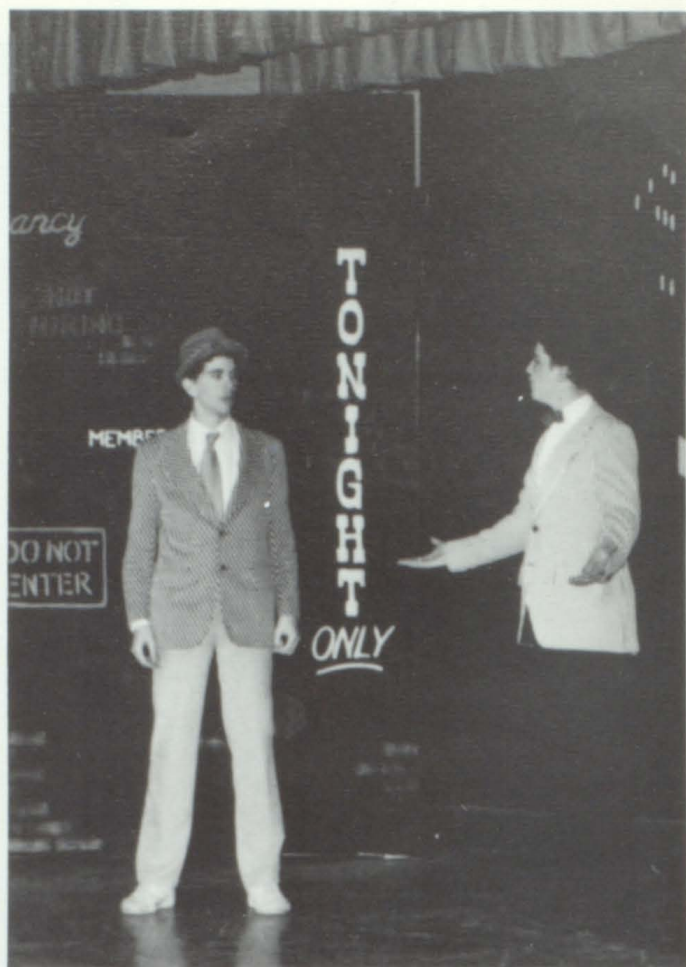

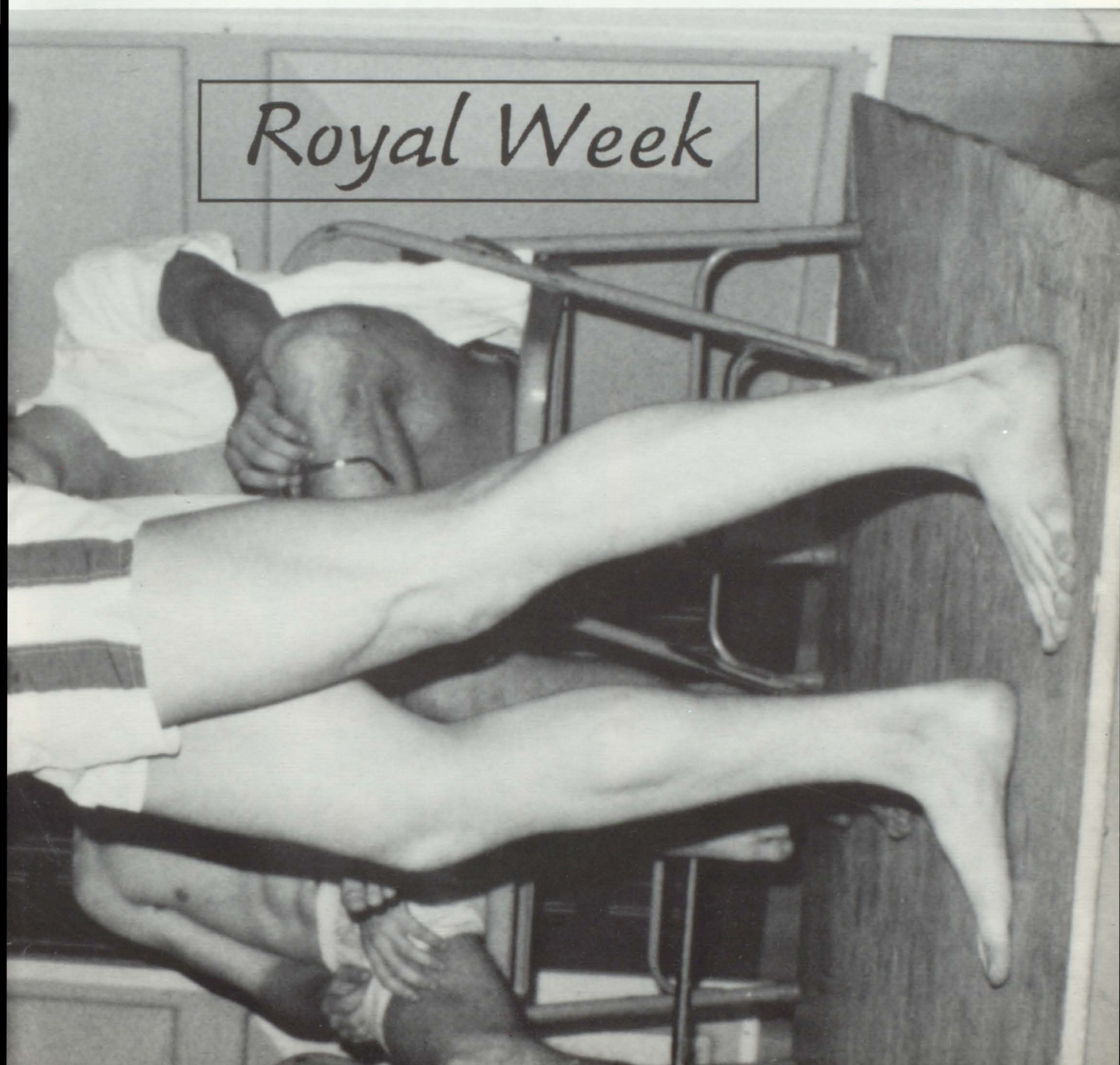

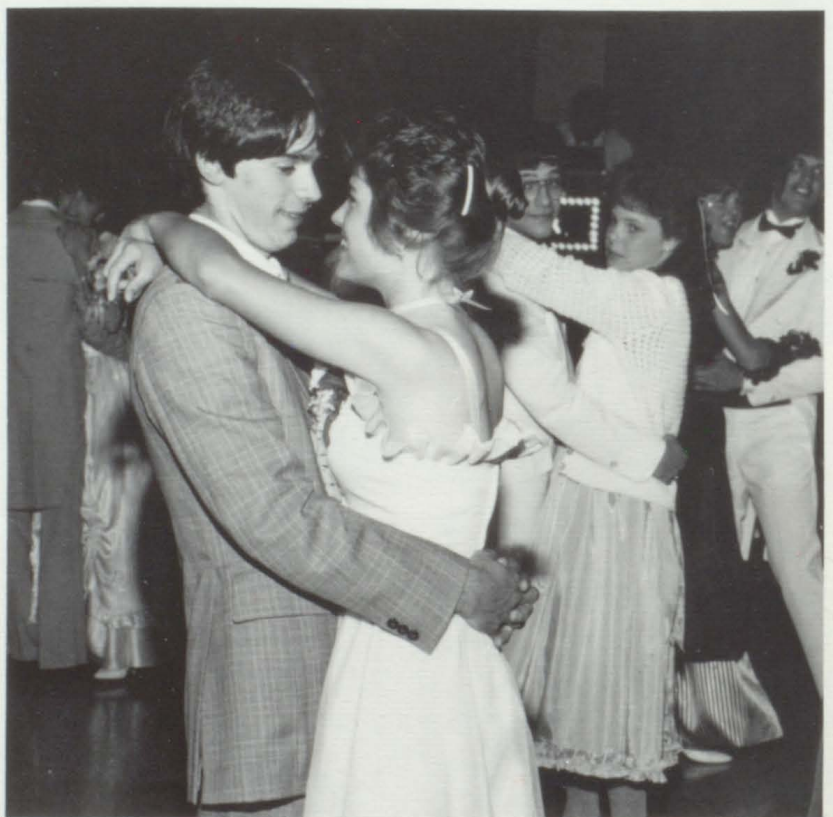

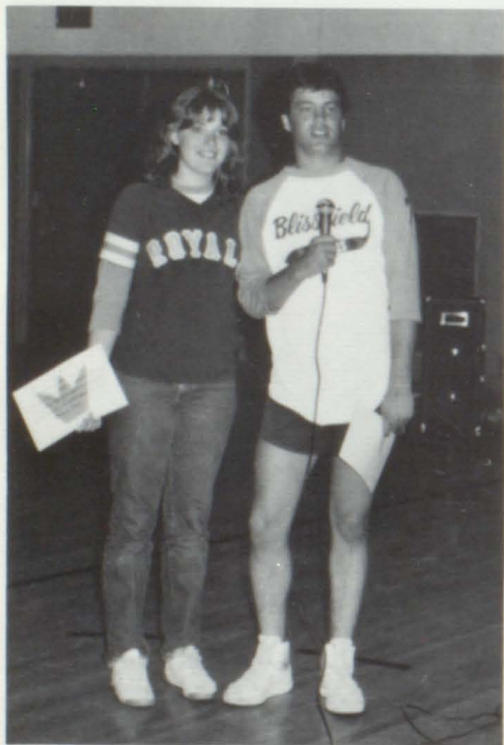
Student Council

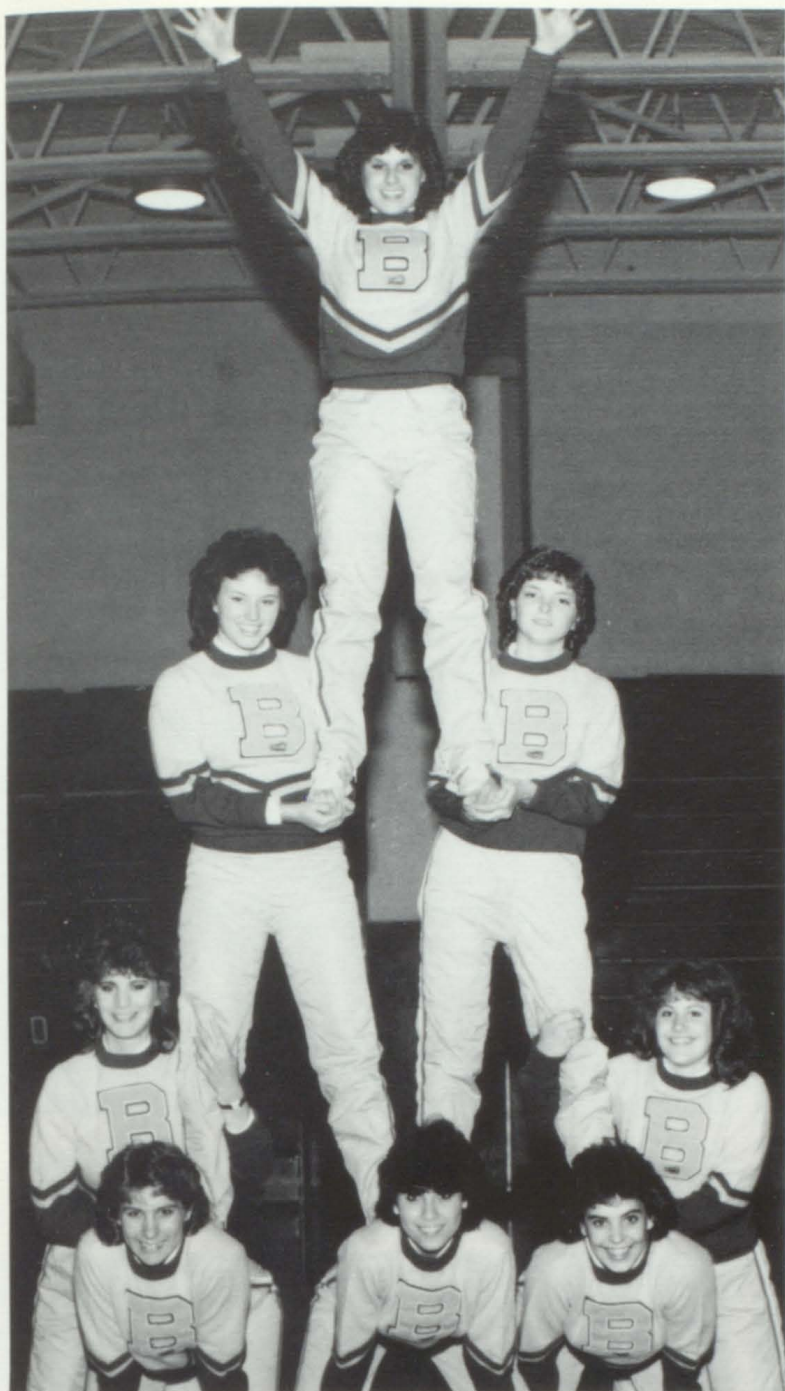

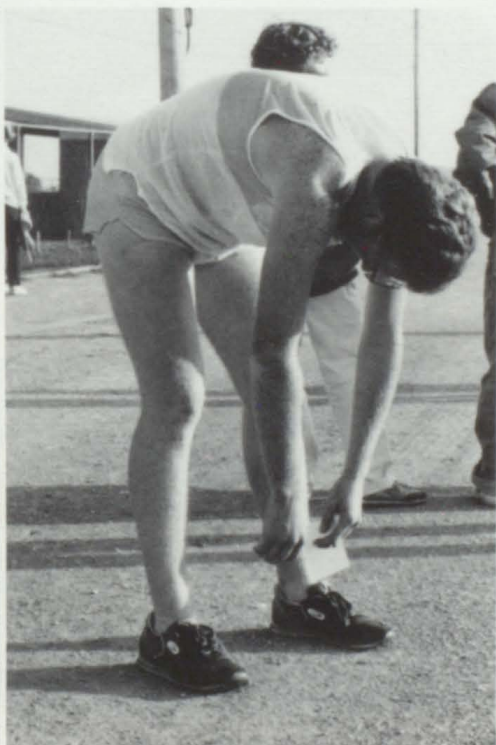

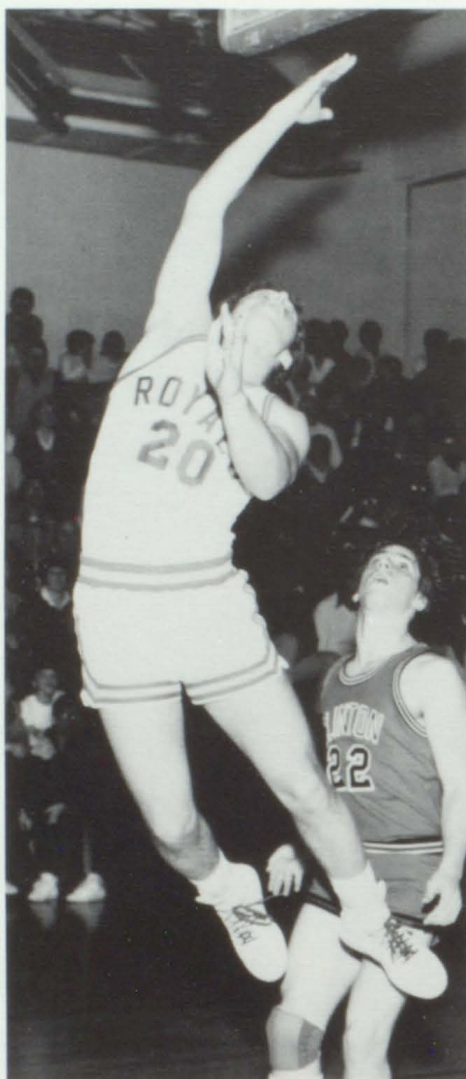

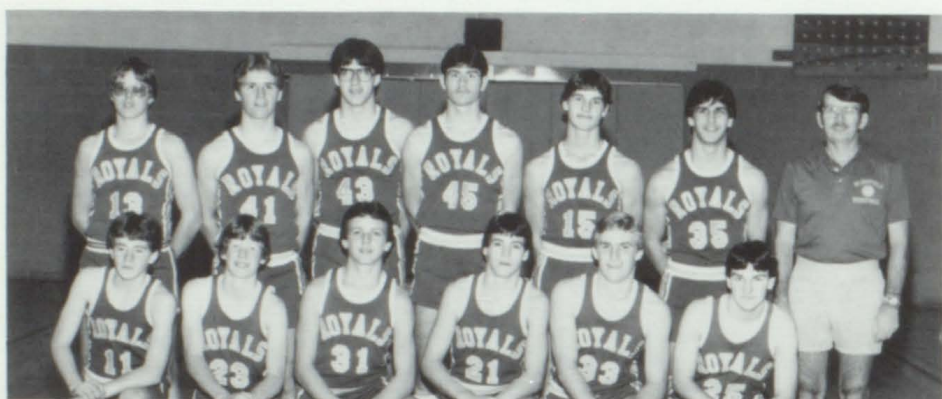

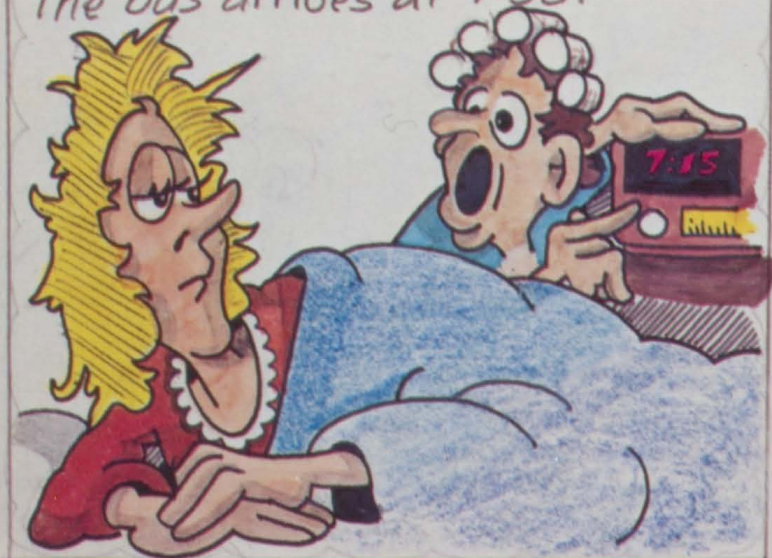
It's hard to believe that this is 1985, my last year at high school. Now, when I look back upon the last four years, I wonder if it was really worth it.

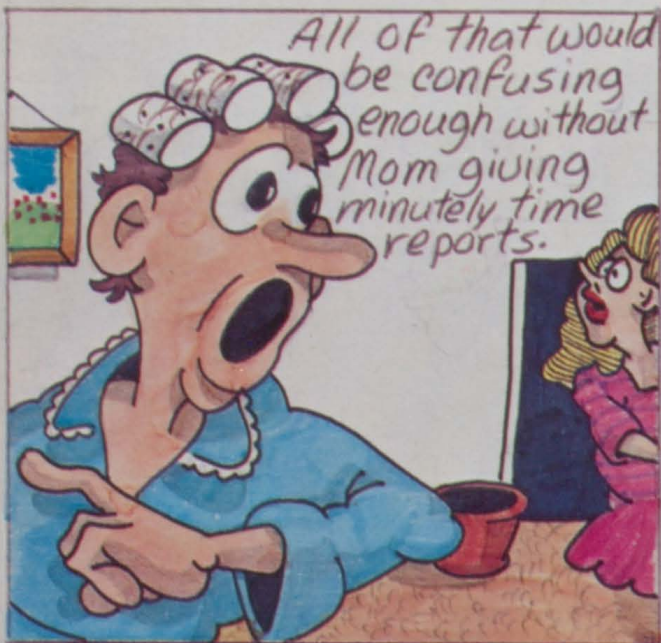
The next thing I knew, my mom started screaming that it was 7:15 am. The bus arrives at 7:30.

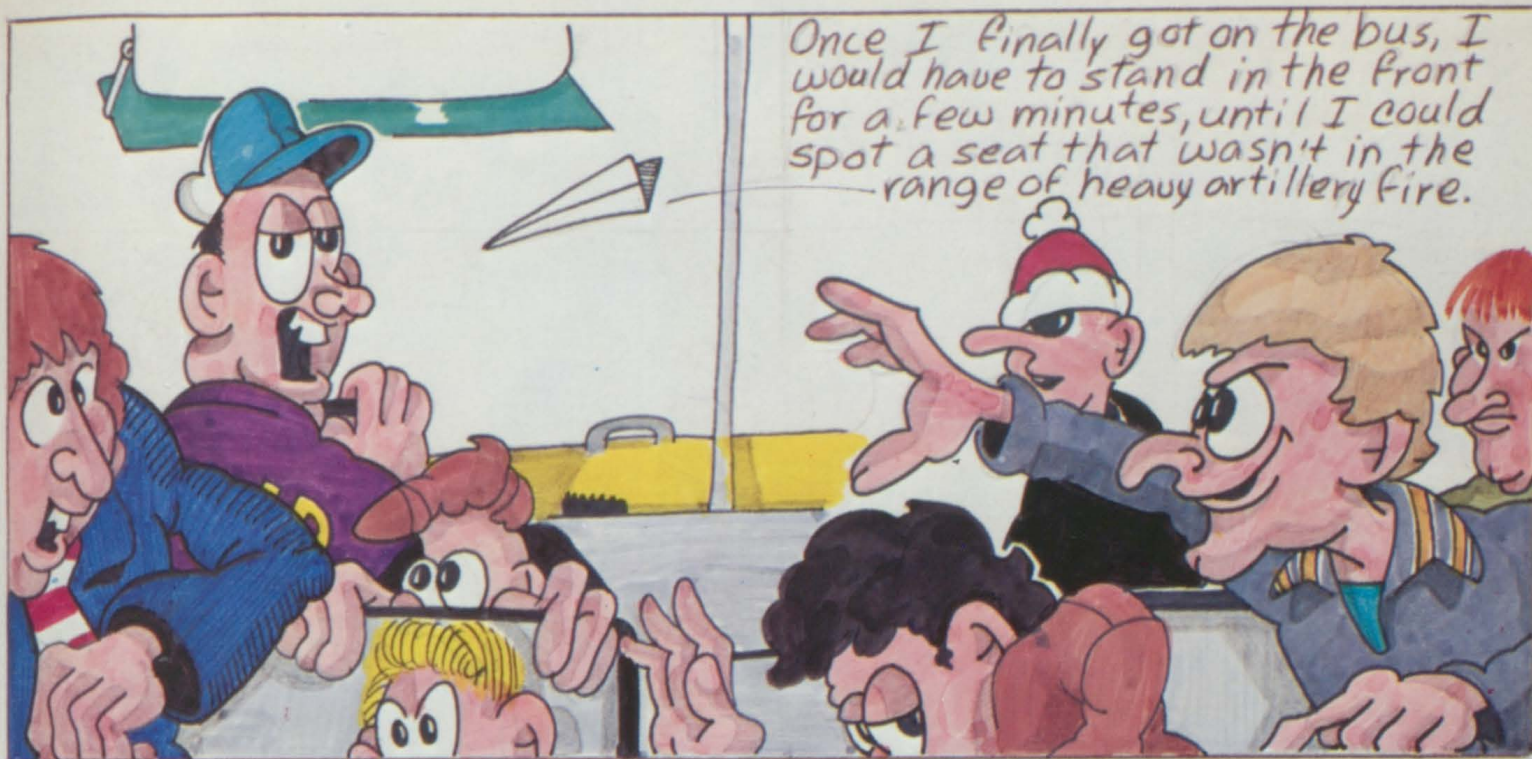


All of that would be confusing enough without Mom giving minutely time reports.
