

CLASS HISTORY

September 1946 saw a group of scared freshmen initiated into the halls of B. H. S. to begin their journey through high school. Miss Ellis and Mr. Williams were our advisors. We elected as class officers: president, Robert Zimmerman; vice-president, Fritz Holmes; secretary, Avery Bruce; and treasurer, Virginia Snyder. Our main social event for the year was to be a sleigh ride, but the weather did not co-operate so it turned out to be a hay ride. We were becoming more and more a part of the school until by the time June rolled around we felt as though we were destined to be very important.

We returned in the fall, full of confidence, as Sophomores. We elected as officers: president, Joan Staup; vice-president, Frank Deak; secretary, Barbara Goble; treasurer, Lois Bowman. Our advisors were Miss Williams, Mr. Williams, and Mr. Venema. In October, we sponsored an all-school dance. We contributed as our part to the carnival a chance booth and a very lovely queen, Virginia Snyder. In the spring, we were magically transformed into senoritas and senors to serve at the Junior-Senior banquet. We also ordered our class rings which was our first step toward becoming members of the envied upper classes.

In the fall of 1948, we enrolled as Juniors and promptly got to the business of election of officers. They were: president, James Bauer; vice-president, Jack Simpson; secretary, Mary Lou Hall; treasurer, Marilyn Young. Our advisors were Mrs. Suydam, Mr. Venema and Mr. Williams. We gave a class party in November in the form of a hay ride followed by a weiner roast at the flats. On a glorious day in November, it was announced that our long awaited class rings had arrived. In March, we delighted the people of Blissfield and surrounding country with a hilarious comedy "Spring Fever." The chemistry classes spent a day visiting Silica Quarry, Toledo Zoo and Toledo Sanitary System. On May 20, we entertained the Seniors with a banquet and dance featuring George Gordon's Orchestra and the Five Men of Note. The theme was

the "49er's"; the decorations were colorfully authentic.

When we returned as Seniors in the fall of 1949, we sadly realized it was our last year at B. H. S. and we decided to make it an eventful one. We elected our class officery who were: president. Frank Deak: vice-president, Harold Riddering; secretary, Dorothy Delker; treasurer, Joan Staup. Our advisors were: Mrs. McColl, Mr. Williams and Mr. Strayer. The first event in our long list of activities was the taking of our Senior pictures. We decided to raise as much money as possible for our Senior trip. To initiate this plan we gave a Thanksgiving baked food sale. Other projects were selling of basketball and year pins, annual Subscriptions Toledo Blade subscriptions and boys and girls socks. "Ghost Wanted" a mystery comedy, was presented in the fall. It was very successful. Our main social event was the Heart Hop, an open dance featuring Bill Carter's Orchestra. The annual staff plus several special committees made possible a very successful annual. Senior honors were earned by Lois Bowman (valedictorian), Barbara Goble, (salutatorian), Dorothy Delker, Nelda Schmidt, Lois Ann Hahn, James Bauer, Lewis Burghardt, Pauline Creque, Charles Kapnick and Mary Sinclair. On May 5, the Juniors entertained us with a banquet and dance. At last the fateful week arrived when we departed for Washington. Everyone had a wonderful time. We returned in time for Baccalaureate Services on Sunday night. During the last week of school a calmness prevailed in the classroom due to the absence of the Seniors. But none of the Seniors were calm. The last minute preparations for class night and for graduation, and the sadness brought on by the realization, of our last hours in B. H. S. combined to make those last few days eventful and nostalgic to all the members of the class. When we received, at last, the diploma which was a reminder of the work and play during high school and a beckoning finger to the future, remembered our motto, "Today we we launch, where shall we anchor?"



HIGH-LIGHTS OF A CHAMPIONSHIP SEASON

AFTER THE FOOTBALLS WERE PUT AWAY AND THE BAS-KETBALLS BROKEN OUT, FORTY-TWO BOYS REPORTED FOR PRACTICE, INCLUDING THREE LETTERMEN FROM THE PRE-CEDING YEAR, BAUER,ZIMMERMAN AND SAXTON. WITH PLENTY OF HEIGHT, BUT LACKING THE SPEED OF THE FORMER YEARS COACH LEW CHANGED HIS STYLE OF PLAY. THIS YEAR THE TEAM USED THE ZONE DEFENSE AND EM-PLOYED THE FAST BREAK SELDOM DEPENDING ON A SLOWER TYPE OF PLAY. THE SUGARBOYS MET A FAST AGGRESSIVE MORENCI TEAM IN THE FIRST GAME. BLISSFIELD CAME FROM BEHIND IN THE FOURTH QUARTER WITH A RALLY TO WIN ITS FIRST LEAGUE GAME. THIS LAST QUARTER RALLY, WHICH BROUGHT BACK THE MEMORIES OF THE CHAMPIONSHIP TEAM OF TWO YEARS AGO, WAS TO BE SEEN MANY MORE TIMES THROUGH-OUT THE SEASON. THE NEXT GAME FOR THE SUGARBOYS WAS AT CLINTON WHICH THEY WON WITH EASE, BUT MORE IMPORTANT IT WAS THE FIRST TIME BLISSFIELD HAD TASTED VICTORY ON THE CLINTON HARD-WOOD IN SIX YEARS. NEXT CAME A TRIP TO PETERSBURG WHERE THE SUGARBOYS MET A VERY STUBBORN TEAM, BUT WON A VICTORY IN THE LAST FEW SECONDS. HUDSON THE L.C.A.A. CHAMPIONS OF A YEAR AGO, AND FAVORED TO AGAIN TAKE THE CHAMPIONSHIP, MET A BLISSFIELD TEAM OUT TO PROVE THAT THEY WERE TO BE THE CHAMPIONS. THE GAME WAS A CLOSE CONTEST THROUGH-OUT BUT THE SUGARBOYS PROVED THEIR SUPERIORITY IN THE END. AFTER CHRISTMAS VACATION THE SUGARBOYS MET THE CELLAR DWELLING PITTSFORD TEAM WHICH GAVE BLISSFIELD A HARD TIME UNTIL THE FINAL QUARTER WHEN THE SUGARBOYS STAGED ANOTHER LAST QUARTER RALLY. ADDISON THE CELLAR CHAMPION WITH PITTSFORD, REALLY PROVIDED THE FANS WITH A THRILL. THE CONTEST WAS NOT DECIDED UNTIL BAUER SCORED THREE POINTS IN THE LAST FIFTEEN SECONDS. THE LAST GAME OF THE FIRST ROUND OF PLAY PITTED BLISSFIELD AGAINST TECUMSEH, WHO HELD SECOND PLACE. THE LEAD CHANGED HANDS MANY TIMES BUT THE SUGARBOYS WERE AHEAD AS THE FINAL WHISTLE BLEW. THIS VICTORY GAVE THE BLISSFIELD SQUAD A TWO GAME LEAD OVER ITS NEAREST RIVAL.

OPENING THE SECOND ROUND THE SUGARBOYS BEAT MORENCI BUT NOT WITH-OUT THAT FAMOUS LAST QUARTER RALLY. DISASTER STRUCK AS BEDFORD CAME TO TOWN. BESIDES LOSING IT'S FIRST GAME OF THE SEASON BLISSFIELD ALSO SUFFERED ITS FIRST DEFEAT ON THE HOME FLOOR FOR OVER THREE YEARS. BOUNCING BACK AFTER THEIR DEFEAT THE SUGARBOYS PLAYED WHAT WAS TO BE THEIR BEST GAME OF THE SEASON IN DEFEATING CLINTON. THE SUGARBOYS THEN HAD ANOTHER OFF NIGHT AS THEY PLAYED HUDSON. IT SEEMED THAT THEY COULDN'T DO ANYTHING RIGHT THAT NIGHT. THE SUGARBOYS ASSURED THEMSELVES OF AT LEAST A LEAGUE TIE BY DEFEATING PETERSBURG. THIS WAS ANOTHER THRILLER. WITH THE GAME NEARLY OVER SAXTON, BAUER AND ZIMMERMAN SENT TO THE SHOWER WITH A TEN POINT LEAD POSTED, BUT THEN THE ROOF LITERALLY FELL IN AND PETERSBURG HIT FROM ALL OVER THE COURT. THEN THEIR LUCK AND THE CLOCK RAN OUT JUST IN TIME. BLISSFIELD NEXT DEFEATED ADDISON, BUT LOST ITS CHANCE TO REVENSE AN EARLY DEFEAT BY BEDFORD. THE SEASON WAS FINISHED ON A SOUR NOTE AS THE TECUMSEH TEAM DEFEATED THE SUGAR-BOYS IN A HARD. BITTERLY FOUGHT GAME. EXCEPT FOR TOURNAMENT PLAY THE TECUMSEH GAME WAS THE LAST GAME FOR OUR SENIORS, BAUER, SAXTON, ZIM-MERMAN AND PIOTTER.

BLISSFIELD SHOULD HAVE ANOTHER GOOD SEASON NEXT YEAR AS THERE WILL BE FIVE LETTERMEN BACK AND ALSO SOME VERY GOOD MATERIAL SHOULD MOVE UP FROM THE SECOND TEAM. IT COULD EVEN BE ANOTHER CHAMPIONSHIP TEAM.






