## Becomes a Reality

This new course offered at Blissfield High School this year, Dramatics, has proved to be very successful. With the help, of their able coach, Mr. Thomas Piper, the dramatics classes have successfully staged three productions. The first production included two short plays, Impromtu and Spoon River Anthology. The second production, an allschool play, was extremely successful. The set for the Diary of Anne Frank was entirely designed and built by Mr. Piper. A third production, Everyman Today, was also staged by the dramatics classes during the year.

Although their main interest was the production of plays, the dramatics students also studied other aspects of drama. During the year, the dramatics students studied different drama writers, the plays they wrote, and their writing styles and techniques. Different types of theaters, including the most primitive to the most modern, were also studied. To help the students obtain some basic ideas of acting, impromptu acting was done during class. During the production of the plays, the behind-scenes people learned the proper way to paint the scenery, the right way to use lights effectively, and the proper way to use make-up in making up the actors.

Five yards was the difference between a perfect season and the 7-1-1 record that the Blissfield Royals hammered out. In their first game, the Royals came within two yards of a touchdown and a victory at Hudson. At Grosse Ile, they lost the Huron League Championship by three short yards, losing to the Red Devils, $6-0$. As the record indicates, there was plenty of hustle, desire, and good plain "heads-up" football. The season was high-lighted by Blissfield's 20-0 win over Tecumseh and the ending of Dundee's 37-game win streak with a 14-0 win.

A fter compiling an average 5-5 record, the Royals captured 10 straight victories, finally losing to Willow Run in regional play. During Christmas vacation they nipped Hudson and Adrian to win Blissfield's first ABHT title. After losing to Tecumseh 67-60 in a league battle, the Royals fought their way to the top of the Huron league, tying with A irport for the crown. In the district tournament they defeated Dundee, Milan, and Tecumseh to capture their third straight district title. Advancing to the regionals, the Royals clipped Hillsdale in a double overtime thriller, 67-66. In the next round they lost to a fine Willow Run quintet. Well-balanced scoring and great bench support were the main factors which carried the Royals to a fine 15-6 record. The season's final thrill came when Coach Al Schaffer was named All-County Coach of the Year.

After losing the first dual meet of the season to Adrian, the BHS thinclads, led by Captain Denny Sbach, won four straight meets before losing two very close meets to Dundee and Tecumseh. The loss to Tecumseh $(60-58)$, which was decided on the last event, dropped the Royal runners to a tie for the crown.

One of the highlights of the season was Blissfield's first place finish in the Huron League Meet in which all Huron League teams competed. BHS sprinters were a major factor in this meet as they took 17 of the 32 possible points in the two sprints. First place finishes for Blissfield were John Hall in the long jump, Chuck Cory in the two-mile run, Denny Sbach in the mile run, and Don Bohlka in the 100 yd. dash.

Four BHS runners qualified at the regional meet for state competition. They were John Hall in the
long jump, Denny Sbach in the mile run, Mike Schlottow in the 440 yd . dash, and Marty Gillin in the 220 yd . dash. Sbach captured fifth place in the state meet.

At the county meet in which all county teams compete, Blissfield had two county champs. Denny Sbach won the mile run which was a new school record as well as a new county record. The mile relay, consisting of Jerome Lewis, Mike Schlottow, John Hall, and Denny Sbach, won in a time of 3:35. 0 , just four-tenths of a second off the school record.
Although Blissfield will lose twelve seniors through graduation, a strong crop of freshmen led by Fred Bilkey, Chuck Cory, and Jerome Lewis (all of whom lettered) will help the Royals gain respectability again next year.

## Wrestling Introduced At B.H.S.

This year wrestling, directed by Merle Solowin, was added to the Blissfield High School sports lineup. Mr. Solowin pointed out that "anyone can be a good wrestler if he has the determination. Strength is not vital; it is only ten per cent of a wrestler's ability. The other ninety percent is speed and agility."

Coach Solowin, an experienced wrestler and former captain of Toledo University's wrestling team, led this year's Royal mat squad. He was an undefeated wrestler throughout his high school and collegiate careers and later became a member of the 1962-63 World Wrestling Team. Mr. Solowin views wrestling as a game of "physical chess, "
in which each move is planned in advance.
This year has been a learning process for the matmen, who practiced various holds of the wrestling art. The season began with a triweekly wrestling practice, during which a few of the more important holds were taught. Concentration on fine, maneuvers of the art came later in the season as skills developed.

A post-season mat exhibition, given to an evening audience, highlighted the wrestlers' polished achievements for this year. Included in the intersquad program were demonstrations of various holds and maneuvers.
