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

The Love of My Life by Rosie Walsh

A husband learns his wife is hiding a secret life. Emma and Leo have been happily married for seven years, although they've weathered their share of struggles (such as infertility and Emma's cancer diagnosis). Emma's a marine ecologist and erstwhile TV presenter whose bubbly personality is loved by all, while Leo is an obituary writer and his wife's No. 1 fan. Both are head over heels for their young daughter, Ruby. Although Emma's currently doing well, Leo is given the job of prewriting her obituary, a common strategy with people who are in the public eye. In his quest to write the perfect tribute to his wife, he starts looking into her past and discovers a few inconsistencies he can't explain. Why did Emma lie about her university degree? Why is she so cagey about her life before Leo? How is she connected to a famous actress who just went missing? And, most importantly, is her name even Emma? As Emma attempts to cover up her secrets. Leo digs through their house for clues and tracks down people from her past in an attempt to figure out why she's lying and what she's hiding from him. The old life Emma tried so carefully to hide threatens to destroy the new life she's built with Leo.

Walsh masterfully shows both Emma's and Leo's points of view while maintaining an intoxicating air of mystery. As readers get to know them both, it seems unbelievable that lovable Emma could be deceiving Leo...but how else to explain the secrets he's uncovering?

The big reveal about Emma's life manages to be both surprising and heartbreaking, with many twists and turns along the way.A propulsive thriller with heart that will keep readers guessing.

FROM THE LOCAL HISTORY ROOM

Beginning with this issue of "the Bookmark", we will feature photographs, documents, or other treasures from the collections of the Local History Room of the Gale Free Library for your enjoyment. If you have any questions about anything you see, please email Nancy Richards, Local History Librarian at nrichard@cwmars.org. Please note that the "s" in Richards is omitted in the email address.

If you've never attended a historical tour of the Gale Free Library, you probably are unfamiliar with the little brochure pictured here. This brochure represents the only known printing of all of the Library's rules at the time of its publication, which remains unknown.

What we do know is that the brochure was printed before 1926, when Holden **High School moved from** the top floor of the Damon Memorial into a separate building that stood where the Senior Center and Bandstand stand today.

The photos show the front and back of the "Rules for the Government of the Library and Reading Room." as well as the two colors of paper used for the original document. Notice how many of the rules for using the Library no longer exist!

Privileges of the Teachers and Pupils of the Public Schools.

I. The books of the Library may be used by the teachers and pupils of the High School during the sessions of the same. The principal of the school shall be responsible for the conduct of the pupils, and the use of the books used in or taken from, the rooms, and shall return all books Saturday afternoon of each week before the opening of the Library to the public.

II. The several teachers of the town shall have, in addition to the right specified in Art. II. of "Rules and Regulations," the privilege of taking from the Library, for use in the schools, the follow-ing books:

ing books: One volume of U. S. History. One volume of other History. One volume of Travels. One volume of Supplementary Reading. These five, or any of the five, volumes, may be taken at one time. Each teacher shall be held responsible for the use and return of books ac-cording to the provisions of Arts. IV., V., VI. and VII. of "Rules and Regulations."

READING ROOM.

I. The Reading Room will open Tuesday, Fri-day and Saturday afternoons from 2 to 5 o'clock, and Tuesday, Thursday, Friday and Saturday evenings from 6.30 to 9.30 o'clock.

II. All persons twelve years old or more may use the room.

III. Orderly conduct is required, and conver-sation is not permitted.

IV. Papers and magazines must be carefully used, and neither marked nor cut. V. Visitors to the Reading Room are requested to report to the Librarian any improper conduct coming under their notice.

All inhabitants of Holden, above the age of twelve years, known to the officers of the Library as proper persons to enjoy its privileges, or recommended by some responsible citizen, who shall thus make himself liable for any loss resulting therefrom; and also all teachers connected with our public schools not residents of the town.

III. Every person entitled to borrow books from the Library will, on applying for them, receive from the Librarian a printed card having on one side spaces for the catalogue numbers of the books desired, and on the reverse, spaces for the entry of the date on which books are taken and returned; and this card must always be presented on obtaining any book, and also upon the return of any book. A register of all persons entering their names for the purpose of borrowing books shall be kept in the Library, the residence of each individual and the loan number inserted against the name.

IV. No person shall be allowed more than one volume at one time, and no book can be changed the same day on which it is loaned, neither can any person borrow more than two books in one week. Books will not be transferred from one card to another, neither can they be renewed unless brought to the Library. The time allowed for the retention of any book shall be fourteen days, unless otherwise specified on the cover. All seven-day books may be renewed once. Books that are marked for a longer time cannot be renewed, nor shall any book be re-issued to the borrower's household until after it has been returned to the Library, and has remained there twenty-four hours. Any person retaining a book beyond the specified time shall incur a fine of two EXTRACT FROM THE STATUTES OF THE STATE OF MASS., CHAR. 60. "Be it enacted, etc., as follows: Whoever wil-fully and malicously writes upon, injures, defaces, tears or destroys any book, plate, picture, engraving or statue be-longing to any law, town, city or other public library, shall be pumished by a fine of not less than five dollars nor more than one thousand dollars for every such offence."



LIBRARY.

I. The Library Rooms shall be open Tuesday, Friday and Saturday afternoons from 2 to 5 o'clock, and Tuesday, Thursday and Saturday evenings, from 6.30 to 9.30 o'clock.

II. The following persons shall be entitled to the use of the rooms, and to borrow books from the Library for home use, upon signing a promise to obey its rules and regulations:---

cents a day until it is returned, and all fines shall be paid before the person incurring the same shall be entitled to draw another book. In case of the loss or destruction of a card, a charge of one cent shall be made for a new one.

V. Any book retained one week beyond the time prescribed shall be sent for by the Librarian, and the expense of obtaining it shall be paid by the person who borrowed it.

VI. Borrowers of books must give notice to the Librarian of any change in their place of residence.

VII. Injuries to books beyond reasonable wear, and all losses, shall be made good to the satisfaction of the Trustees; and in case of the loss of a book of a set, the borrower shall furnish a new set for the Library, and receive the remain-ing volumes of the set.

VIII. All books must be returned to the Library at least ten days previous to the annual ex-amination of the Library, under a penalty of fifty cents, reasonable notice to be given by the Librarian.

IX. Persons obtaining books from the Library are not permitted to loan them to any one not a member of the same household.

X. All persons visiting the Library rooms shall be required to demean themselves quietly, and no loud or disturbing conversation will be allowed in the delivery room. No person except the Librarian or a Trustee shall enter the delivery room or take any book from the shelves, except by special per-mission. Any one abusing the privileges of the Library by improper conduct or otherwise shall be denied admission to the rooms.

IT'S OWL GOOD

From The Super Adventures of Ollie and Bea series Written and illustrated by Renée Treml

In the wake of her black-and-white **Sherlock Bones** series, Treml introduces a new set of graphic books for the early reader crowd, this time in full color.

Ollie, a young owl, is intent on being a superhero. There is only one problem—Ollie doesn't know what their superpower is. As other animals point out, owls are supposed to have extraordinary eyesight; but Ollie wears glasses, which makes for a lot of self-consciousness. Then Ollie meets Bea, a white bunny, who insists that Ollie has "super-vision" despite the glasses. Bea wants a superpower too, so Ollie suggests a range of possibilities, including having big feet and being "supernice," but none of them satisfy Bea. More animals show up for a game of superheroes; readers learn that Simon the squirrel is superspeedy, muskrat Ceecee is a superswimmer, and Pedro the chameleon can change color. When Ollie self-deprecatingly lets slip that he can see in the dark and Bea unwittingly hops very high, The other animals help them to appreciate the special personal gifts they have overlooked.

This amusing early reader offers a set of pun-tastic conundrums presented in a simple comic-book format. Treml's unsaturated digital illustrations are rendered using a minimalist palette of blue, green, gray, and white. The only indication of the characters' genders is their names since no gendered pronouns appear in the text. Young readers unsure about their own superpowers will join Ollie in cheering at the story's "hoppy ending." A winsome round of wordplay and self-esteem building. (Graphic fiction. 7-10)
