#### Message From Our Library Manager



I am a fortunate person. I have had many wonderful experiences in my life and I can now add the American Library Association's Annual Conference and the city of New Orleans to that list. To be honest, I am torn with my experience with the city and the conference, so I am glad I have been asked to write about it as I hope the writing provides clarity.

The conference itself is a wonder, a little city of librarians (approximately 20,000 attendees) moves into the Ernest N. Morial Convention Center, all three million square feet of it. The building is over a half mile long, three stories tall and the 5th largest convention center in the United States, as if I needed to be reminded I was not in Cottonwood anymore.

The opening session was an interview with former First Lady,

Michelle Obama, by the Librarian of Congress, Carla Hayden. Michelle, of course, was there to help promote her new book, but what I felt like we got was a look inside a person who has led an extraordinary life, not just a political sway or a push for her book. She really dove into what it is like to be a woman, a black woman, a mother, a spouse and

how she tries to balance it.

In all, I was able to attend 13 general sessions, an interview with Sally Field (also coming out with a memoir in the Fall), and a trip to the New Orleans Public Library. I had two, maybe two and a half, big takeaways from the conference. One, librarians are used to telling patrons and the public to come and use the library. The new way must be to encourage and allow the community to tell the library what it is they need (please look for our surveys as we attempt to achieve this). Two, the field is very intelligent/academic. My first, and only, impression of libraries has been of the public library, however, many librarians work in the university setting. Most of the sessions, even if about public libraries, are conducted by academic faculty or (continued on page 8)

# Need help paying for your prescriptions?

Medicare Part D low-income subsidy (also called "Extra Help") helps people with limited income save money on their Medicare Part D prescription drug costs. If you qualify, you could get help paying your plan premium, annual deductible, co-insurance and co-pays. You could also get help to stay covered during the coverage gap.

#### Who can get a low-income subsidy?

You may qualify if you:

- Live in one of the 50 States or the District of Columbia
- Are entitled to Medicare Part A, are enrolled in Medicare Part B or both
- Are single, have less than \$18,210 in annual income and less than \$14,100 in resources
- Are married, have less than \$24,690 in annual income and less than \$28,150 in resources

#### How can I apply for a low-income subsidy?

You can apply in one of the following ways:

- Visit your local Social Security office or apply online at socialsecurity.gov/extrahelp
- · Talk to your sales agent
- Contact My Advocate<sup>™</sup> at the phone number listed in your Member Enrollment Guide or visit MyAdvocateHelps.com

After you apply, Social Security will review your application and send you a letter to let you know if you qualify for a low-income subsidy.
