Drinking fountain repairs are to be taken care of by Ken Schaedler. It was decided to close the library at 5 p.m. on Maundy Thursday. Regular meeting of the Library Board was called to order at 7 p.m. by Helen Goble, president, with all members present. The treasurer reported a balance on hand April 30 of \$2,428.75, including interest of \$60 on the certificate of deposit. An application, received from Debra Adkins, Grosvenor Hwy., to work part time, was placed on file, as no ~~xxxxxxx~~ additional new help will be needed this summer as far as we know. She will be 15 in August. Students completing the sixth grade are coming to the library in five groups starting Michigan Week, and continuing through May 31, to move up to the Teen Age reading section and have their cards stamped with a "T". A list of children's reference books was sent to Miss Engel, elementary supervisor. A new list is to be sent every 6 months to keep teachers posted on material available. Mrs. Zink was named to order a memorial wreath for the Schultz-Holmes lot at the cemetery for Memorial Day. Members discussed parking in the driveway, widening the driveway and black-topping the back. The budget was sent to the Council for their meeting this evening when they are making out their budget for the coming year. The auditorium has been rented for a Dodge Mobile Homes Rally May 20 to 22, with those attending parking their mobile homes on Ellis Playgrounds. The resignation of Susan Huttula was accepted, effective June 1. She and her husband are moving to California. It was decided to invite former board members to the regular meeting June 6.

May 23

An informal special meeting of the Library Board was held to discuss appointment of a replacement for Mrs. Huttula on the board and to decide on purchase of a new lawn mower. Mrs. Richard Burns ~~was~~ accepted the invitation of the board to become a member for the remainder of the year, ~~subject to appointment by the council~~. Members decided to ~~xxxxxxxxxxxxxxxxxxxxxxxxxxxxxxxx~~ ask the library committee to have Al Curnow purchase a ~~xxx~~ power lawn mower to be used only at the library. It was also decided that 24 hours notice be asked for cancellation of auditorium rental.

Regular meeting of the Library Board was called to order at 7 p.m. by president Helen Goble with all members but Janice Zink present. The treasurer reported a balance June 30 of \$918.46. A 12-month report, July 1965 to July 1966 was compiled by librarian Carol Goff, showing a total of \$49.81 received in gift book money and \$5.88 paid in for lost books. Reports were read by Sara Crist and Evelyn Burns. Mrs. Crist reported that she had contacted Mrs. J. T. Carpenter, Jr., with the suggestion that the Service Club serve a tea at an open house Nov. 1 during the anniversary observance, and Mrs. Carpenter thought the members would agree. Black-topping of the parking lot at the rear of the library was discussed and it was decided to ask DPW Supt. Al Curnow for an estimate. The air conditioner was inspected by Dunbar-Borton on June 20th and found to be in good shape. When the conditioner was turned on the following day there was an odor of burning cord and it was turned off, but the odor came from a burned out connection on a light near the magazine rack, which is to be repaired. Mrs. Al Diedrich will act as replacement during vacations of the librarian and assistant librarian. The next meeting is to be held Aug. 8.

July 25

A special meeting of the library board was held to consider black-topping of the parking area. An estimate was received from Ayl- ing Construction, which is to do the work of surfacing the parking lot off Pearl st. If the work is done at the same time, the 1,103 sq. yards at the library can be done for \$1,828.80. Members ~~decided~~ <sup>noted</sup> against ~~taking any action on the work at this time,~~ since the lot is not used by library patrons to any extent.
