Message From Our Library Manager

I was recently asked by a patron what we were planning to do with our extra \$10,000. At first, I thought she was making a grand donation and we were going to have some play money. Then it on me that referring to the question in our recent patron survey asking what you would do if the library had an extra \$10,000. The patron surveys, as well as a series of conversations with local leaders, a and community survey, staff interviews, are being used to create a strategic plan for our library.

As you may have noticed, the survey questions were not always library specific. The questions were designed to give feedback on what it is the community needs. Where are the gaps? Because, as a public library, we have the freedom to be the library our community needs.

Essentially, along with our Library Advisory Board, we are creating a blueprint for where we want the library to go, and how we want to get there using community feedback as the driver. The plan is to compile the feedback and create key strategic initiatives that staff can use as guiding principles to prioritize. We received a lot of feedback, so the trick is taking it and putting it in a

digestible format for all to understand, and more importantly, to implement. Sorry, we probably won't be getting that three-story parking structure anytime soon, but we do want to make the library as inviting as possible, and that includes plans for easier access.

So, what's next? Decisions that are intentional and aligned with the plan. Books that you want to read and books that will inform our community on topics that are important to Cottonwood. Programs that are meaningful and provide solutions to local issues. Partnerships that are lasting and connect the community. How do we know it will work? Because you helped create it.

Thank you for your feedback, and please continue to provide it. We want to know what your needs are. As always, we are here to help.






Our Smile Club

Our Smile Club (OSC) is a grassroots movement created by one woman, Madaline Weber, who had a thought to doodle, create a design, and had another thought to share it with the world. So, she made copies of her famous SMILE cards, and with random acts of kindness she invited individuals to join Our Smile Club. The only rule of the club is to smile at others in order to assist in healing our world one smile at a time.

Since April of 2014 over 8,000 copies have been circulated and live in windows, on dressers, in cars, on refrigerators and in offices all around the world. The responses to these cards, these acts of bravery and kindness, have spread. In Cottonwood, Arizona, these cards live in most business windows and Madaline is famous in her home town as the Smile Lady and the Great Hugger.


Marita brings a unique insight into life through her journey of healing from sexual abuse as a child. It is her passion today to




Deck the Hounds by David Rosenfelt

The Teen Zone (upstairs in Youth Services) has been going through some great changes! For the sake of simplicity, we've combined some sections that had been separate before.






