency!



Door-to-Door Sales & Solicitation: Know the Rules in Belmont

We'd like to remind residents that Belmont has an ordinance for Hawkers & Peddlers. Permits are required for any individual going door-to-door in Belmont to sell goods or services. Per Town ordinance, an applicant must:

- Register with the State of New Hampshire and the Town of Belmont
- Submit a certified copy of their criminal and motor vehicle records from both their state of residence and the State of NH
- Provide a copy of their Hawkers & Peddlers permit issued by the NH Department of State
- Submit certified records for all employees who will be engaging in door-to-door activities

▲ Unpermitted individuals should be reported to the Belmont Police Department immediately. Violators may be fined \$500.00 for a first offense.

Even if someone is properly registered and vetted, it's important to remember:

No one has the right to remain on your property after being told to leave. If you ask someone to leave and they do not, call us at (603) 267-8351.

C Vetted Eversource Contractors Conducting Utility Pole Inspections in Belmont

Over the next several weeks, you'll see crews working around town inspecting the structural integrity of approximately 3,200 **utility poles** throughout Belmont. We want to assure our residents that these crews are **vetted subcontractors working on** behalf of Eversource, and their presence is expected.

Their work includes:

- Setting up signage and coning off work areas
- Taking inventory of pole components
- Measuring pole height with a range finder
- Z Taking three photos per pole (only shared with Eversource)
- Drilling into the base of each pole using a specialized IML Resistograph
- to test structural integrity

If a pole is deemed unsafe, it will be clearly marked with:

- A red and white ribbon
- A yellow "X"
- A reject tag pointing in the direction the pole failed

Eversource will then schedule a replacement.





For poles located on private property, crews will knock twice to inform residents before beginning. If no one answers, they will proceed with their work. We've also included photos in this issue to help you identify the tools they'll be carrying.

Work in Belmont is expected to begin this Friday or Monday, depending on progress in Northfield. The entire project should take 3–4 weeks to complete.

Route 106 High Visibility Campaign a Success – More to Come!

The Belmont Police Department recently took part in a High Visibility Enforcement Campaign along Route 106—and we're proud to report strong results. Hundreds of motor **vehicle violations were stopped**, with drivers receiving either summonses or warnings, and several arrests were made.

We've heard our community loud and clear: traffic enforcement looking for aggressive, distracted and impaired driving is a top priority. Despite the challenges of a **tight budget**, we are committed to meeting these expectations. Our team is actively seeking and using **creative funding avenues**, such as state and federal grants, to put more officers on the streets during high-demand times to address traffic and safety concerns.

This proactive effort continues into May, as we join the **Statewide DWI Saturation Patrol** from May 3rd to May 5th, 2025, during Cinco de Mayo weekend. This initiative, funded through a grant, will allow us to deploy extra officers focused solely on **detecting and** deterring impaired drivers.







Typically in this part of the region, asphalt shingles and metal roofing are the most popular and least expensive.

Be sure to get multiple quotes, as there are many roofing contractors available. Roofing and building contractors are not required to be licensed by the State of New Hampshire. Check your contract to be certain the contractor is fully insured. Make sure that you are comfortable with the person/company you contract with. Consider asking for references.

Check your contractor's payment policy. Some contractors require one-half upfront, and one-half when completed. Be cautious about paying more than half upfront.

No permit is required for roofing as long as no structural changes are needed. Please note that you can have no more than two layers of asphalt shingles on your roof.

The Role of the Conservation Commission

New Hampshire Conservation Commissions receive their authority from the State through Revised Statutes Annotated Chapter 36-A. This statute authorizes municipalities to establish Conservation Commissions "for the proper utilization and protection of the natural resources and for the protection of watershed resources".

Such Commission shall:

- conduct researches into its local land and water areas and shall seek to coordinate the activities of unofficial bodies organized for similar purposes, and may advertise, prepare, print and distribute books, maps, charts, plans and pamphlets which in its judgment it deems necessary for its work;
- keep an index of all open space and natural, aesthetic or ecological areas within the city
 or town, as the case may be, with the plan of obtaining information pertinent to proper
 utilization of such areas, including lands owned by the state or lands owned by a town or
 city;
- 3. keep an index of all marshlands, swamps and all other wet lands in a like manner, and may recommend to the Board of Selectmen a program for the protection, development or better utilization of all such areas;
- 4. keep accurate records of its meetings and actions and shall file an annual report which shall be printed in the Town of Belmont Annual Report.

Powers and Duties of the Conservation Commission

The Board of Selectmen must give approval before the Conservation Commission can accept gifts of money and property or acquire property in the name of the Town. The Conservation Commission has no power to enact regulations or act in a law enforcement capacity. Other municipal boards may call upon the Conservation Commission for advice on natural resource issues.

Conservation Commission's Role in Managing Town Land

When gifts of property are given to the Conservation Commission or when the Conservation Commission acquires property subject to approval of the Selectmen, RSA 36-A:4 states that the Conservation Commission "shall manage and control" them. Acceptance of such gifts and acquisitions of land are done through the Conservation Commission, but "in the name of the Town." other open land owned by the Town.

Conservation Commission's Role in Managing Town Land (cont.)

In addition, RSA 31:112 permits towns to acquire land as Town Forests, and the Town Meeting can vote to designate the Conservation Commission as the authority for managing the Town Forest. These are the only properties the Conservation Commission may manage. It cannot make decision regarding the management of other town land, such as ball fields and other open land owned by the Town.

The Conservation Commission can make all the decisions involved in managing and controlling conservation land, such as what activities are permitted or prohibited on the property, contracting for services required in managing property, appointing volunteers to carry out duties regarding maintenance on the property.

Sources of Conservation Fund Revenue

The Town of Belmont has voted to appropriate to the Conservation Fund all of the Land Use Change Tax (LUCT) revenue received when properties are removed from the Current Use Program. In addition, gifts of money to the Conservation Commission for the acquisition of conservation land or easements may be placed in the Conservation Fund pursuant to RSA 36-A:4. Town Meeting may also vote to permit money it has appropriated to the Conservation Commission to be placed in the Conservation Fund.




