## New High School Building Plans Approved

The past year was a very eventful one for the Blissfield Community Schools.

The Board of Education gave their approval to the plans for the new high school and made arrangements to insure that a supply of steel would be available when the time came to begin construction on the school. The construction of the building is expected to be started in May of this year and it is hoped that it will be completed by September 1958, if not completed by then it will be ready by January of 1959.

On September 7, 1956, the people of the school district approved the bond issue. The bond was sold December 13, 1956, at a very satisfactory interest rate.
F. J. Strayer, Superintendent, and Burdett Peebles, Principal, continued as administrative heads of the school.
