

Outside of a page or column devoted to humor, jokes have historically served as fun fillers for undedicated space in printed publications. The early yearbook staffs of Holden High School enjoyed loading up on jokes and puns representing the humor of their time in each issue of "The Clarion," especially to tease their classmates and teachers. Here is a sampler from the 1930s (only the names have been altered):

Teacher: "Do you think paper can be used effectively to keep people warm?"

Student: "I should say so! The last report card I brought home kept the family hot for a week."

Customer Two: "Well, the coffee's so weak it can't answer."


Teacher: "Tomorrow I'll lecture on evolution." Voice from the last row: "Oh, cut out the monkey business."

Friends of Gale Free Library Announces \$200,000

### WINDOWS OF OPPORTUNITY CAMPAIGN

Gale Free Library's historic windows are 135 years old and showing their age. Library and town officials agree it's time to fully restore these beautiful architectural features. Therefore, the Friends of Gale Free Library has launched *Windows of Opportunity*, a fundraising campaign with the goal of raising \$200,000 toward the total restoration and repair of the 60 exterior windows in the Library's original Damon Memorial building.

The balance of the funding, which is estimated to total over \$750,000, will come from projected grants and town appropriations. "We want to show our love for this remarkable building, which has been called the 'Gem of Worcester County," says *Windows of Opportunity* co-chair Penny Morgan.

Penny, along with co-chair Pat Korandanis, invites businesses and the public to contribute at one of the following levels:
