The King's Shadow: Obsession, Betrayal, and the Deadly Quest for the Lost City of Alexandria By Edmund Richardson

A British historian resurrects the life of a self-taught archaeologist who discovered a lost civilization on the plains of Afghanistan. Charles Masson (1800-1853) was a dreamer and military deserter who infuriated the East India Company's army when he abandoned his post in 1827. He spent years ducking authorities and wandering in India, Pakistan, and Afghanistan, stoking his simmering fascination with the lost cities of Alexander the Great. He became a man at war with himself: a groundbreaking archaeologist, an unwilling spy, and a bitter foe of his former employer. With assiduous research, assured authority, and lacerating wit, Richardson, a classics professor, re-creates this hair-raising story.

Masson first emerges as James Lewis, working for the East India Company and hating every minute of it. After his desertion, he took on his pseudonym and embarked on a quest to reach Alexander's lost city of Alexandria Beneath the Mountains. But Masson, the first Westerner to explore Afghanistan's ancient past, discovered something more compelling: dazzling evidence of a lost Greek-Buddhist civilization. His most famous find was the Bimaran Casket. a first-century bejeweled reliquary engraved with "the very earliest dateable image of the Buddha which has ever been found." Eventually, a company spymaster tracked Masson down and blackmailed him into becoming a British agent, "a spy for the people he despised most in the world," gathering intelligence on his Afghan hosts as the company fomented a plot to invade. Readers familiar with Afghanistan's Great Game will appreciate this version of an unfolding catastrophe. History buffs and espionage fans will be fascinated with Richardson's cast of characters, which included Victorian megalomaniacs, Afghan princes, Russian adventurers, and corrupt East India employees. Masson seemed consigned to obscurity, but today his discoveries are collected and cataloged at the British Museum and the British Library. Richardson's biography, of a man who burned with the fire of discovery, completes his story. Captivating biography of an archaeological pioneer sure to please history fans and students of the spy game.

FROM THE LOCAL HISTORY ROOM


Each month we feature treasures from the collections of your library's Local History Room. Try to imagine your house without indoor plumbing. How greatly would that absence alter your life? For starters, you would be faced with drawing and hauling or pumping water from a well or nearby spring every day, all year long, for all of the personal and household activities you engage in daily or weekly-drinking, cooking, bathing and cleaning your teeth and hair, doing laundry, cleaning house, using the toilet. Now, think about the physical effort required to perform the necessary task of collecting water, as well as the significant amount of time involved, especially since you more than likely had to visit the well or pump more than once a day. Finally, if we throw in inclement weather, no one would blame you for feeling slightly overwhelmed by the thought of life without running water.

In July 1897. Holden's Water Supply committee assembled a report on the water system that prominent hydraulic engineer Louis E. Hawes had designed for sharing Lake Muschopauge with residents of Rutland, where the 70-acre lake is situated.At the same time, the committee produced a report of their research for the project. all despite Holden residents having defeated "An Act to supply the Town of Holden with water from Muschopauge Lake in the Town of Rutland," Chapter 180 of the Acts of the Legislature of 1896, only a few months before. Nonetheless, the resolute committee had to wait until 1904 before voters finally approved the Act, which had been defeated, according to Newell Prouty's 1941 history of Holden, a total of 17 times at both annual and special town meetings.

By October 1905 Holden's water system was in place in part of the town, under the supervision of the Holden Water Works. The little booklet (3½" x 61/8") depicted here is the official guide to that original system. The booklet is also a satisfying peek at the past, when water for sets of wash tubs, "not more than three in set," cost the owner \$2 "per annum," and water-closets "with selfclosing flush, one used by one family" set a family back \$5 each year.Water bills were paid in two installments, due July 1st and December 1st.

Note: Two dollars in 1905 is worth about \$64.48 today; \$5, \$161.20. Unfortunately, not all residents of the still highly rural community of Holden were able to afford this new service, or lived close enough to the water line to benefit, at the start.



HOLDEN WATER WORKS

The following water rates, rules and regulations are established until further notice, viz.:

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RULES AND REGULATIONS.

The following rules and regulations shall be subscribed to in the application of every water taker:

1. All applications for service connections and the use of water must be made in writing to the Water Commissioners on the form prescribed, stating truly and fully the various uses to which the water is to be applied, and signed by the owner of the premises or his properly authorized agent, and no other use of the water for any purpose shall be made without previous notice to the Commissioners.

2. The service pipe will be put in by the Commissioners if desired, to the inside of the cellar wall, and supplied with a stop and waste cock; the taker paying for all that lies outside the highway. A charge for the use of at least one faucet will be made to applicants for whom a service is laid, whether the water is used or not.

3. All additions or alterations made to water pipes and fixtures must be immediately reported to the Superintendent. No alterations will be allowed in any fixtures or pipes inserted by the Commissioners without a written permit.

4. No plumber or any other person shall tap any water main or connect any service pipe therewith, nor set, take off, or repair meters, nor turn on or shut off the water from any pipe or hydrant in the highway, except for the legitimate purpose of extinguishing fires, without a permit from the Superintendent of Water Works.
