Key Club Combines Charity and Fun



















The future looks bright because of hard workers in the underclassmen, but we will never have a harder working or more dedicated team then this one.





Royal Boys Take Second in League Experienced Team Led by O'Neill, Spiegel, and Nichols












Twelve Stroke Lead Makes Royals Number One












Jeff Benz struggles for a reversal against his opponent in the Whiteford, Carlson, Blissfield tri-meet.









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



As graduation approached, many seniors had their future planned and were figuring how to get the needed money from grants, loans, and a wide variety of jobs.






Interest this year was fostered by the Lenawee Intermediate Office. The mutual topic for all schools was the effect of acid rain.






Ropes and ITIP Seminars Foster Maximum Student Involvement in the Classroom

The 1985-86 school year got off to a slow start. After nearly 10 years without a millage increase, an increase of 5.75 mils was turned down. Fear of program reductions prompted community involvement. After much hard work the millage passed in August and school began on time with all programs running without cutbacks.

The school board has iniatated many new programs this year. One of them is the ROPES Teaching method. It is designed to take emphasis off memorization and place it on thinking skills so students can better meet the needs of an informational age. The ROPES system involves a five step method of review, overview, presentation, exercise and summary

The ITIP program is designed to motivate students and increase academic achievement. Instructional Theory Into Practice puts research methods into teaching. Fewer quizes are given and students are encouraged to participate more in class discussions and

in group activities. The school board hired three new teachers during the 1985-86 school year. Miss Kay Wells was hired as home ec teacher at the end of the first semester replacing Libby Boldt. Mr. Roger High replaced Laurie Isley as agriculture teacher after she went on maternity leave. Miss Gina Jacobsen took over for Mrs. Miller-Ayers, who was also on maternity leave.
