


With this 1966 Elysium, the staff is celebrating its fiftieth anniversary--1916-1966. The yearbook has not been continuous in its publication for it was eliminated during part of world war II. The annual started in 1916 with forty-two pages and an enrollment of one hundred students under the direction of seven faculty members. Through the span of time, this annual shows that the school has grown in size, activities, influence, and accomplishments.

The school's purpose has been symbolized by a crest which incorporates the Bliss family coat of arms. Our heritage from the feudal days is brought out by the symbols used. The three middle sections of the shield represent a scaling ladder and the aspirations to progress toward a beloved goal. The vair or pattern of small shields in the bend symbolize the achievement step by step in the progress toward ideals. The two fleur-delis, depicting the Royal French Lily and representing the active student body and the alumni, have three petals. These are the three elements of perfect friendship --loyalty, honesty, and service. The sinister arm depicts might and power so necessary for achievement. The four arrows clasped in the first stand for the four principles of scholarship--concentration, association, retention, and recall. Together they bring a dedication with a sense of industry to make the most of one's opportunities in formal education. The fact that the arrows are pointed and have feathered ends indicates, that they are real and workable arrows which can be used practically to achieve success. The background signifies the reverence for womanhood. The name Blissfield and the initials H. S. on the scroll beneath the escutcheon indicate that the symbolism has been adopted by Blissfield High School.






Principal Jack J. Barger

Mrs. Durbin graduated from Adrian College with an A.B. degree. She taught home economics I and II and was advisor for both the Future Homemakers and the senior class.






DONALD CAPPS

Mr. Durbin received his A.B. degree from Adrian College. He was adviser for both the year-book and the sophomore class, and taught English Ia, I and II.






Mrs. Gould graduated from Siena Heights College with a B.S. degree. She taught English IIa and English IIIa and was an advisor for the Senior class.











SBACH, HALL BREAK SCHOOL RECORDS




