Upon the faculty rests the responsibility of shaping the personalities of tomorrow's citizens. Each student must be instructed in the many different subjects which are all a part of life in the complicated world of today. Their job is to teach the things that will make each person's life and the lives of those around him more worthwhile. To impart information to others in such a way as to give a general knowledge of the things around them must be a difficult but rewarding task.

This particular faculty ranges in experience from one to thirty-five years, with the average years taught being ten. Five have over twenty years experience in the teaching field.

## STUDETTS TRAII

From the many varied and interesting courses given at Blissfield High School the students can prepare themselves to go on to college, to become a farmer, or a housewife, or to enter into any number of other types of work. The subjects from which the students can choose their sixteen credits needed for graduation, or to prepare them for their future work are: social studies, home economics, mathematics, agriculture, shop, sciences, and business courses.

Five English courses are given which include two years of grammar and two years of literature and one year of speech.

All students are required to take one year of either general mathematics or algebra. Students who wish to go further into mathematics can take plane geometry, solid geometry, and advanced algebra.

One year of science is required for graduation, those given are biology, chemistry, physics, and general science.

Girls, in preparing for their future, usually take from one to three years of

home economics while the boys take two years of shop.

Social studies include world history, American history, a half year of civics, economics, sociology, and family relations.

The foreign languages offered are two years of Latin and two years of Spanish.

For training in the commercial field the students may take general business, two years of typing, two years of stenography, and bookkeeping.

The boys who look toward farming as an occupation or are interested in agricultural work can select farm crops, animal husbandry, farm management, and soils.

Physical education is required of all boys from the seventh grade through the eleventh grade.

Additional optional courses are band, chorus, and driver education.

Students who graduate from Blissfield High School can feel that they have been given ample opportunity to prepare for what lies ahead of them in life.

The 1954-1955 School Daze staff instituted a few changes in the school paper at the beginning of the school year. The front page contained copy instead of a cover drawing and four columns were used instead of three. These changes greatly improved the appearance of the paper.

The school's new mimeograph machine greatly reduced the production time. The editions went
on sale approximately every four weeks.

On December 3, 1954, Blissfield and the surrounding area voted to reorganize into one large school district. A new school board, from the areas concerned, was elected to shoulder the responsibility for putting the new district into operation. They took office on January 19. Elected as President was H. J. Hoenig, as Secretary, Carl Knapp, and as Treasurer, Howard Driggs. Robert Stutzman and Andrew Thompson were also elected members of the board.

The townships taking part in this reorganization were Riga, Blissfield, Ogden, and Palmyra. The Lovewell district, in Monroe County, had voted to annex at an earlier date. The total number of districts was twenty-six.

The present Blissfield High School
A typical rural elementary school.
was built in 1906, with an addition being completed in 1927. While the number of students attending the high school increased through the years, the amount of room available remained the same.

The accomplishment of the reorganization did not solve the problem of overcrowding which had plagued the high school. The main problem confronting the new school board was the construction of a new building, but before this could be done, a site had to be selected and a bond issue passed. Meanwhile, overcrowded conditions existed, but the people of these united districts felt that a worthwhile step had been taken toward the solution of a problem common to many high schools today.

After a slow start the Blissfield Sugar Boys broke loose near the end of the season with the potential they had shown several times earlier in the year to win their last three games. Blissfield finished fourth in the L. C. A. A. with a 2-3-1 record. The Sugar Boys had a 3-4-1 over-all record.

The Sugar Boys showed a tremendous defense in the opening game but Blissfield's inexperience aided Dundee to a 7-0 victory.

In their first L. C. A. A. game of the season Blissfield lost to the Clinton Redskins, 20 to 6 . The power laden Redskins went on to win the league championship without a defeat: Playing before a Dad's Night crowd Blissfield scored on a Dwight Klump to Lee Keller pass. Co-Captain Gerald Long was injured and was lost for the rest of the season.

Blissfield had to come from behind in the last quarter with a 35 yard sprint by Dwight Klump to hold the Addison Panthers to a 7-7 tie in the third game.
