





Book Review

Passersthrough By Peter Rock

An estranged father and daughter try to reconnect 25 years after she mysteriously disappeared for a week while they were camping in Mount Rainier National Park.

The heart of Rock's latest novel is the relationship between 76-year-old Benjamin Hanson and his 36-year-old daughter, Helen. When Helen was 11, she went missing for a week under mysterious circumstances while she and Benjamin were camping in the woods near Mount Rainier.

Attempting to reconnect, Helen visits Benjamin at his Portland, Oregon, home. She either can't or won't talk to her father in person about her disappearance. Instead, she installs a machine with custom software that records him as he's speaking, transcribes his words, and delivers them for her to process at her own pace. She responds by fax or phone. The incident and subsequent time apart have left them both unable to articulate details or emotions to one another. While Helen can't even bring herself to speak of the camping trip, Benjamin suggests that they go camping again, and in his preparations for this ill-suggested outing, he encounters Melissa, a transient woman with questionable motivations. Something's off about Melissa, and her actions waver between altruistic and opportunistic, but as she learns of the history between Benjamin and Helen, she becomes a willing substitute in Benjamin's would-be plans to re-create whatever it was that happened to him and his daughter 25 years ago. As the novel progresses it becomes clear that it's never been about the reconciliation of Benjamin and Helen but rather the ongoing relationships both they and Melissa have with death, the deaths of loved ones closest to them, and the search for answers in trying to deal with their losses. Its best elements, like its supernatural overtures, are reminiscent of Stephen King's The Girl Who Loved Tom Gordon (1999).

A captivating page-turner that raises more questions than it answers.

FROM THE LOCAL HISTORY ROOM

Not all of the items in the collection of the Library's Local History Room are photographs or publications or maps; a number of treasures are reel-to-reel and cassette audio recordings, 16mm film, 78 and 33 1/3 rpm (revolutions per minute) records, and videotapes. Still others are what are typically referred to as artifacts, including sculpture, textiles, and models.

Pictured to the right are several views of one of our models, a handmade replica of the Holden Town Hall. The little structure measures 5-inches wide from roof edge to roof edge, 7 ¾-inches long from bottom front step to the back of the building, and 6 ½-inches from the base of the foundation to the taller chimneys. The late Nancy Swenson, a Holden resident, "built Town Hall," with some assistance from her husband, E. Alfred Swenson, who donated the model to the Local History Room for keeping.

Holden Town Hall was erected in 1836, almost 100 years after the town was recognized as a community separate from Worcester. The original structure was "sixty feet long including the plaza and thirty eight feet wide" (Estes's History of Holden, p. 43), and cost the Town \$3,869.58. Forty years later, and impelled in large measure by the Civil War, the Hall was rebuilt, with a full 26 feet added to its length to accommodate a Memorial Hall on the Second Floor in honor of the 30 sons of Holden who died in the War.

Nancy Swenson carefully copied many of the exterior details of the actual town hall, including the one short and three tall chimneys, the signage on the façade, and the pair of window boxes; and she simplified others, such as the fire escape on the west in an illusion that works.

Nancy's homage to Holden is just one of the special artifacts that provide interest—and delight—to our collection.

Notes: The cost of constructing Town Hall in 1836—\$3,869.58—was approximately the equivalent of \$120,600 today. ♦ If you're so inclined, try to determine the scale the Swensons used to construct their model!

Children's Book Review

Alone Like Me Written and Illustrated by Rebecca Owens Ages 3-7

A picture book set in China shows that loneliness can be overcome.

Liling, a young Chinese girl, and her parents have moved from the country to a busy city. Her mother and father work in a sewing factory and a can-making factory respectively. Without friends or school, Liling is lonely. The artwork's grayscale palette reflects that bleak reality. Even the marketplace, with its "tables of rainbow fabrics," is painted in muted blues and grays. The only bright spots in the illustrations are Liling's red coat and, eventually, the bright yellow coat of Qiqi, a smiling girl whom Liling must devise ingenious methods to befriend since they live in different buildings.

The motif of a Chinese dragon, a metaphor for courage, weaves in and out of the artwork and text. The hand-drawn pictures and handwritten notes that the two girls send each other are sparks of joy in Liling's otherwise dull life. The Chinese hukou system that traps Liling and her family in poverty is explained in a brief glossary and in the pronunciation guide at the beginning of the book, but it is not the focus of the story.

An author's note and a five-item resource list at the back provide details for parents and teachers seeking more information. Inspired by her visit to Shanghai to adopt a child, Evans' pencil and watercolor paintings of Chinese characters and scenes avoid insensitive stereotypes and respect Chinese culture.

A hopeful, universal story about the power of friendship to dramatically improve the quality of everyday life.
