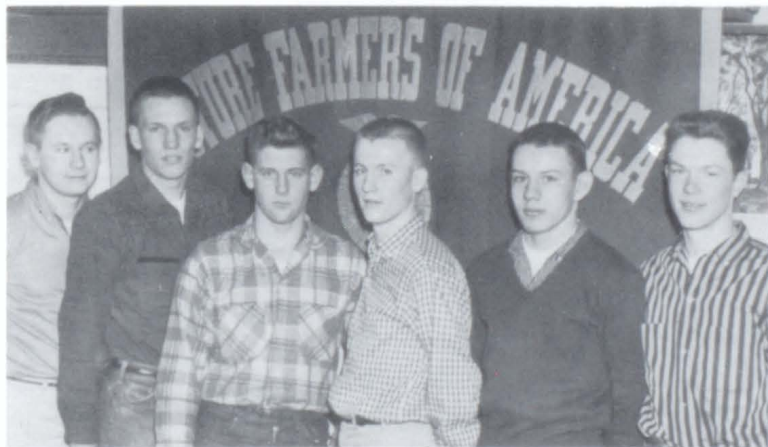
## F.F.A. Develops Leadership

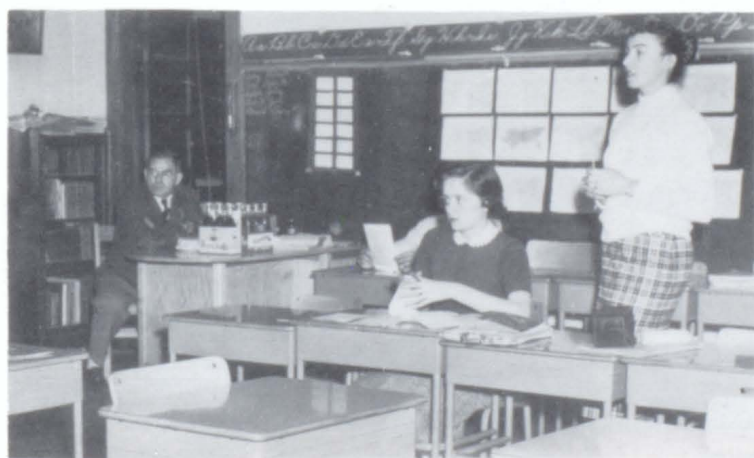

The varsity cheerleaders got new uniforms at the beginning of the basketball season. They consisted of white sweaters

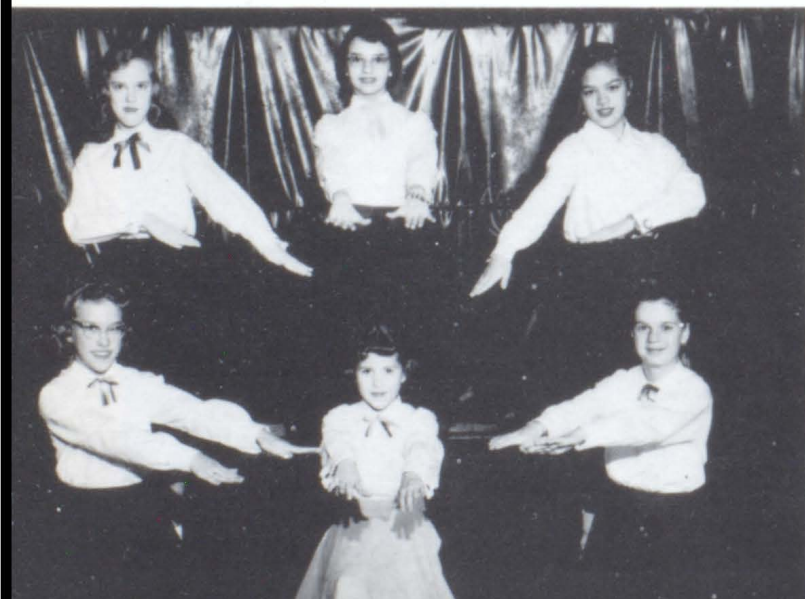
with gold letters and white skirts with purple insets. Their old uniforms were given to the reserve cheerleaders.

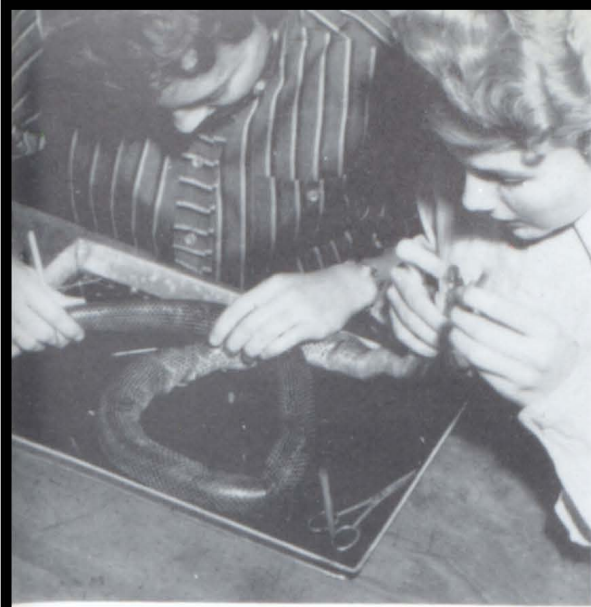

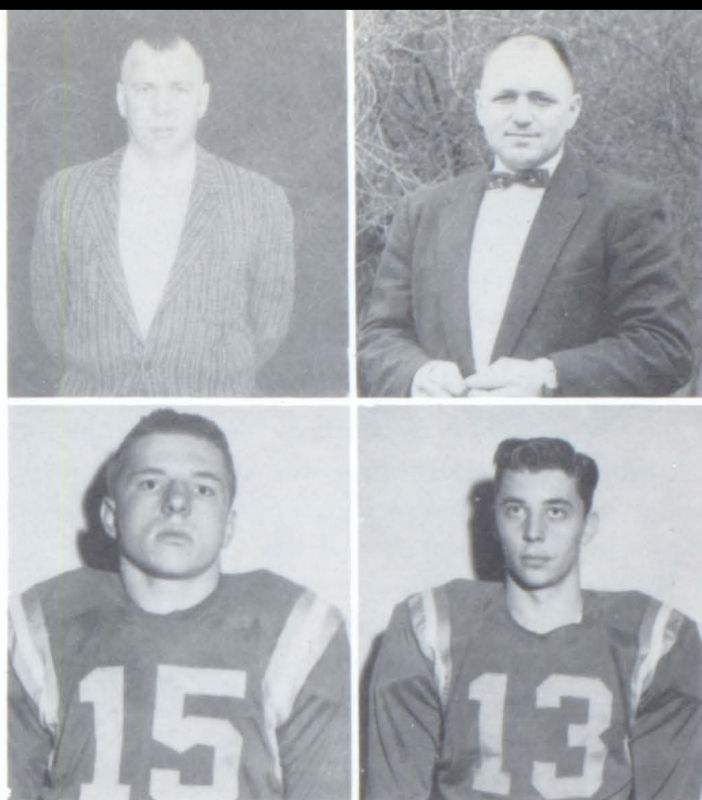

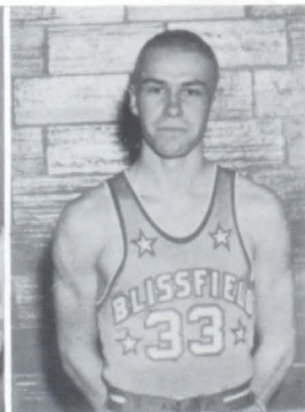

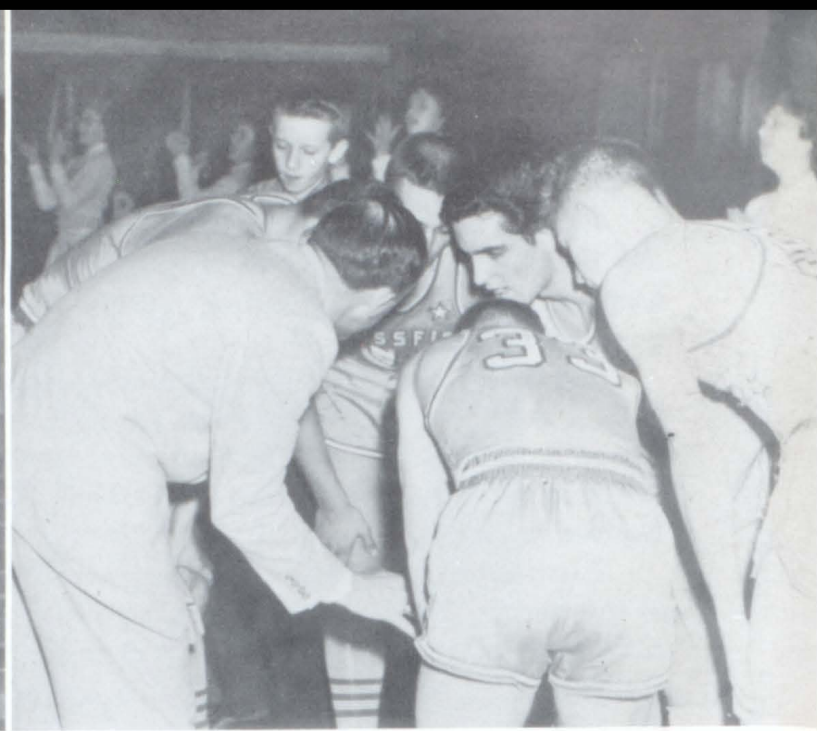
The cagers played at Onsted for the team's second meeting. The Beetmen played steady ball throughout the game. The Lewmen won the game by 10 points in scoring their third league win.

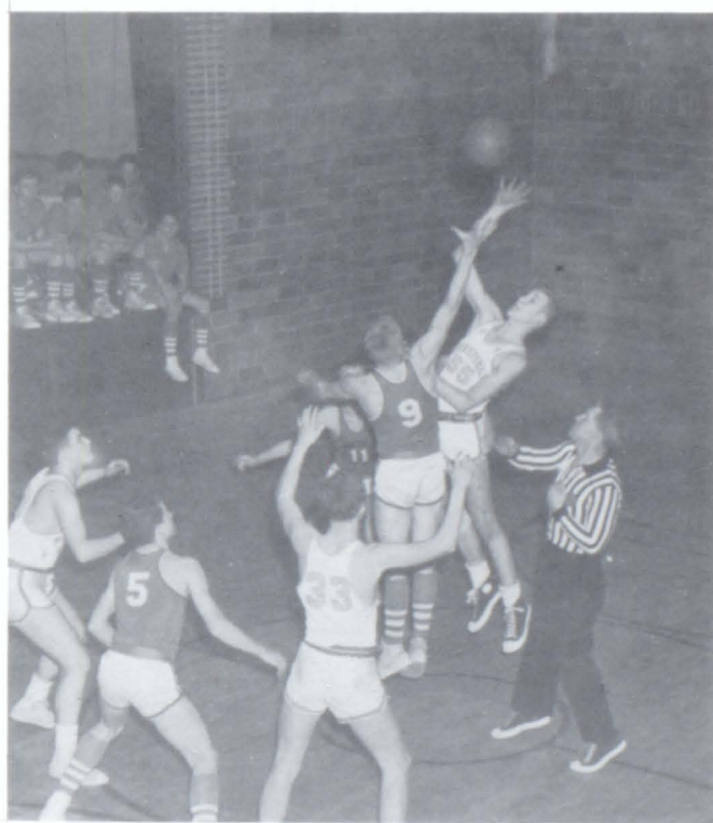

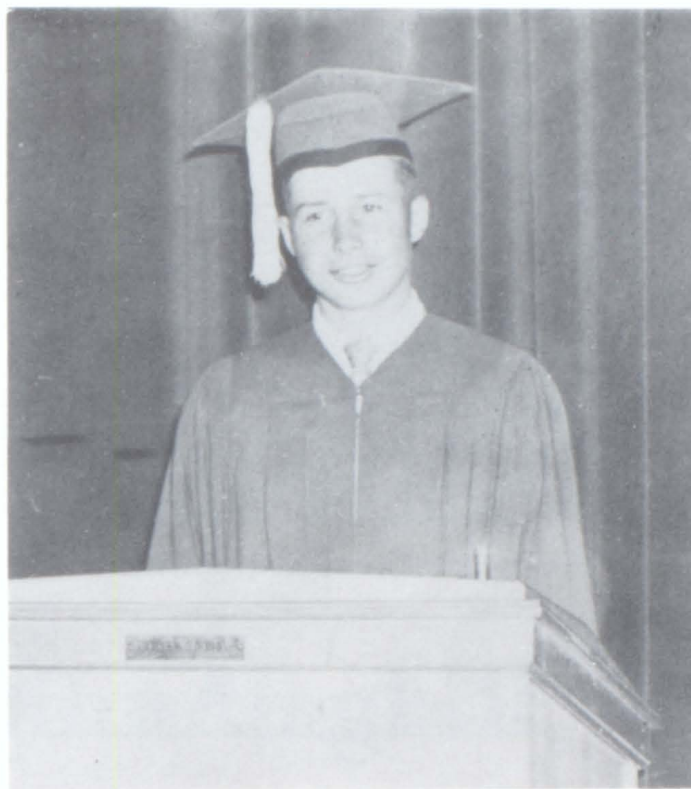
Parents, faculty, classmates, and friends: On behalf of the Senior Class of 1958 I welcome everyone of you to this, our Class Night.

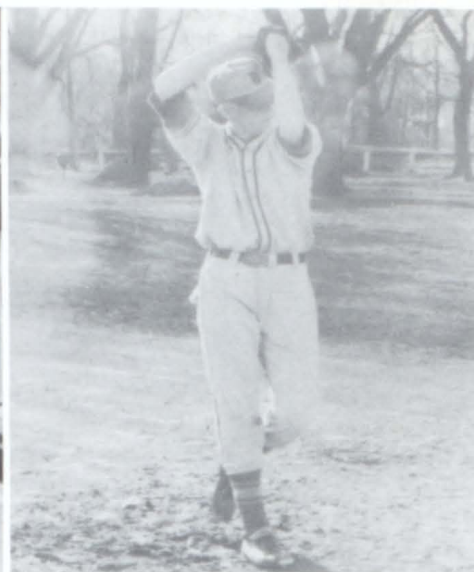

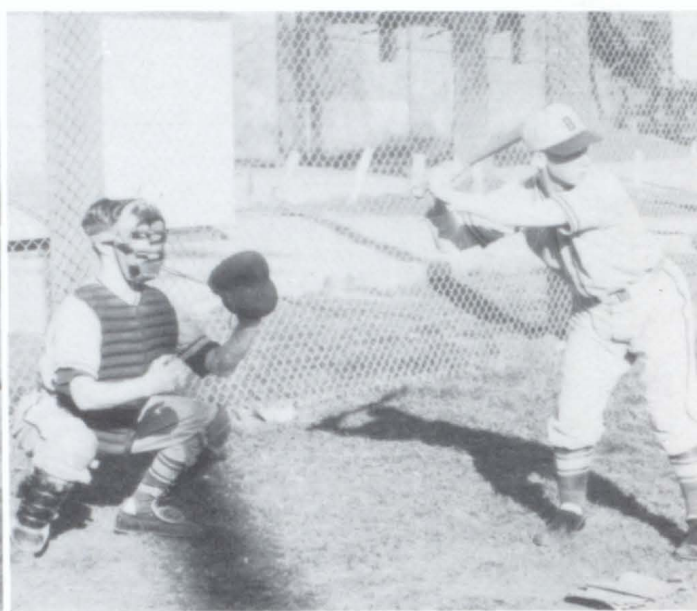

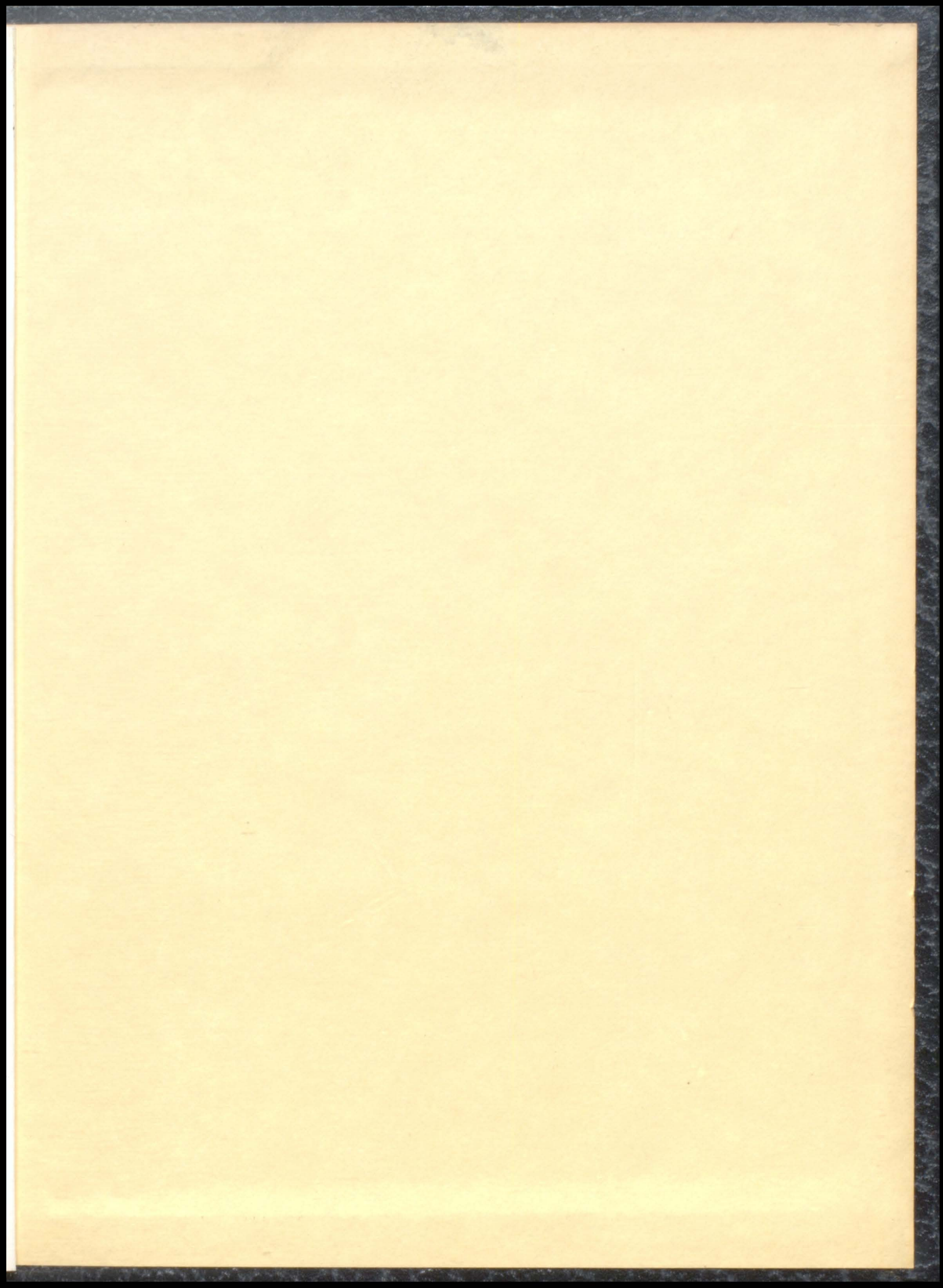
