







The 1980 Varsity baseball team finished in a three-way tie for second in the league with a 7-5 LCAA record. It was the first time in many years that the Royals have not won a league championship.

Blissfield won the first three games of the season, but minor injuries and other problems left the Royal nine with a 5-6 record after 11 games. They came storming back in the second half of the season, however, winning 11 of their last 13 games to salvage second place and an overall record of 16-8.

The high point of the season came when the Royals won the MAECO tournament for the fifth time in six years.














Blissfield coasted to a league championship by compiling an 11-1 record against LCAA opponents and finishing four games ahead of second-place Hudson. Overall, the Royals had a 15-5 record. The BHS team showed an

explosive offense this season by averaging over 72 points per game. At Hudson, for example, the Royals burned the nets for a 101-76 victory and clinched the LCAA title outright.

Mike VanNieuwenhze, who averaged 20.3 points per game, was named to the All-County squad as well as the All-League first team. He also was named as the Royals Most Valuable Player. Rich Osborn and Eric Iffland were chosen as members of the All-League second team, and Jim McMormick made honorable mention.






Mrs. Mills was always willing to help students with their questions or problems, and she tried to keep a smile on her face while doing so.

Cross Country


































Softballers Go To State Team Sweeps Regionals




Volleyball Is New Experience


The Royals ended up with a 3-3 LCAA record and a 5-5 overall mark, good enough for third place behind Hudson and Addison.

Highlights of the season included a third place finish at the Milan tournament and a second at the league tourney



Bolton Uckele struggles to keep his balance and overcome his Napoleon opponent.








