ADMINISTRATION

An architect was hired who began to draw preliminary plans of the new school. A site was selected for the new building and arrangements for the purchase









This year, as in previous years,





JUNIOR VARSITY ROMPS

As a team the 55-56 Sugar Boys will go down as one of the best in Blissfield's history but taken individually they were probably the greatest collection of basketball players at Blissfield in many years.

In Lee Keller, Ray Crots, Lee McCormick, and Tom Romsek the Lewmen had height to spare. Keller copped the L.C.A.A. scoring title for the second straight year with 302 points for a 25.1 average. 
At the end of the season Keller was named to the All-L.C.A.A. first team. McCormick and Romsek were selected for the All-L.C.A.A. second team.








