



Fall sports at Blissfield High School were successful this year. There was a lot of hard work put into practice by all team members. The crowd support throughout the season was really awesome. Though all the sports didn't have a scoreboard victory, they all conquered their goals mentally and physically.

Girls' Varsity Basketball

The varsity girls' basketball team ended with a 6-15 overall record and a 4-6 league record to rank them fourth in the LCAA. Captains for this year's team were Jamie Eisenmann, Jenny Marks, and Andrea Stutzman. Both Marks and Eisenmann were named second team all league. The highlight of their season according to



Coach Garry Brink was their one point victory over Clinton, who was ranked ninth in the state. The team had great senior leadership, and as the season progressed, a steady team improvement was shown by the underclassmen.

Girls' Cross Country

Another group with strong senior leadership was the Girls' Cross Country team. It was a historical season for them with a 15-1 over-all record. On December first at the annual fall awards assembly, the girls were congradulated with a standing ovation for their efforts in running and an accumulative grade point average of 3.8. The girls came away from the season with a numerous amount of awards, and left the school a number of trophies.




HOMECOMING '95








This year in addition to










Boys' Track






