May 6, 1963

Regular meeting of the Library Board was held Monday, May 6, 1963. Meeting called to order at 7 p.m. by president Sara Eudora Crist. Members present, Helen Goble, Jane Kilchenman, Alys Saxton, Janice Zink. Absent, Evelyn Granzow.

Mrs. Zink was appointed to order flowers for the Schultz-Holmes lot at Pleasant View cemetery for Memorial Day at a cost of \$5.00.

The secretary's report was read and accepted. The treasurer's report, showing a balance on hand May 1 of \$5451.97, was read and accepted.

Balance in petty cash was \$3.65.

Charles Kohler Jr., and Donald Bettis, of the library committee from the Village Council attended the meeting to discuss the budget for the year. Operation of the library was explained briefly by librarian Miss Carol Goff. Library budgets for the past several years were reviewed. Mr. Kohler and Mr. Bettis asked that copies be made available to them before the next meeting of the Village Council, May 13, so a misunderstanding of fiscal year balance in the library fund could be straightened out. The committee assumed that the balance of \$5451.97 of May 1 was to carry us only through May and June, to the end of the fiscal year, and cut allocation from 1.70 mills to .70 mills. Actually the balance on this date must be sufficient to cover majority of expenses until Sept. 1, (1.70 mills on '63 roll would be \$8,508.50)

or Oct. 1, when we receive our allocation from the village tax roll. The secretary was instructed to make such copies, 1957 through the current year, from figures compiled by the treasurer. Members discussed ways of cutting expenses. It was voted to discontinue carrying monthly circulation report in the secretary's records. Members agreed to a request from Duane DeLoach that the library be used for exhibit of works of local artists during Michigan Week, May 19-25. The secretary was instructed to request Dunbar-Borton to check on the library air conditioner when they were in town. Memorial books were ordered, "Treasury of Favorite Poems" for Bertine Lamley and one on Myths for Mrs. Keeler. It was decided to put out two memorial books for Mrs. Weller and two for L. B. Hall, which have been delivered, and the rest when they arrive.

July 1, 1963

Regular meeting of the Library Board was called to order at 7 p.m. by president Sara Eudora Crist with all members except Janice present. Donald Bettis of the village council library committee attended the meeting. A request was made at the last council meeting by the Blissfield Service Club that the rental of the auditorium of the library be reduced for their club because of the many gifts the club has made to the auditorium, a request which the council referred to the library committee. The committee, in turn, referring the request to the library board, which at the June meeting decided an increase in rentals might be in order. Mr. Bettis suggested we might consider a contract rate, for a year, as a solution. He also suggested that auditorium expenses could be lowered by cutting the heat to a minimum in the winter, when ~~the room is not in use~~ and doing the same with air conditioning in the summer, when the room is not in use. He asked about obtaining state aid and Mrs. Crist offered to look into it. Members decided to change the rental schedule, subject to comparison with rentals of similar facilities in adjoining communities, from \$6.00 ³ to \$10.00 for ~~four~~ hours for evenings and Sundays, \$1.50 for each additional hour or fraction thereof, and leave week-day rental at the present rate of \$4.00 for 3 hours, doors to be open $\frac{1}{2}$ hour before and after meetings as at present. When ~~the~~ ^{Mrs. Crist} receives replies to requests for comparative rentals, full report ~~will~~ ^{will} be given to the library committee. Members discussed the possibility of putting a cord across the doors from the auditorium into the library, since the doors cannot be locked because

of fire laws, to keep auditorium users from also using the library rooms. The secretary's report was read and accepted. The treasurer reported expenses of \$662.52 and receipts of \$343.81, with balance on hand of \$4,404.55. Library reports were read by Evelyn Granzow. Refreshing iced tea was served by Mrs. Crist and meeting adjourned.

The meeting of the library board was called to order at 7 o'clock by Sara Eudora Crist, with all members except Janice Zink present. The secretary's report was read and accepted. The treasurer reported a balance on hand of \$3,668.52. Her yearly report showed a balance of \$4,424.08 July 1, 1962, receipts during the year, \$9,302.76, expenses \$9,322.29, leaving a balance June 30, 1963 of ~~\$2~~ \$4,404.55. Library reports were read by Helen Goble and Evelyn Granzow. Letters were received from libraries with auditoriums at Sylvania, with seating capacity of each request for 100, where/rentals ~~xxxxxxxxxxxxxxxxxxxxxxxxxxxxxxxx~~ is given individual attention; Clinton, no auditorium; Tecumseh, community center, with kitchen, \$10:00 rental, up; Adrian, no rental charged for their meeting room anymore. September 1963

The September meeting of the Library Board was called to order at 7 p.m. Monday, Sept. 9, by Sara Eudora Crist, with all members except Helen Goble present. The treasurer's report was read and accepted; balance on hand Aug. 1, \$3,668.52, receipts \$11.30, including \$9.50 for auditorium rent, expenses, \$787.16, leaving a balance on hand of \$2,892.66. Library reports were read by Evelyn Granzow and Janice Zink. Mrs. Granzow on the cost of installing a velvet rope across the doors from the auditorium into the library. The project was dropped because it was felt that it was too expensive. Members voted to order a new bookshelf for the children's department, which is too crowded at present. Librarian Carol Goff was authorized to purchase a reference book requested by students and to check on purchase of an illustrated children's dictionary for intermediate grade students. It was agreed that high school students be permitted a wide choice of books for book reports. The village council increased the appropriation to the library fund to 1.4 mills, which, with the balance on hand at the beginning of the year would amount to approximately \$11,000 for the fiscal year. Regular meeting of the Library Board was called to order at 7 p.m. by president Sarah Eudora Crist with two members, Jane Kilchenman and Evelyn Granzow, absent. The treasurer's report, read by Janice Zink, showed a balance on hand Nov. 1 of \$8,654.01, receipts of \$14.53 and expenses of \$670.22, leaving a balance Dec. 1 of \$7,989.32. Library reports were read by Mrs. Zink. New hours seem to be very popular with not much time for clerical work. It was decided to keep the present schedule another month, and if necessary then, increase Alice Gurica's hours. The library was broken into during the night of Nov. 7 and about ^{\$18.27}~~\$16~~ in change stolen from the librarian's desk on which the lock was broken. Entrance was gained by forcing the double aluminum doors to the auditorium on the south side of the building, after failing to force the lock on the back door. The money stolen included between \$8 and \$9 being held as refunds to patrons who have overpaid fines in books dropped into the slot. The loss is not covered by insurance. It was reported the doors could be repaired and the corresponding secretary was requested to inquire about obtaining a new lock for the librarian's desk, which she was instructed to leave unlocked. The parking light at the rear of the library was taken off the midnight shut-off time and will remain on until 6 a.m. Inquiries are to be made on cost of installing another light to shine down the south driveway. A balance of \$10.82 was reported in the fund for memorial books for Mrs. Keeler, which will be used to purchase books on "Greece" when available.
