That is why my top recommendation is: <u>THE BIG BOOK OF CHRISTMAS</u> <u>MYSTERIES</u> a collection of short Christmas time mysteries featuring favorite sleuths like Inspector Morse, Miss Marple, Rumpole, and Sherlock Holmes himself. These are stories you can finish in a sitting while you wait for cookies to cool or when you come in to warm up from snow shoveling!

If you, like me, think of winter as the indoor season try <u>COZY: THE ART OF ARRANGING YOURSELF IN</u> <u>THE WORLD</u>. This non-fiction offering marries fun anecdotes with ideas and meditations on how to bring a feeling of safety and comfort to any aspect of your life from your favorite reading chair to hospital stays. Cozy can be found everywhere, if you know where to look.

The holiday season is also a time of stress. It seems like there is always something to worry about from family get-togethers to hazardous weather.
