





Local History

The oldest cemetery in Holden, often referred to as the Old Burying Ground, sits on the southwest corner of the intersection of Routes 31 and 122A. The land for this grave site, given to the young community of Holden in 1765 by a Bostonian, is populated with dark-gray slate gravestones, a common stone for cemeteries in the northern colonies during the 18th Century because of its availability, impermeability, and carvability. A number of the stones in the Old Burying Ground bear ornamentation, which may appear ghoulish to modern eyes, but was actually selected to convey certain messages to viewers. Four examples of decorated stones appear below:



While we can't be certain without documentation, the small, sad face that tops this headstone may be a depiction of the late Mrs. Hubbard.



Mrs. Sally Moore's headstone depicts both an urn and a willow tree, two ancient symbols. The urn may mean simply death or, more specifically, dust. The willow is a symbol of death, sorrow, and rebirth.



These conjoined gravestones, with their duplicate decoration, a winged skull or death's head, remind the viewer of the inexorable.
