## Libraries Rock!

**The Holyoke Library Summer Reading Program is in full swing.** Holyoke Library Children's Room



Anyone visiting the Holyoke Public Library this summer is encouraged to register for the Summer Reading Program, Libraries Rock! This program is open to adults, teens and children.

The children's program officially began on Monday, July 2nd and is open to students grades K-8. Children and their families simply have to pick up a reading log and start reading. Children are asked to read for thirty minutes a day, fill out their log, and return it to the library every Friday in July to pick up that week's prize.

Children who participate in all five weeks of the program will be invited to our **Summer Reading Party on Thursday, August 2nd at 1:00pm.** At this event, all participants will be in the running for the Grand Prizes. Each child gets one ticket per 30 minutes of reading which they can put into the running for some great prizes including a Kindle and a Ukulele beginner set!

## **President's Letter**

Greetings Library Supporters,

Eagle-eyed readers of this column may be surprised to see my name instead of Terry Plum's. That's because I was "installed" as Board President during the spring of 2017 after Terry was forced to take a hiatus due to health matters that demanded his attention. We still consult with him on various library matters since the breadth of his knowledge and experience with libraries, and ours in particular, is vast. He occasionally comes to meetings and is a great sounding board for our ideas. I have big shoes to fill and I'm still in the process of growing into them.

One of the major items that Terry discussed in his spring 2017 column was our employee salaries. As he noted, there have been no salary increases for ten, (now eleven), years and the library has proposed (following a regional salary study by an outside firm) a new salary structure. This structure would create a mechanism for correcting existing inequities as well as incentivizing better employee performance. It would also help the library be more competitive when recruiting new hires.

As of June 2018, our classification and compensation plan has been revised and submitted to the City Council by the Mayor. It is currently awaiting review and approval by the Ordinance Committee. We hope that the Ordinance Committee will see the benefits of approving this and pass it on to the full City Council for ratification. I believe this is simply a long overdue correction that will not have a huge impact on the overall city budget. It will also align Holyoke with our surrounding communities and establish a level playing field. We encourage you to contact your Ward or At-Large City Councilor to encourage them to support this change.

We are currently engaged in a strategic plan process that will help us identify immediate and long-term goals for our employees, Board, building, and patrons. This is part of a recurring process in which the library evaluates current fiscal, human resources, programmatic, governance, and marketing practices in an attempt to make improvements based on demographic shifts, feedback from Holyoke residents, and internal review. We closely examine all facets of the library experience to make sure that we are responding to the needs of our community and strive to correct faults and introduce new services whenever possible.

The Friends of the Holyoke Public Library is currently engaged in a reorganization effort. The group is evaluating how they can best serve the library while responding to contemporary demands on people's time and methods of volunteering. The Board is working closely with members of the Friends to ensure that their efforts on behalf of the Library can continue far into the future. *See the Friends column in this newsletter for more info!* 

As you can see throughout this newsletter, the library has been engaged in lots of exciting activities this spring with more to come over the summer. There are too many to mention, but here are a few highlights:

The Puerto Rican Cultural Project, in

collaboration with the Library, continues to offer dynamic, unique, educational programs. This spring we saw lectures about the Puerto Rican Socialist Party and a screening of the documentary *Promesa*, which explores the pre-hurricane Maria economic crisis in Puerto Rico.



<u>Saber es Poder</u>, a joint effort between the Friends and Holyoke Community College, which aims to strengthen the Library's resources on

## History Room News

Visitors from far and near turn to the **Holyoke History Room**, on the Third Floor of the Library, to learn more about their family histories, their homes and neighborhoods, and the history of Holyoke. Highlights of the collection include historic maps of Holyoke, the Annual Reports from all Holyoke City departments (1850-1968), photographs and postcards, women's club scrapbooks, and the Holyoke Transcript newspaper (1880s-1993, on microfilm).

During the past year, the History Room acquired several important new collections. The **Vincent D'Addario Photograph Collection** contains more than 20,000 images taken in Holyoke and surrounding towns during Mr. D'Addario's career as a freelance and newspaper photographer between 1954 and 1997. The collection, made up of negatives, prints, contact sheets, and enlargements, includes his news, commercial, portrait, and art photography, most made with his large format camera and developed in his home darkroom. D'Addario was the recipient of numerous awards recognizing his ability to capture fleeting moments with skill, humanity, and humor. Many of the items in the collection are unidentified, but others are organized by subject or date.

Other recent additions to the collection include historical materials from the Holyoke Machine Company (donated by James Sagalyn), the Blanche Cavanaugh Historic Postcard Collection (donated by her daughter), and large-format color photographs of South Holyoke, the Flats, and Churchill that were exhibited in 1983 as part of "The Hidden Holyoke" exhibit (donated by the photographer, Bill Ravanesi). We're grateful for these donations and volunteers have been busy organizing them for better access by the public and for future exhibits.

The History Room will enjoy the help of two summer interns, from Bard Micro-College and from Amherst College, who are assisting with additional collections processing and metadata projects.

The History Room also sponsors events—last year's events included talks by Llana Barber ("Latino City"),

David Hernandez on immigration, Robert Forrant on the de-industrialization of the Connecticut River Valley, Eric Gradoia on Victorian architecture, and a series of Genealogy classes and drop-in sessions.

On Saturday, July 14, at 10:00 AM, Jonathan Gosnell will be here to present his new book, *Franco-America in the Making*, which explores the imprint left by members of the diasporic French family on North America.

See our website (below) to sign up for notifications of upcoming History Room events, including a return visit from Eric Gradoia in the fall on identifying architectural styles.

With the exception of August 13-19, the History Room will be open its usual 3 days a week all summer: Tuesday 10-6, Wednesday 12-6, and Thursday 10-4. We will also continue to have some select Saturday morning openings, so watch our website or Facebook page for those dates.

## Friends of HPL Notes

The Friends of the Holyoke Public Library, a volunteerrun organization since 1983, faced a significant crossroads in 2017 when informed that the IRS had dropped our 501c3 status. The Friends Board investigated how this occurred and spent time last summer questioning past practices and pondering new ways to operate. At the Annual Membership Meeting in September, we discussed whether to maintain a separate nonprofit corporation (including re-application to the IRS), or to become a volunteer committee within the Holyoke Public Library Corporation, which is also a nonprofit. We opted to join forces with HPLC, and are pleased that the HPLC Board welcomed this idea. We are still working out some details of the transition, but can report these relevant actions:

Mini Golf in the Library, a successful fundraiser started by the Friends in 2016, transitioned to HPLC fiscal management for 2018. (See report of the 3rd Annual elsewhere in this newsletter.) The 4th Annual Mini Golf fundraiser is scheduled for Saturday, April 6, 2019. Friends volunteers, as always, will play a

large role in this FUN community event. Please let us know if you could help now (early planning) or this fall (outreach to potential sponsors).

- HPLC accepted management of our 2017 Saber es poder grant from the Carlos Vega Fund for Social Justice to continue building our collection of resources on Puerto Rican and Latinx topics. Friends member Kate Kruckemeyer helped the Library apply for second grant in 2018 for this work; another \$500 was awarded, to be matched by the Friends.
- Friends Merchandise (e.g., our historic ornament series, Holyoke afghans, and Holyoke books) will continue to be sold via the Circulation Desk and the small on-going Book Sale, which we started in 2015, will continue, with Friends volunteer stocking its shelves. Proceeds from both these sales will now go directly to the Library.



We have engaged a lawyer to help us with the legal application to the Commonwealth to dissolve our corporation. A formal vote of our members will be necessary. Our Annual Membership meeting is planned for Wednesday, September 26, 2018, 5:30pm, at the Library. Save that date, and help us launch our new future.

## Mini Golf in the Library

Puerto Rican and Latinx history, cultural, and social movements, held its inaugural event in October 2017 with author Llana Barber who discussed her book <u>Latino City: Immigration and Urban Crisis in</u> <u>Lawrence, Massachusetts, 1945-2000</u>. Saber es Poder is a curated collection within the library that "emphasizes historic and ongoing struggles to build community, resist oppression, and create social change, in an effort to inspire library patrons of all backgrounds to engage in building a positive future for Holyoke".

We also hosted several engaging community talks and events on topics as diverse as gardening, clothes dyeing, Victorian dress, 19th century architecture, cross country biking, essential oils, KonMari, Therapy dogs, ukuleles, and more! The Holyoke History Room and Archives hosted several genealogy workshops and drop-in sessions.
