

What is Phonics?

Phonics is a way of teaching reading. Children learn the sounds of individual letters and how those letters sound when they're combined. When you say "sound out the word," you are using phonics! Children learn the sounds associated with the letters or group of letters. A majority of words are completely phonetic, and letter-sounds are still the best clue to deciphering the others. By learning phonics, children can more easily decode a word they are not familiar with, thereby expanding their vocabulary.

"It is important not to postpone teaching reading too long, waiting for youngsters to show some sort of "readiness." Talk and Walk with your Child

Chat with your baby or child when you are out and about.

Words are all around, not just in books.



Show them words on items in the grocery store.

Pick up an apple and teach the beginning sound A. "Does apricot start with the same sound?"

Talk about what you see as you walk: the weather, what you hear or smell, animals, cars, bikes, a spiderweb, a leaf.

Sing a song or a nursery rhyme.

Give your child time to think and respond when you talk to them.

Follow what your child is seeing or doing. Showing your child you're interested in what they do and say boosts their confidence.

It's Easy!


- Read ANY book











A story of a forgotten school bus that finds happiness and purpose in the most unexpected places--and the journey along the way. By the author of the Otis books.
