We've Got Your Beach Reads and More!

Remember our very successful pop-up book sale last fall? Well, it's about to happen again this spring. Here's your chance to deal with all the books that have been piling up on your night table and bookshelves all winter.

Here's the plan:

We will collect books in the library parking lot on May 15 from 9a.m.-noon and on May 16 from 1 p.m. to 4 p.m. We can only take books that are in good condition. Musty, torn, or dirty books must find a different home. All COVID-related guidelines for masks and social distancing will be observed.

All books collected will be quarantined in the shed for a week.

Books will be available for browsing and purchase on **Saturday, May 22, from 10 a.m. to 3 p.m.** in the library parking lot. The rain date will be Sunday, May 23, at the same hours. All payment should be by cash or check, since we will not be set up for credit card purchases.

We will have a special guest that day. Paul Split, the well-known local horticulturalist, will be there to answer gardening questions and to give out seed packets. Paul is a nationally recognized designer and presenter of green workshops and lectures. He specializes in organic, low maintenance, affordable landscapes, herb gardening, and gardening in glass. He is also a home garden consultant. Come and blend your enthusiasm for gardening with his expertise.

To make this sale successful, we need lots of help from the Friends. First, we need books. Lots of books. So please scavenge around in your bookcases, your desk, your end tables—wherever your


It's Time to Renew Your Membership!




It is 1921 in Texas. Elsa is 25, tall, gangly, lonely and sure she is not pretty. More than that, she is sure she is not good enough. Her own mother tells her she will never marry. No one will want her. And yet Elsa yearns to live.

From the very first page, this book will hold you riveted. It

begins when wheat is king, and the economy is good. But quickly the tides turn. Elsa goes from being a spinster, to being pregnant and married to a man who barely cares. Two children later she has learned how to work hard on a farm. She has also learned that her love for her children is unconditional and she will fight for their survival.

Not since I read The Famine by O'Flaherty Liam have I been taken so completely into the lives of those who had to struggle to survive against all odds. The terrifying episodes of ranging wind and pounding dust, will put you with Elsa and her children, hiding un-



der a table, struggling to breathe.

Her husband leaves her. He feels trapped on his parents' farm; and so, he runs off. Never to be seen again. Her daughter Loreda blames her. Each hard day, through one dust storm after another, with one loss after another, she debates whether to follow other migrant families and try to find a better life in California.



Finally, her little son Ant becomes ill with dust pneumonia. To save him, she decides she must take her family to California. Surely, she will be able to find work there and give her children a better life. Like many a mother, she wants her kids to be able to go to college and have a better life.

Elsa has no idea how tough the road will be ahead of her, or what she will have to endure for her family. You must read this wonderful book to know how this story ends. I will tell you this, you will not forget Elsa. She is honest about her fears; and she is so brave. In the end, Loreda will tell her mother she loves her; and she will call her a warrior.

I highly recommend this book and I give it 5 stars!
