## VALEDICIORY ADDRESS

Teachers, Classmates, and Friends;

GRADUATION--A CHALLENGE

We, the graduating class of '49, have reached the time when we must say farewell. Some of us will go to college, a number will enter the field of industry and business, while others will become homemakers. We appreciate the interest and encouragement given to us in our years of high school.

To the Board of Education, I wish to extend our thanks for the opportunity of obtaining such a fine education in such a school as ours. During the four years just past, many things have been improved that make this one of the foremost schools in the country. New subjects have been added to the curriculum that enable students to enlarge their choice of a career. In return for the investment you have made in us, we pledge to do the best we can to become citizens worthy of this great country and this fine school.

To the Superintendent, the Principal, and our Teachers, we owe a great debt for the fine training you have made possible. You have endeavored to leave with us many high ideals to carry with us as we go out into the world. Your faith in us and your understanding have made our years in high school more enjoyable and have encouraged us throughout our years of study. You have guided us patiently and tried to fit us for the duties and activities of citizenship and with this training you have given us, we cannot fail.

To my classmates, I wish to say that our years together have welded us together with memories too dear to ever be forgotten. Somehow we never thought of what it would mean to have to part. Now that hour is come. Here we are facing the goal we set four years ago--that of graduation. At this point we must separate. As we depart, may the association and training we have received here made us stronger, better, and finer citizens in the future that lies ahead.

It is our purpose as we face the world outside to carry with us the same courage, loyalty and integrity, that has guided us here and to reflect honor and credit to our school, our parents, and our friends.

There is a feeling of insecurity in the world today. No one can predict what may happen tomorrow in our uncertain relations with Russia. The North Atlantic Peace Pact which was signed was the first in a series of much needed steps to keep the situation from becoming worse. However it may do just the opposite.

Sometime ago, the settlement of the dispute between Israel and the Arab Countries brought together countries warring since last May. However, there is still great unrest in that part of the world.

The infiltration of the Communist troops into China forced Chiang Kai Shek to leave his country to the destructive ways of civil war. China has always been an ally of the United States, but now that it is under Communist control, the people of China are in grave danger of being ruthlessly cut down if
they do notaccept the Communist creed. It would be a great disasterfor the world if the millions of people in China were converted to the Communistic way of government.

Democracy must be made to work in all those lands which are still free. In economic terms, democracy works when people have more to eat, more to wear, and better homes in which to live. Our job is to help raise the standard of living of the peoples of the world sothey will not be susceptible to Communistic propaganda.

Even with the great unrest in the countries of the world, all is not peaceable in our own United States. What with the continual quarrels and bickering going on between labor and management, the increasing cost of government, the effort of small groups to force their views upon the nation, the housing problems in all the larger cities, and many other problems, there is much that we can use our training for today. There are many social reforms taking place today, such as the socialized medicine plan being agitated for the United States. Also, there has been much discussion about the Hoover Commission's Plan to streamline the government. There will be a need for much clear thinking and sound judgement for years to come before the benefits of this plan will be fully realized.

The world is living at a fast pace today, with our streamlined locomotives, the wonder of atomic power and the jet propelled planes now in production. Just recently we were shown that it is now possible to fly a plane non-stop arcund the world, and airminded menhave perfected a method to refuel planes in the air, making it possible for them to fly unknown distances.

It is up to us to use the training we have received and do our utmost to help in the peaceful settlement of the world's problems. None of us, perhaps, may become leaders in our nation, but in this democratic country we live in, everyone has an equal chance to become a leader and to influence the thinking of those around him. Therefore, it is up to us to do everything in our power to save the peoples of the world from being led astray by the many types of undesirable propaganda which are so prevalent today.

To us, classmates, graduating should mean a great deal!It presents a challenge to us, an invitation to show that the investment placedin us was a profitable one, one that will bring back dividends. We may never become leaders, but we can be an influential group of intelligent and active citizens, leading the way to a better and happier world.

Miss Mapes and Mr. Williams were our class advisors. Soon after school started the upper classmen enjoyed initiating us, much to our disconsolation. On a brisk evening in October our class was delighted with a hayride. In March to complete "Sponge Week" we sponsored a "Sweater-Swirl" Dance. With the students talent we presented an assembly program in February. June drew nigh and the first exciting year of high school was at an end.

When fall came, we returned to B. H. S. with more confidence, enrolling as Sophomores. Officers were elected as follows: President, Bob Grew; Vice President, Dean Keller; Secretary, Verlinda Ford; Treasurer, Henry Schmidt. Mrs. Miller and Mr. Briggeman were the advisors. Again we enjoyed a hayride in November. In January we presented a talent program imitating the operation of a study hall. On March 14 we honored St. Patrick by sponsoring a semi-formal dance. Some of the class participated in the operetta "Hollywood Extra."

Having completed two years of high school we enrolled as Juniors. Officers were: President, Jim Snyder; Vice President, Margarete Berry; Secretary, Willis Ford; Treasurer, Bill Berry. Advisors were Mrs. Brice, Mr. Greene, and Peebles. Following the usual custom we had a hay ride in November. We sponsored the "Spring Frolic," a semiformal dance in March. It was a joyous occasion when we were notified that our rings had arrived. After tedious practice the Juniors were proud to present our play "The Daffy Dills." In the spring the chemistry students were glad to be able to go on a trip to Silica Quarry, Toledo Art Musem, and the Toledo Zoo. That year we felt proud to be able to plan and present the Seniors with a splendid banquet emphasizing the Spanish Theme. School closed in early June with our class awaiting the opening of school the next fall when we would enroll as seniors.

Again we returned to B. H. S. for the final year of our high school career. Although we were proud to be seniors we were depressed when we realized this was the last year of high school. We elected as officers: President, Jim Fischer; Vice President, Bob Seeger; Secretary, Russ Simpson; and Treasurer, Dean Keller. Advisors were Mrs. Brice, Mr . Greene, and Mr. Peebles. We entertained the high school and faculty at a barn dance November 14. On a certain day everyone witnessed the seniors exhibiting their best apparel, but it was just the usual custom of Senior pictures being taken. In March, we were delighted to order announcements and name cards. Through the co-operating of "Doc" Bailey we held a baked food sale April 16. The Juniors honored us by holding a banquet May 20, which we willingly accepted and appreciated. On May 23, the faculty and students noted a sudden calmness and an absence of the Seniors. While the students were laboring over studies the seniors were immensely enjoying a boat cruise to Niagara and Toronto, Canada. With the year drawing to a close and with the completion of a splendid annual we were ready to attend Baccalaureate and finally receive diplomas at Commencement on June the second.

We realize our High School education has been merely a stepping stone to the opportunities that lie before us, keeping in mind our motto "We shall be what we make ourselves," as the future depends entirely upon us.
